The Norma • Leah Ovarian Cancer Initiative is a 501(c) 3 established organization to public create awareness. promote early detection, and support research for ovarian cancer. Their ultimate goal is to have ovarian cancer screening become a routine part of a woman's annual gynecological exam. The organization honors the memory of two sisters, Norma Yecies Shagrin (May 21, 1935 -



June 1, 2008) and Leah Yecies Hantman (July 25, 1931 – August 21, 1998) whose lives were cut short by this deadly disease. In 2008, on the night her mother died, Kavensky founded the Norma•Leah Ovarian Cancer Initiative in honor of her mother, Norma, and her aunt, Leah. Both sisters' lives were cut short by ovarian cancer.

"A few months before my mother passed away of ovarian cancer, she went to a women's cancer luncheon, and they didn't even talk about this disease. And she said, after seven years, 'Jodie, you need to do something.' And I made her the promise that I would," said Kavensky.

Today, Kavensky believes that knowledge is power. When diagnosed at an early stage, ovarian cancer has a 92 percent survival rate. Unfortunately, most ovarian cancers are not discovered early. The group works to empower women to know and recognize the disease's subtle symptoms - bloating that is persistent, eating less but feeling fuller, abdominal and/or back pain, and trouble with your bladder or bowels. Kavensky pointed out that ovarian cancer is the deadliest of all gynecological cancers. As of yet there is no screening test for early detection of the deadly disease. Ms. Kavensky stressed that those with a propensity for the disease need ask their doctors to check and "Rule Out" ovarian cancer. Many doctors do not regularly check for ovarian cancer and often a patient's insistence is required. Those with a family history of gynecological cancer, and those carrying the BRCA gene are most vulnerable.

Over the past eight years, the Norma•Leah Initiative has touched thousands of women by promoting awareness, early detection and research. You can spot the group's signature teal color throughout the Quad Cities at events like the Beat the Big O Gala and GirlpARTs art and music festival.

"We feel the more that we're out there in the community, and the more events we do, the more people we reach, the more lives we save. And that's what we're all about," said Kavensky. She offered to make her presentation to any group, church, club, or organization that would listen. A message well worth hearing!

LIFESTRAW WATER FILTER VIDEOS

Last week Sam & Hilde Wray were honored as "Major Donors" for their generous donation to purchase LifeStraw Community water purification units for school children in Kenya. Sam also purchased an additional LifeStraw unit for display at our club and to be used in encouraging others to join in the effort to provide safe drinking water to children throughout the world. Subsequently several of our members asked where they might learn more about the LifeStraw filtration system developed by Vestergaard, a Danish manufacturer. 11 - WOMEN IN ROTARY

Until 1989, the Constitution and Bylaws of Rotary International stated that Rotary club membership was for males only. In 1978 the Rotary Club of Duarte, California, invited three women to become members. The RI board withdrew the charter of that club for violation of the RI Constitution. The club brought suit against RI claiming a violation of a state civil rights law which prevents discrimination of any form in business establishments or public accommodations. The appeals court and the California Supreme Court supported the Duarte position that Rotary could not remove the club's charter merely for inducting women into the club. The United States Supreme Court upheld the California court indicating that Rotary clubs do have a "business purpose" and are in some ways public-type organizations. This action in 1987 allowed women to become Rotarians in any jurisdiction having similar "public accommodation" statutes.

The RI constitutional change was made at the 1989 Council on Legislation, with a vote to eliminate the "male only" provision for all of Rotary.

Foundation Minute

Rotary clubs around the world are always supportive of projects that truly create an impact on the lives of the people that they serve. One such project comes from the Rotary Club of Ortigas Center in the Philippines. They initiated a sight-saving project for children with special needs. At least 350 children were diagnosed for visual impairment, and free eyeglasses were given. In cooperation with the Asian Eye Institute these children were also pre-screened for cataracts. With improved vision, they will be able to develop their own capabilities to their fullest potential.

In India smart canes for the visually impaired were donated. These special canes contain an attachment, which is embedded with ultrasonic sensors. They have a range of ten feet and make the user aware of obstacles from the knee up to the head. The club in India donated 200 such canes to the needy.

Hurricane Matthew tore through impoverished Haiti on October 4th, leaving hundreds dead and many more homeless. The Category 4 storm affected an estimated 330,000 people in Haiti, including 6,400 who were moved to temporary shelters. Extensive damage to main bridges other transportation and networks have left some areas cut off and vulnerable. Torrential rains have resulted in flooding and landslides. And contaminated

water supplies threaten to lead to a surge in cholera cases and other waterborne illnesses.

A ShelterBox response team of volunteers from Canada, England, New Zealand, and the United States traveled to Port-au-Prince, Haiti's capital, last week to assess the damage and decide how best to help people. ShelterBox, an independent charity, is Rotary's project partner for disaster relief. Working with Rotary members, government authorities, and other relief agencies, ShelterBox is focusing on the cholera outbreak in the southern region of the island and emergency shelter. A shipment of ShelterBox supplies arrived in Les Cayes, in the south of Haiti, on Wednesday, which likely will be used to help health professionals screen and treat cholera victims.

"We hope to provide ShelterKits along with other crucial supplies like solar lights, mosquito nets, water purification units, and water carriers. All of which will help in the fight against cholera," says Chris Warham, chief executive of ShelterBox. With wind speeds reaching 155 miles per hour, Hurricane Matthew is considered the worst storm to make landfall in Haiti in more than 50 years.

HOW WE CAN HELP

The Disaster Network Assistance Rotarian Action Group and Rotary District 7020 are collecting donations for relief in Haiti and the Bahamas. The initial funds will be used to replace the roofs of 1,000 homes and provide Sawyer water filtration systems.
