profit, 501 c (3) corporation that was founded in 1980 in the state of Illinois. In concert with numerous local organizations, the Federation, addresses a broad range of needs to include cultural, religious, educational, family welfare, care of the aged, and interfaith relations. The Federation combats hate and anti-Semitism by supporting religious liberty and civil rights for everyone. The Federation and spiritual development and promote the belief in tolerance, mutual respect, dignity, social justice, democratic values, and human rights. Mr. Ross began his talk with a PowerPoint presentation highlighting Israel, a country about the size of New Jersey with over 8 million residents. Seventy-five percent of the population are Jews, 20% Muslim, and the remaining 5% a mixture of Christian and other religions. Ross pointed out that for such a small "start-up" nation, Israel is one of the leading world economies with great high tech expertise, world-class universities, and as he described it, "a happy country" and a "great place to raise children". He pointed out that one of the strengths of Israel is agricultural technology which has resulted in Israeli cows producing more milk per cow than any other nation in the world!

The most recent project of the Federation has been establishing the American-Israel Economic Forum Quad Cities, a 501c(3) organization hoping to increase trade and joint ventures between Israel and the Quad Cities. Working with the American-Israel Chamber of Commerce of Chicago, the AIEFQC is sponsoring a trade mission to Israel in the coming months and hopes to have at least two Quad City companies as part of the mission group. The goal is to get more Quad City products imported to Israel and to develop more joint venture activities between our community and Israeli businesses.

12 - WORLD UNDERSTANDING MONTH

The month of February is very special in the Rotary calendar since it is designated World Understanding Month. The month also includes the anniversary of the first meeting of Rotary held on February 23, 1905, now designated World Understanding and Peace Day.

In designating World Understanding Month, the Rotary International board asks all Rotary clubs to plan programs for their weekly meeting and undertake special activities to emphasize "understanding and goodwill as essential for world peace."

To observe this designated month, many clubs arrange international speakers, invite youth exchange students and international scholars from schools and universities to club meetings, plan programs featuring former Group Study Exchange team members, arrange discussions on international issues, present entertainment with an international cultural or artistic them and schedule other programs with an international emphasis.

Many clubs take the opportunity to launch an international community service activity or make contact with a Rotary club in another country is a good month to initiate a Rotary Fellowship Exchange, a 3-H project to encourage support for PolioPlus and other Rotary Foundation programs.

World Understanding Month is a chance for every club to pause, plan and promote the Fourth Avenue of Service-Rotary's continued quest for goodwill, peace and understanding among people of the world.

It is a non-profit corporation that is supported solely by voluntary contributions from Rotarians and friends of Rotary who share its vision of a better world. We accomplish that through our local and international humanitarian and educational programs.

A member of the Rotary Club of Cleveland, Ohio, USA, Arch C. Klumph served as the RI president in the 1913-14 Rotary year. In 1917, Klumph declared that "we should accept endowments for the purpose of doing good in the world in charitable, educational, and other avenues of community service." His vision and a contribution of US\$26.50 left over from the RI Convention helped to establish the charitable and humanitarian arm of our organization, The Rotary Foundation.


