MODERN WOODMEN OF AMERICA



Rock Island Rotary welcomed, Kenny Massey, President and CEO of Modern Woodmen of America as our guest speaker at today's meeting. Mr. Massey has been with Modern Woodmen for 34 years starting in Mississippi, then moving to Louisiana, and finally being asked to come to the Home Headquarters of the organization here in

Rock Island. He noted that Modern Woodmen now has over \$15 billion in assets and is A+ rated by AM Best. Giving a brief history of the organization, Massey said in 1883, Joseph Cullen Root, the founder of the organization selected the name "Modern Woodmen" in deference to the reputation of the woodmen of the 19th century who cleared the way for American expansion to the west. The thought was that his new fraternal organization was the "Modern" woodmen clearing the financial way for the families and orphans following the death of a breadwinner. "Of America" was added to emphasize patriotism. Modern Woodman began in Lyons, Iowa but moved its headquarters to Rock Island 120 years ago. Massey explained that Modern Woodmen is

not just an insurance company. They are a not for profit organization and have no stockholders. The company is owned by its member policy owners. He emphasized that he works solely for the benefit of their members and their employees. Modern Woodmen is a fraternal organization and by assets is the third largest such organization in the nation. In addition to life insurance, Modern Woodmen offers retirement investments programs, general insurance, annuity products, and banking services and products. They have nearly 2000 employees nationwide with 500 based in Rock Island. Mr. Massey spoke with great pride of the benevolent side of Modern Woodmen. He pointed out that there are 2,791 Modern Woodmen Chapters nationally, 750 Modern Woodmen Youth Clubs, and 275 Modern Woodmen Senior Chapters. These organizations meet for fellowship and community service. He noted that in the first 6 months of this year these chapters raised over \$12 million for service projects and donated nearly half a million hours of volunteer time. The youth clubs alone raised \$455,000 and provided 142,000 hours of community volunteer service. In addition, Modern Woodmen provides \$450,000 in college scholarships and conducts various literacy, health, and patriotism programs. Massey stated the poor economic conditions of the past decade have made it more challenging to meet their goals, but the organization has adapted and continues to be highly successful and financially strong. He emphasized a strong belief that the organization must give back to the community and said that one enriches their own life by enriching the lives of others. In closing he recited the Modern Woodmen Creed: "There is a destiny that makes us brothers; None goes his way alone; All that we send into the lives of others Comes back into our own."

Rock Island is indeed fortunate to have Modern Woodmen in our community. Thank you Kenny for an outstanding program!

50 Things Every Rotarian Should Know About Rotary

3 - ROTARY'S WHEEL EMBLEM



A Wheel has been the symbol of Rotary since our earliest days. The first design was made by Chicago Rotarian, Montague Bear, an engraver who drew a simple wagon wheel, with a few lines to show dust and motion. The wheel was said to illustrate "Civilization and Movement." Most of the early clubs had some form of wagon wheel on their publications and letterheads. Finally, in 1922, it was decided that all Rotary clubs should adopt a single design as the exclusive emblem of Rotarians. Thus, in 1923, the present gear wheel, with 24 cogs and six spokes was adopted by the "Rotary International Association." A group of engineers advised that the geared wheel was mechanically unsound and would not work without a "keyway" in the center of the gear to attach it to a power shaft. So, in 1923 the keyway was added and the design which we now know was formally adopted as the official Rotary International emblem. The six spokes in the wheel represented the six Objects of Rotary at the time.


School is back in session and that means Rotarians are needed for our **Birthday Book Program!**
