

QUAD CITIES INTERFAITH

Leslie Kilgannon is Executive Director of Quad Cities Interfaith, a coalition of congregations and community groups that have come together to build local leadership and address issues in the Quad Cities region of Illinois and Iowa. QCI is a community of people living out their faith and values to collectively transform our society and bring about justice and human dignity locally and regionally. QCI works to improve the quality of life in our region by developing leaders in congregations and other institutions, so as to



introduce values into public dialogue and speak with a strong, unified voice in the decisions that affect our lives. Since 1986, Quad Cities Interfaith has successfully addressed a number of pressing problems and helped develop various solutions in response to community needs. Accomplishments include:

- Developed a gang intervention project and an education incentive program for local youth.
- Founded Interfaith Housing, which rebuilds central city homes to revitalize our neighborhoods.
- Built a coalition of local lenders and community groups to combat predatory lending, producing a brochure warning the community against predatory lending and showcasing local lender alternatives to pay day loan products.
- Worked with students, parents and teachers to save vital school programs for at-risk students.
- Sponsored an annual business exposition to strengthen the local economy.
- Successfully petitioned the Iowa Governor to sign an order restoring voting rights to felons who have completed their incarceration and restitution.
- Worked with Illinois and Iowa organizations to cap the interest rate on car title loans at 36%.
- Partnering with The City of Davenport Police Department on a 2010 Weed and Seed grant through the Department of Justice - QCI is developing and implementing a Youth Leadership Program for youth in the targeted area to come together to solve community problem
- Developed a Mental Health Court now in use in Scott County, Iowa to allow persons charged with nonviolent crimes to enter a stringent mental health care program as opposed to incarceration.
- Worked with Black Hawk College to establish a highway construction training program for local workers.

Regardless of the specific issues addressed -- immigration, predatory lending, education, economic development, youth leadership development, health care -- the goal is to use the gifts of our people and the resources of our faith to rebuild community and shape a society that is more respectful of the life, dignity and rights of each person.

11 - WOMEN IN ROTARY

Until 1989, the Constitution and Bylaws of Rotary International stated that Rotary club membership was for males only. In 1978 the Rotary Club of Duarte, California, invited three women to become members. The RI board withdrew the charter of that club for violation of the RI Constitution. The club brought suit against RI claiming a violation of a state civil rights law which prevents discrimination of any form in business establishments or public accommodations. The appeals court and the California Supreme Court supported the Duarte position that Rotary could not remove the club's charter merely for inducting women into the club. The United States Supreme Court upheld the California court indicating that Rotary clubs do have a "business purpose" and are in some ways public-type organizations. This action in 1987 allowed women to become Rotarians in any jurisdiction having similar "public accommodation" statutes.

The RI constitutional change was made at the 1989 Council on Legislation, with a vote to eliminate the "male only" provision for all of Rotary.

Foundation Minute

When you make a donation to The Rotary Foundation, you are helping Rotary members make a difference in the lives of millions of people around the world, by promoting peace, preventing disease, bolstering economic development, and providing clean water and sanitation.

Here are just a few ways your generosity is changing lives.

In Tamil Nadu, India, two doctors, both members of the Rotary Club of Srirangam, discovered an alarming trend in the remote city outskirts of Trichy, women dying of breast cancer. They partnered with Rotary members in Maryland, USA, to purchase a large van, with the help of a Foundation global grant, and equip it with X-ray equipment. The "mammobus" has administered more than 2,500 free breast cancer screenings, and detected and treated early stage cancer in six women.

In Seattle, Rotary members are diverting millions of pounds of fruit and vegetable from food waste into the hands of those who need it through Rotary First Harvest, a program of Rotary District 5030 in Washington, USA)

Through a Foundation grant and in partnerships with the Organization of American States, Rotary members in Maryland, USA, provided a training program for teachers in Quito, Ecuador, which included the use of new technology. At the conclusion of the program, each school selected one story written by a second, third, or fourth-grade student to include in a book illustrated with student art.

Walk Along the Rock On Oct. 22 To Fight Polio

Rock Falls and Sterling Noon Rotary Clubs have joined together to promote Polio Eradication! We are invited to help! Registration starts at 8:15 a.m., with a welcome from the two club presidents at 9 a.m., the photo and then the sendoff. T-shirts of End Polio Now will be available to participants of a minimum donation of \$20, until the supply is exhausted. This should be a beautiful fall walk and advances the fight against Polio too!

Sam Wray, a Rock Island Rotarian since 1975 and current assistant Sergeant at Arms for our Club and wife, Hilde Wray, have been recognized by Rotary International as "Major Donors". The honor came in recognition of Sam and Hilde's generous recent gift of \$10,000 to the Rotary Foundation. Long an advocate of clean water and sanitation projects, Sam arranged for the donation to be used to purchase LifeStraw Community water filtration units for schools in the outskirts of Nairobi, Kenya. At approximately \$295 per unit, Sam and Hilde's generosity will be providing clean, safe, water for as many as 25 schools in Kiambu County. Depending on enrollment, some schools may receive two or more filtration units, which will each provide safe drinking water for approximately 70 children for three years before a replacement filter will be needed to "recharge" the unit.

In addition to their major donation to Rotary International, Sam and Hilde also donated \$1,000 as "seed money" to Rock Island Rotary in the hope that other Rock Island Rotarians will add contributions to a club sponsored "clean water project" and provide additional filtration units and/or replacement filters for the LifeStraw units. Sam also purchased a separate LifeStraw Community unit so that local club members could have an up close look at the unit and see how the system provides lifesaving safe water for cooking and drinking. Sam and Hilde hope to take the campaign "on the road" and enlist other area Rotary Clubs to join in a "Quad City Rotary Water Project" and expand the effort to ensure that children in less fortunate areas of the world have access to safe, clean water.

Rotary District Governor Scott Shore and wife Adrianne made the presentation to Sam and Hilde today at the Rock Island Rotary meeting at the Quad City Botanical Center. The couple received a crystal engraved with their names and depicts doves bearing olive branches – the universal symbols of peace. Mr. & Mrs. Wray also each received diamond pins indicating "Major Donor" status. The Wrays will also be honored by Rotary International on November 5th at the Rotary District 6420 Gala Foundation Dinner at Deer Valley Country Club, 3298 Hoover Road, Deer Grove, IL (near Rock Falls). Rock Island Rotarians are invited to attend the banquet in support of Sam, Hilde, and the Rotary Foundation. Cost is \$45 per person if reserved prior to October 15th; \$55 after the 15th.
