On Symphony Day at the Adler Theater 6,000 students attend 3 packed performances. Brian looks to be a great find for the Quad Cities!

ROCK ISLAND CLUB FOUNDATION MAKES MAJOR CONTRIBUTION -GAINS LONG TERM IMPACT FOR COMMUNITY YOUTH AND FOR ROCK ISLAND ROTARY!



When our Rock Island Rotary Club Foundation was established, its rules and regulations require principal funds to be invested and untouched and interest earned from the principal is to be used exclusively for local projects benefiting the Rock Island Community. Over the years the invested principal has grown as Rotarians add to the fund. Interest earned has grown to over \$6,000 per year. Not having used the interest earned last year, the funds available this year exceeded \$12,000. That allowed our Foundation Committee and Rotary Board of Directors to fund a major, high impact community project, one that will benefit the community and Rotary for years.

Our club has supported the Rock Island Girls Slow Pitch Softball League in their efforts to build a centrally located complex of softball fields, twice joining with Rock Island Kiwanis to purchase scoreboards for two new fields built adjacent to Rock Island's Hauberg Civic Center. The League with assistance from the Rock Island Park Board built the two fields from scratch with donated funds and grants from individuals and organizations, including Major League Baseball. One field is entirely completed with fencing, dugouts, scoreboard, bleachers, lights and underground irrigation. The second field has fencing, dugouts, scoreboard and bleachers but lacks lighting and irrigation. Adding lighting is a high priority. Unlighted fields can accommodate just one game each evening. With two divisions of teams, one for 9 through 13-year-old girls and one for 14 to 18-year girls, six or seven games are needed each evening throughout the summer. This requires games to be held at various sites scattered across the city, and often resulted in 3 games being scheduled on the same night at the one lighted field. The third game frequently is not completed until well after 10pm. Safety of young girls has been a constant concern and worry. Younger girls bicycle to games, many of the girls walk. Sending them home well after dark often occurs and is recognized as not good. A second lighted field will allow all league games to be played at the Hauberg complex and the Reservoir Park fields located just a half block from the Hauberg fields. The restroom and concessions building at the Hauberg Complex can serve both facilities. No more than 2 games per night will be needed on the lighted fields. The league has been fundraising for several years trying to fund the \$50,000+ lighting project for the second field. With over \$30,000 in hand, Girls Softball needed one more big push to get to a point where construction of lights for the second field could get underway while the league continues raising the final funds needed.

Enter Rock Island Rotary, with a \$12,000.00 donation to the project. This will impact and benefit over 200 young girls every year for decades to come. In return, the League and the Rock Island Park Board agreed to honor our club by naming the field, "ROCK ISLAND ROTARY FIELD". A new sign is being prepared and will become a permanent part of the field's scoreboard. Schedules distributed to players and their families will delineate games played on "Rotary Field". Rock Island Rotary will be recognized now and for decades to come as players and fans attend events at the field. Today. representatives of the Girls Softball League attended our meeting to receive their donation and to express their heartfelt appreciation to our club.

Foundation Minute

ROTARY BOARD OF DIRECTORS REPORT

President Bruce Peterson reported that at our March Board of Directors meeting held yesterday several important reports were heard and actions were taken.

The Fundraising Committee reported that our Dueling Piano fundraiser "A Little Off Key" was a great success with 125 persons attending. The project netted a profit of \$3,200 which will be shared with the co-sponsoring RAH Club.

Bruce also reported that Sue Cassatt is in the process of planning a fun "Wine Raffle" with details coming soon!

Bruce also reported that we're having communication issues with our carnival company and are still hopeful to host the first "ROTARYFEST" in late May.

Finally, Bruce noted that the Board approved a \$2000 donation in support of an International project developed by the Ottawa Rotary Club. See details below.

ROCK ISLAND ROTARY JOINS OTTAWA PROJECT



Not exactly the kind of ambulance we're used to seeing. Imagine laying in this for 45 miles on a bumpy dirt road!

In response to a call for help, Rock Island Rotary voted to donate \$2,000 to the Ottawa Noon Rotary Club's Amagara Ga'Boona Medical Center project. The eight-room block build with a surgical suite, a pharmacy, patient wards, laboratory, medical examination room, and an office will serve more than 25,000 people. Currently the nearest medical facility is 45 miles away over a bumpy dirt road. The "ambulance" is a three-wheel all terrain vehicle with no medical equipment nor medical personnel. Through various grants the Ottawa Club hopes to completely outfit the facility with modern medical equipment. They have partnered with the Hospital Sisters Mission Outreach Program in Springfield to obtain \$150,000 to \$250,000 of major medical equipment. They are now working on a Rotary Foundation International Grant which requires some matching funds. Ottawa Rotary has a goal of raising \$18,000-\$20,000 from Clubs in District 6420 which will allow them to submit the grant application. Our gift of \$2,000 gets them well on their way!
