an emotional and a scientifically proven therapy for cancer patients. Emotion relief comes from providing the mind a distraction and release from the stress and despair often accompanying a cancer diagnosis and treatment. In addition scientifically it has been shown that the concentration and creative thought required for the creation of art causes the body to produce and circulate hormones that are beneficial for combating cancer. The highlight of Ms. Crouch's presentation was a large display of art

pieces created by cancer survivors participating in the program. In the near future their work will be displayed in Moline at the Oncology Center of Unity Point Hospital – Trinity. Displayed next to each piece will be t narrative telling the survivor story of the creator of the piece. Living Proof Exhibit has also partnered with Gilda's Club by hosting on site art classes available to patients, family members and care providers.





Global Project Committee Update

President John continued his practice of having key Rotary Committees report on their goals and progress. This week Bob Swanson, chairman of our Global Project Committee reported that the committee is working hard to meet the Clubs' visioning goal of leading a water well project to aid children and families in under-developed parts of the world. Bob reported that the committee is currently working to develop a water well in Nicaragua. Local officials have identified seven villages in the San Juan Rio valley that are without any source of clean water for drinking and cooking. Our committee has contacted and is working to form a partnership with the Rotario de Managua Rotary Club in Nicaragua to provide local supervision and management for the project. A preliminary estimate of \$25,000 for constructing a well has been obtained and the committee plans to work with our grants chair, Tricia Barron to seek matching International and/or District Rotary Grants to help fund the project. Next on the agenda is to identify which village will get the well (perhaps the first of an ongoing project), employing contractors to do the work, and most importantly, raising the funds to make the dream a reality! Chairman Bob invited any interested Rotarian to join the Global Project Committee. Just see Bob.

Our 1.2 million-member organization started with the vision of one man—Paul P. Harris. The Chicago attorney formed one of the world's first service organizations, the Rotary Club of Chicago, on 23 February 1905 as a place where professionals with diverse backgrounds could exchange ideas and form meaningful, lifelong friendships. Rotary's name came from the group's early practice of rotating meetings among the offices of each member.

Our ongoing commitment

Rotarians have not only been present for major events in history—we've been a part of them. From the beginning, three key traits have remained strong throughout Rotary:

We're truly international. Only 16 years after being founded, Rotary had clubs on six continents. Today we're working together from around the globe both digitally and in-person to solve some of our world's most challenging problems.

We persevere in tough times. During WWII, Rotary clubs in

Germany, Austria, Italy, Spain, and Japan were forced to disband. Despite the risks, many continued to meet informally and following the war's end, Rotary members joined together to rebuild their clubs and their countries.

Our commitment to service is ongoing. We began our fight against polio in 1979 with a project to immunize 6 million children in the Philippines. By 2012, only three countries remain polio-endemic—down from 125 in 1988.

Do you know what we're doing in our community—and around the world?

Rotary members unite at home and across the globe to put our experience and knowledge to work tackling our most pressing challenges. We focus our efforts in six areas: promoting peace, preventing diseases, providing access to clean water and sanitation, enhancing maternal and child health, improving basic education and literacy, and helping communities develop.

We are especially dedicated to <u>ending polio in our lifetimes</u>. Rotary members have persevered in this fight since 1979 and have now helped eradicate polio in all but three countries worldwide.

When you give to Rotary, you support the work we do in our community and around the world. We are a <u>responsible organization</u> that uses nearly 90% of our funding for program expenses.
