Looking Forward

Western Illinois State Normal school in Macomb was first chartered in 1899 for teacher preparation in grammar schools. The name was changed in 1957 to Western Illinois University. In the late 1960's the first classes were offered in the Quad Cities. In 2012 the WIU - Quad City Riverfront Campus celebrated its Grand Opening. The Quad City campus serves a unique market that is different than the main campus in Macomb. The average age of students in the Quad City area is 28 years old. WIU currently has 44 major programs. The engineering program in the Quad Cities has a strong enrollment of about 200 students. There are also PHD programs at the Quad City Campus focusing in two areas: Educational Leadership and a study of the Mississippi River. The student population in the Quad Cities represents eight different foreign countries. Dr. Rives was very happy to remind our exchange daughter Agata that there could be a course Study available for her after graduation and then Poland would be represented as well. A strong partnership with WQPT is continually being administered that focuses on similar core values focused on life long learning. There are current challenges facing the university as the state of Illinois currently has \$102 million held back in debt to the school. Dr. Rives is very optimistic for the future of the Quad City Campus which includes phase III of the building plans for this area. A Science / Math and Technology Center will be built along the river in the area known as the Mills. A Cyber Security major will be introduced in the future and educational opportunities to build a stronger relationship with the nation of Israel may also be developed. The Quad City Campus will continue to evolve and adapt to our area and the needs of the community. Online degree programs will be developed as the need and demands are presented and tuition costs should remain at a Consistent rate for students during their entire 4 years of college.

50 Things Every Rotarian Should Know About Rotary


44 - POLIOPLUS

PolioPlus is Rotary's massive effort to eradicate poliomyelitis from the world by the year 2005. It is part of a global effort to protect the children from five other deadly diseases as well-the "plus" in PolioPlus. The program was launched in 1985 with fund-raising as a primary focus. The original goal was to raise 120 million. By 1988, Rotarians of the world had raised more than \$219 million in cash and pledges. By 1994, the cash total exceeded \$246 million! These gifts have enabled The Rotary Foundation to make grants to provide a five-year supply of vaccine for any developing country requesting it to protect its children. Grants have been made to nearly 100 countries - a commitment, thus far, of \$181 million to buy vaccine and to improve vaccine quality.

Achieving eradication will be difficult (only one other disease, smallpox, has ever been eradicated) and expensive (estimated cost to the international community is nearly \$2 billion). It will require continuing immunization of children worldwide, and it also must include systematic reporting of all suspected cases, community-wide vaccination to contain outbreaks of the disease, and establishment of laboratory networks. Rotary will not be alone in all these efforts but in partnership with national governments, the World and Pan American Health Organizations, UNICEF and others. Rotary's "people power" gives us a special "hands on" role. Rotarians in developing countries have given thousands of hours and countless in-kind gifts to help eradication happen in their countries.

No other non-governmental organization ever has made a commitment of the scale of <u>PolioPlus</u>. Truly it may be considered the greatest humanitarian service the world has ever seen. Every Rotarian can share the pride of that achievement!
