Local Newspaper Update!

Deb Anselm, a native of Indiana, became publisher of the Quad City Times in 2015. Previously she served as the general manager of Times Media Co. in Munster. "The Quad-City Times has long been a vital part of community and commerce in the Quad-Cities area," she said. "It's truly an honor to be publisher of a newspaper with such a deep and storied past in Lee Enterprises. Anselm said she long had aspirations of becoming a publisher and was committed to staying with Lee Enterprises. From her visits to the Quad-Cities and



Lee's headquarters in downtown Davenport, she said, "I had a wonderful experience visiting the Quad-Cities, and I heard first-hand from friends at Lee and the management team about how much they enjoy the community. Anselm is a 1987 graduate of Indiana University. She and her husband, Scott, have three children. Mrs. Anselm wears many hats being publisher of the Quad City Times, The Argus-Dispatch, and the Muscatine Journal. She noted that Lee Enterprises is a highly regarded entity in the newspaper business and one that people in the industry hope to work for. She noted that Lee has holdings in 49 markets in 21 states and specializes in mid-sized to small markets. She said they look for communities that care about their local news and want local autonomy. Although Lee has a central corporate office, they strive to allow and encourage local control for the most part. They put their emphasis on local news and local events. She also noted that Lee, along with the newspaper industry in general has moved substantially into digital news, which now encompasses 70-80% of the Lee Enterprises market. Anselm spoke at length about Lee's recent purchase of the Argus-Dispatch, noting that Small Enterprises (former owners of the Argus-Dispatch) approached Lee and asked to be bought out. The sale included the "assets" of the Argus-Dispatch, but not the Small Enterprises building in downtown Moline. She said that Lee is committed to maintaining their presence in Illinois and is currently negotiating for a new Illinois facility. She noted that with the acquisition of the Argus-Dispatch, Lee now has over 65,000 subscribers in the area, with about 25,000 being in Illinois. In answer to one of the most frequent questions she is asked, Anselm said there are no plans to merge the Argus-Dispatch and the Quad City Times. They will each maintain their own executive editors and identities. They will share photos and news releases, but intend to maintain local control and local news coverage in each community. She did note that the acquisition will allow them to send one reporter and one photographer to many events rather than each entity sending their own, which will free up reporters and photographers to cover other events and will allow better coverage of more events. She noted that columnist will not be "shared" and that those that have been featured in the Argus-Dispatch will continue to appear there and will not be carried over to the Quad City Times. She said the delivery systems of the two papers will be merged, however that will take some time to be completed. Ultimately one delivery persons will be able to distribute both papers on their route. Overall it was a very interesting program and the message of maintaining local autonomy was very well received!

FOUNDATION MINUTE

In a world where intolerance and violence fueled by religious differences are seemingly increasing, one Rotary club in Indonesia is showing how diversity can help prevent a pandemic threat. When the Rotary Club of Solo Kartini in Surakarta, Indonesia, formed 25 years ago, its members drew criticism from the predominantly Muslim community.

The club's members were mostly Christians, atypical for a country where more than 80 percent of the population is Muslim. Religious leaders were skeptical of Rotary's secular mission and wary of intrusion.

Undeterred, the club started recruiting more members. Today, the 72-member, all-female club includes both Muslims and Christians. And the effort they have put into breaking down barriers and fostering respect and understanding among club members has reinforced the club's capacity to address dengue fever, one of the biggest public health threats in tropical cities like Surakarta.

The club launched an effective public health initiative to prevent the disease requiring volunteers with deep knowledge and connections to the community who can craft specific and sustainable solutions. Rotary member Mariam Kartonagoro says her club's diverse makeup – particularly its abundance of mothers and professionals of varied ages and backgrounds – enhanced their effort to fight dengue fever.

“The fact that we are different does not create trouble, but it strengthens our relationship,” she says. We hope to see more people crossing cultural lines to help each other. Rotary has a very diverse membership, and we can be examples to others in the way we work. After all, when we give help, we do not ask about the religion of the person. We think in a much more global way. We try to foster relationships with people who may have different beliefs or thoughts. We can become friends here in Rotary. Maybe this way, we can inspire Indonesia and the world.”
