Now in its 21st season, Ballet Quad Cities is the longest-running resident professional ballet company in the entire state of Iowa and western Illinois, one of only 100 in the nation. Their performances and interactive school programs touch over 30,000 people each year with the athletic and entertaining art of dance. Our guest speakers today were Paul Plagenz, President of the Board of Directors, and Margaret King, ballet mistress and Director of Education Outreach for Ballet Quad Cities. Their 2017-18 season included "Dracula" performed in October; "The Nutcracker" performed in December; "Alice In Wonderland" performed this past weekend; "Defining Dance: Distinctly Ballet Quad Cities" coming up April 20 – 21; and "Ballet Under the Stars" to be performed June 8,9,10 at Lincoln Park in Rock Island. Ballet Quad Cities' mission is to provide professional classical and contemporary dance to the entire community through outstanding performances, entertaining lecture-demonstrations and innovative educational outreach programs for people of all ages. Their DREAMS Achieved through Dance, Dance Me a Story; Exploring Literature through Ballet, and The Ugly Duckling Bully Prevention program reach thousands of elementary students in the Quad Cities community and neighboring counties in Iowa and Illinois. Ballet Quad Cities' School of Dance offers a wide variety of classes from beginning through advanced levels. Classes in Creative Movement, Ballet, Pointe, Jazz, Modern, Conditioning, and Adult Ballet are offered. Each dancer is evaluated by the faculty and placed in a class suitable for his or her technical ability. Class sizes are small so that each dancer receives the care and attention they deserve. Ballet Quad Cities began a collaboration with Orchestra Iowa starting in the 2012-2013 season. Two performances featuring the two groups are held in both the Paramount Theatre in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, where Orchestra Iowa is based, and the Adler Theatre in Davenport, Iowa. The Adler is one of the ballet's primary venues. Mr. Plagenz noted that the annual budget of BQC is \$450,000. Roughly one-fifth of the budget is earned via ticket sales for performances. Fully 4/5 of their funding comes from business and private donations and from grants from numerous sources. He also stated that the three strategic initiatives of the Ballet's Board are 1) Growing the audience, 2) Financial Stability, and 3) Leadership Development. Their audience has grown significantly with the current season attendance exceeding last year's, which itself was a record breaking year. Financially, Ballet Quad Cities has been running "in the black" for the past several years. Miss King spoke primarily of the educational programs offered by BQC. The "Ugly Duckling" was performed for 1st grade students in Rock Island and surrounding communities teaching anti-bullying and acceptance. The "Dance Me A Story" program targets 2<sup>nd</sup> graders. The "Nutcracker" in addition to sold out performances in the Quad Cities and Cedar Rapids, was performed for 2,000 school children at the Adler Theater. We also learned of BQC's year long after school program "Dreams Achieved Through Dance" provides free dance training for Rock Island elementary children. A great program added to the proof that for friendly people, the arts, and culture, the QCA is a great place to live!




#### ARE YOU READY FOR SOME FOOTBALL?

### Cellphones power disease fight



Pakistan and Nigeria are replacing paper-based reporting with fast, accurate cellphone messaging. Mobile phones and simple text messaging may be the keys to victory in the world's largest public health initiative: the eradication of polio. As the disease retreats from the global stage, thriving in only a few remote areas in three countries, it's up to health workers to deliver vaccines and share information with speed and accuracy.

Health workers in Pakistan are receiving cellphone and e-monitoring training at the Rotary Resource Center in Nowshera, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. Rotary and its partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative are strengthening the lines of communication by giving cellphones to health workers in Pakistan and Nigeria, where a single text message could save a life. In Pakistan, Rotary has been working to replace traditional paper-based reporting of maternal and child health information, including polio immunization data, with mobile phone and e-monitoring technology. Community health workers across the nation have received more than 800 phones through a partnership with Rotary, the Pakistani government; Telenor, the country's second-largest telecommunications provider; and Eycon, a data monitoring and evaluation specialist. Organizers plan to distribute a total of 5,000 cellphones by the end of 2018. Health workers can use the phones to send data via text message to a central server. If they see a potential polio case, they can immediately alert officials at Pakistan's National Emergency Operations Center. They also can note any children who didn't receive the vaccine or parental refusals – and record successful immunizations. In Pakistan, the polio eradication effort aims to reach the nation's 35 million children under age five.

The result is a collection of real-time information that officials can easily monitor and assess, and says Michel Thieren, regional emergency director of the World Health Organization's Health Emergency Program.
