**After** more than 20 years working for nonorganizations, profit Rotarian Diane Koster, with the able help of banker hubby Kevin, fulfilled a lifelong dream and entered the world of owning a small "for profit" business. They purchased a business they had often frequented, *The Grape*

Life Wine Emporium. Located in Davenport, Iowa. With members of Rocky's Entrepreneur/Enterprise Class listening on, Diane told the story of how they got it done. According to Diane it started with lots of research and seeking out expert help. One of her first stops was the Small Business Development Center in Davenport who worked with the Kosters step-by-step through the adventure. Fortunately, they had the benefit of buying an entity that had been in business for seven years and therefore had a record on which to build. It was a learning experience for Kevin and Diane having to quickly gain knowledge in managing staff, budgeting, finance, and dealing with the public. They had to learn how to prepare three to five year projections and said they were very fortunate to enlist the help of fellow Rotarian Tom Hammar and his accounting firm. Diane used her past experience in promotion and development to work on improving the visibility of the business. One of the first things they did was change the name to The Grape Life Wine Store and Lounge, feeling it was a more accurate and understandable statement of what the business is. They also improved the exterior lighting and signage and added vineyard scenes in the windows. Even little things like adding signage to her car helped promote the business. Through Kevin's influence they added a craft bottled beer section as well as a substantial quality liquor department. They have local musicians provide live entertainment every Friday and Saturday night and plan to add a jazz night on Thursdays. In addition to typical day to day sales, the Grape Life offers private parties, tasting nights, wine education programs, wine clubs, and a selection of food snacks featuring cheeses, crackers and meats. As a feature of the store, they offer complimentary tasting before purchase whenever they have the item available. Diane suggest always taste before you buy! She also warned that in business ownership one must always expect the unexpected and gave an example of the store door lock breaking leaving her unable to lock up at the end of the night. She also said there will be surprises and gave the example of learning that they had to pay licensing fees to three different entities in order to allow musicians to perform live music. In summary Diane said that "timing is everything". Their hopes and dreams came together when a business they enjoyed was offered for sale. Diane advised, "Go after what you want. Anything can be accomplished with determination and drive."
