PAUL HARRIS FELLOW

The Paul Harris Fellow recognition acknowledges individuals who contribute, or who have contributions made in their name, of \$1,000 to The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International. It was established in 1957 to show appreciation for and encourage substantial contributions to the Rotary International Foundation. Rotarians have a tradition of supporting the Foundation by honoring others. The Rotary Club of Pikesville, Maryland, USA, made a donation in the name of Mother Teresa in 1980. The entertainer Pearl Bailey also became a Paul Harris Fellow through a joint effort of the Rotary clubs in Cape Cod, Mass. Many



other notable figures have been named as Paul Harris Fellows, including U.S. President Jimmy Carter, Russian President Boris Yeltsin, U.S. astronaut James Lovell, UN Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar, and Jonas Salk. The number of Paul Harris Fellows reached the one million mark in 2006.

KERI BASS AT THE "CORE"



Rock Island Rotarians enjoyed an enthusiastic and informative presentation today by Keri Bass, Director of Augustana College's CORE Center. We learned that CORE stands for Career, Opportunities, Research, and Exploration. When asked, few in the room were aware of the program or its purpose. Ms. Bass explained that the Center was designed to help students prepare for future careers. They do so by helping students determine and blend what they love to do, with what they are good at doing, with what they can be paid to do, and with what the world needs. Sounds simple, right? Not necessarily since what they love to do, might be something they really aren't very good at. Or it might be that there really isn't a market for what they want to do. The Center provides workshops, teaches interview skills, helps with resume preparation, and generally works on career development. In addition, the Center provides graduate

50 Things Every Rotarian Should Know About Rotary

1 - DEFINITION OF ROTARY

How do you describe the organization called "Rotary"? There are so many characteristics of a Rotary club as well as the activities of a million Rotarians. There are the features of service, internationality, fellowship, classifications of each vocation, development of goodwill and world understanding, the emphasis of high ethical standards, concern for other people and many more descriptive qualities.

In 1976 Rotary International Board of Directors was interested in creating a concise definition of the fundamental aspects of Rotary. They turned to the three men who were then serving on Rotary's Public Relations Committee and requested that a one-sentence definition of Rotary be prepared. After numerous drafts, the committee presented this definition, which has been used ever since in various Rotary publications:

"Rotary is an organization of business and professional persons united worldwide who provide humanitarian service, encourage high ethical standards in all coactions and help build goodwill and peace in the world".

These 32 words are worth remember when someone asks, "What is a Rotary club?"
