

Glub Assembly

Today with 5° weather outside, Bruce Peterson led us in our first Club Assembly during in his term as club president. He began with a quick review of some of the donations made by our club to date this year. He mentioned \$2,000 given to the Children's Therapy Center; \$1,500 donated to Youth Hope; \$3,750 given in scholarships through our Bert Blood Scholarship program; \$4,000 donated to Rotary Youth



Exchange expenses; \$1,000 in club funds provided for the Pumpkin Palooza field trip for Earl Hanson 1st and 2nd grade students (plus more raised by Tricia Barron and sponsorships); \$3,000 donated for literacy projects; and, \$7,500 given in community grants through our Budget Priorities Committee. President Bruce also suggested changing the name of the Budget Priorities Committee to the "Community Grant

Committee". Noting that this committee would like to pump more into our community, Bruce discussed the possibility of adding a Rotary sponsored carnival as a new major fundraiser. Bruce then turned the mic over to Tom Hammar for a preliminary report on our audit. Tom said our books are in outstanding shape and complimented club treasurer, Carrie Crossen for outstanding, detailed monthly



reports to the Board. Next up was Dr. Bud Phillis for an update on the Rotary International Foundation. Bud reported that in the

past year there were less than 50 cases of polio world-wide. He also stressed that the push in on to totally eliminate the disease. To that end the Gates Foundation has extended it's 2 for 1 matching promise for all Rotary contributions toward polio eradication through 2018. Dr. Phillis as took the opportunity to kick off our own Club pledge campaign to stamp out polio. Pledge cards will be available at next week's

meeting. Pledges can be spread over the next three years, which will coincide with the time needed to certify the elimination of polio. Following Dr. Phillis, Mark Mayeski stepped to the mic to tell us about our Rock Island Club Foundation. Unlike the International Foundation, our local Club Foundation can only donate

funds for local projects that will benefit the citizens of Rock Island. The fund is managed by a Board of Rock Island Rotarians. They are assisted by two committees; the Development Committee seeks ways to obtain additional donations to the foundation. The Projects Committee seeks out and screens projects for the Foundation to support. In the past the Club Foundation has given \$10,000 to help establish the Rock Island High School Entrepreneurship program; and \$6,500 to Spring Forward Learning Center in support of their summer reading program. For



both the International and Club Foundations, club members can arrange for automatic monthly account withdrawals to fulfil desired donation. President Bruce completed the program advising the club of efforts to update and amend our Constitution and By-laws with particular emphasis placed on developing new avenues of membership including corporate memberships and expanded honorary memberships.
