GROUP O Bob Ontiveros

Robert Ontiveros is the Chairman of Group O, a company he founded in 1974. As Chairman, Ontiveros oversees the entire Group O family of companies, which is composed of marketing, packaging and supply chain divisions. Ontiveros has grown Group O to more than 1,500 employees across 40 national locations, making it one



of the largest Hispanic-owned businesses in the United States. Ontiveros learned about the large-scale packaging industry early in his career. After seven years with Dun & Bradstreet, Ontiveros joined a small family-run packaging company, where he developed his entrepreneurial drive coupled with important business values, eventually leading to the development of his own firm, Bi-State Packaging. Bob's leadership is evident by his numerous honors, including: **Order of Lincoln** — the state of Illinois' highest honor, recognizing his professional and community achievements; **Outstanding Community Leadership** — State of Illinois Comptroller; U.S. Department of Commerce — **Legacy Award**; Minority Business Hall of Fame —

Ontiveros is an active member of both the Illinois and U.S. Hispanic Chambers of Commerce, along with a number of other community and business organizations. An Illinois native, he dedicates time to serving as a board member for the Boys & Girls Club of the Mississippi Valley, as well as being a Junior Achievement whole school sponsor, which supplies classrooms with educational materials. He also supports many organizations throughout the Quad Cities, including Niabi Zoological Association, Community Healthcare and many more. Bob resides in Moline, Illinois, with his wife Blenda. Now semi-retired, Ontiveros has turned over much of the day to day company operation to his children and to employees, many who have been with him since Group O was formed 43 years ago. Ontiveros credited his success to his immigrant heritage and growing up poor. He noted that the first building his company occupied was rented for \$100 a month. He said that was good, because he had no money! How did he grow from nothing to a company now doing over \$750 million in annual sales? Ontiveros says by "embarrassing change" and 'looking for things that need to be done and figuring out how to do it". His attitude has always been "Yes I can: and "I can do it". He stressed that you can't wait for someone to give things to you. Ontiveros lamented that there is a great shortage of workers. He said, "everyone is looking, companies all over are trying to hire". The shortage is "People who want to work". He said Group O is a "Can Do" company. He also said that now is the time for opportunity with exciting things happening. Mr. Ontiveros credited his grandfather for inspiring him to succeed. He said his grandfather immigrated from Mexico in 1918 and proudly displayed his grandfather's and parents' old and worn naturalization certificates. He said grandpa worked from dawn to dusk every day. He also credited the help of other business men with helping him when problems arose. He places high value on networking and urged us to network with others more often. He identified Rotary as an excellent place for networking. At 79 Bob Ontiveros still shows the enthusiasm and drive that made him one of America's top Hispanic businessmen and built one of our areas finest businesses. This wan another inspiring program highlighting what can be accomplished with drive and hard work.

WORLD POLIO DAY - NEXT TUESDAY, OCTOBER 24

For the first time, Rotary's World Polio Day celebration heads to the West Coast of the United States. The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, one of our partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, will host the annual event at its campus in downtown Seattle, Washington, on 24 October. Only 11 new cases of polio caused by wild poliovirus have been reported this year, all in Pakistan and Afghanistan.

At the 2017 Rotary International Convention in Atlanta, Bill Gates renewed and increased his foundation's pledge to match, 2-to-1, all contributions to The Rotary Foundation that are designated for polio eradication efforts. Rotary's commitments and pledges from world governments and corporate donors, counted along with the Gates Foundation's pledge, have made the campaign to eliminate polio worldwide \$1.3 billion stronger.

If you have been considering starting a Paul Harris sustaining membership for yourself or other family member, why not take the leap and do it on World Polio Day at our October 24th meeting? You need only donate \$100 and the Gates Foundation will add \$200, that along with our Club's matching funds will have you well on your way to a full Paul Harris Fellow designation. Just let Bud Phillis know that you want to get started. Let's see how many new Paul Harris sustaining members we can introduce on October 24th. If you have questions, Bud will be happy to help.

FOUNDATION MINUTE

Conflict and violence displace millions of people each year. Half of those killed in conflict are children and 90% are civilians. Rotary International refuses to accept conflict as a way of life. Its projects provide training that fosters understanding and provides communities with the skills to resolve conflicts. Through its service projects, peace fellowships and scholarships, our members are taking action to address the underlying causes of conflict, including poverty, inequality, ethnic tension, lack of access to education and unequal distribution of resources.

100 Peace fellowships are offered each year at the seven Rotary Peace Centers around the world. One thousand students have graduated from this program. 36% of them are now working in nongovernmental organizations, 15% in government agencies, 8% are teaching, and 6% are with United Nations agencies. The remaining students can be found working in the World Bank, journalism, police and law enforcement.

Many of our clubs are active in bringing peace to the world by improving quality of life. Its People for People Foundation has helped 10,000 families afford food, clothing, rent, utilities, medications and other necessities.

A Rotaract club in the Philippines conduct anti-bullying campaigns in schools to teach children how to handle conflict peacefully from an early age. And in the State of Louisiana local Rotary members address the issue of domestic violence by subsidizing a shelter that provides subsistence to over 500 women a year.

Here are the details for our project: on Saturday, Oct. 28 at 9AM - Noon we will meet at the Living Land & Waters Tree Nursery, 6000 Eastern Avenue in Davenport. Park in the Eastern Branch of the Davenport Library at 6000 Eastern Avenue. We will then plant acorns from Bur Oak, Swamp White Oak and Red Oak trees. Our trees will be harvested in two years and made available to Park Departments, Forest Preserves, community groups and citizens to plant throughout our area.
