They have expertise in Occupational, Physical, Speech and Feeding therapies for children new born through early adolescence. The Therapy Center is a non-profit facility, investing funds back into its programs to give the best quality care possible. They take referrals from Physicians and Nurses throughout the Quad Cities and beyond. Over the years, thousands of individuals and their families have benefited from their services - regardless of their ability to pay for the services. No child has ever been turned away due to inability to pay. Direct therapy services to children are provided only by licensed therapists. The Children's Therapy Center does not use aides or assistants in direct therapy to children. The Center serves from 400 to 450 children each year and is described as an organization, "That gives hope." The main areas of service consist of Occupational therapy, a health profession with the goal to help people achieve independence, meaning and satisfaction in their lives; Physical therapy, a health profession with the goal to help persons who have any sort of movement problems resulting from an illness, disease or disability; Speech therapy, a health profession with the goal to help persons who have speech and/or language disorders and swallowing or feeding issues. A speech disorder refers to a problem with the actual production of sounds. A language disorder refers to a difficulty understanding or putting words together to communicate ideas; Feeding Therapy, which helps children with feeding and swallowing difficulties which puts them at risk of malnutrition, dehydration, and respiratory problems. Therapy strategies include strengthening the muscles of the mouth, increasing tongue movement, improving chewing patterns, increasing tolerance of different foods or liquids, improving sucking/drinking ability, coordinating the suck-swallow-breathe patterns of infants, and altering food textures and liquid viscosity to improve safe swallowing. Rock Island Rotary has for many years participated in the annual Children's Therapy Center Telethon which along with the Chuck Long Sports Auction are the two major fundraisers for the Center. Fundraisers provide about 30% of the Center's annual budget. The Center was incorporated in 1949 as the Crippled Children's Foundation of Rock Island County. In 1983 the name was changed to the Easter Seal Foundation Serving Rock Island and Mercer Counties. In 1989 the Henry County East Seals Foundation merged and the name became the Easter Seal Foundation Serving Henry, Mercer and Rock Island Counties. In September of 2002, the Easter Seal Foundation serving Henry, Mercer and Rock Island Counties discontinued its affiliation with National Easter Seals, Inc. The volunteer Board of Directors voted 22-0 to maintain its local autonomy and to become the Children's Therapy Center of the Quad Cities, insuring that all funds raised stay locally and serve children throughout the greater Quad City area. Once again, a great program from one of our local "Hero" organizations!

50 Things Every Rotarian Should Know About Rotary

13 - THE CLASSIFICATION PRINCIPLE

Virtually all membership in Rotary was based upon a "classification." Basically, a classification describes the distinct and recognized business or professional service which the Rotarian renders to society.

The principle of Rotary classification is somewhat more specific and precise. In determining the classification of a Rotarian, it is necessary to look at the "principal or recognized business or professional activity of the firm, company or institution" with which an active member is connected or "that which covers his principal and recognized business or professional activity." It should be clearly understood that classifications are determined by activities or services to society rather than by the position held by a particular individual. In other words, if a person is the president of a bank, he or she is not classified as "bank president" but under the classification "banking."

It is the principal and recognized activity of a business or professional establishment or the individual's principal and recognized business or professional activity that determines the classification to be established and loaned to a qualified person. For example, the permanently employed electrical engineer, insurance adjuster, or business manager of a railroad company, mining company, manufacturing concern, hospital, clinic, etc., may be considered for membership as a representative of the particular work he or she may be doing personally or as a representative of the firm, company, or institution for which the professional service is being done.

The classification principle also permits business and industries to be separated into distinct functions such as manufacturing, distributing, retailing and servicing. Classifications may also be specified as distinct and independent divisions of a large corporation or university within the club's territory, such as a school of business or a school of engineering.

Though the classification principle is not as dominant as it once was it is still important that we make an effort to assure that each Rotary club represents a cross section of the business and professional service of the community.
