CLUB ASSEMBLY

Today Rock Island Rotary held our first Club Assembly under the leadership of President, Sue Cassatt. Sue took us through the work done by members of our club who participated in the Visioning Seminar held last May 19th. There members of our club faced the questions: 1) Where is our club now? 2) Where do we want to be in five years? The session guided by the District Visioning Chairman helped us develop a long-range plan for Rock Island Rotary. Look at where we want to be in five years, President Sue named four general goals: 1) Be a Key Player in Rock Island Development, 2) Be Recognized as a Leader in the Community, 3) Have a strong mentoring program in our club and the community, 4) Grow the club to a minimum of 125 members. Within our members the goal is to have multi-sector membership the reflects the diversity of our community. The goal is also to have excellent programs that foster professional and

social growth. Being recognized as an "Agent for change" with substantial community involvement is another aspiration for our club. Looking at how we go about accomplishing these goals Sue noted that we need an active and interactive newsletter, website, and social media presence. We need to offer professional development opportunities for our members. We also need to build a strong corporate membership program. Our club also aspires to interact with other Quad City area clubs and organizations recognizing that more can be accomplished through working together. The vision participants also felt that having a strong member retention program is a must, as is having exciting and dynamic weekly programs. Sue also mentioned that developing a program to assist struggling students in our community is needed to go along with the many programs we have that recognize the extremely outstanding students. Regarding some of our current projects, the group felt that we need to strengthen and grow support for our RYLA and Interact programs. There is also a desire to expand both the high school Entrepreneur Program and our Earl Hanson involvement. In the area of community service, the group set goals of becoming the sponsor of a girls' softball teams, and that we partner and teach as advocates for adults and children in the community. Developing partnerships to resolve unmet community needs and being seen as a desired partner by others, are also priorities. The group felt our members should also wear our club shirts and other club gear to become more visible and recognized in the community. Regarding the "new generation", it was felt that we should work to expand Interact, Rotaract, and Earlyact. Sue noted that Carla Thies has agreed to head up the Rocky Interact Club, Bud Phillis has agreed to mentor the Jordan Earlyact Club, and Bruce Peterson is working to strengthen our ties with the Augustana College Rotaract group. Like these leaders, Sue hopes to assign key individuals to champion various projects to ensure successful results. She hopes to also encourage both utilization and contributions to Rotary International funds. Plans also include continuing our support for the Rotary Youth Exchange program with one inbound and two to four outbound students each year. In the area of international service, goals included adopting a sister club in a foreign nation, providing assistance and support for refugees that locate in the Quad Cities, developing a strong program of maintaining contact with our past exchange students, and encouraging some of our members to participate in the Rotary Friendship Exchange. For fundraising the planners set a goal of raising \$100,000 per year and to do so not just by our own contributions, but by involving the entire community in our fundraising projects. Finally, Sue said that every club member needs to understand the importance of fundraising and all need to participate both with their treasure and talent. To encourage member support of the club, the group suggested adding a line item on our dues statements where we can add a charitable contribution. The Club will also provide more encouragement and information on making testamentary gifts to the club. They will also ask that club members receive periodic Paul Harris Fellow status statements, so members will know exactly what they have given and how much more is needed to earn PHF recognition. Finally, President Sue said the goal is to have a press release for each project the club undertakes. The plan also calls on us to develop a public image plan to ensure. T It is also hoped that a phone app can be development to help maintain better contact with our members. It is apparent that our members worked hard at the visioning seminar, accomplished much, and gave us a challenging plan for the future. Thank you Sue for laying it all out for us. Foundation Minute

The Rotary Foundation has a unique funding cycle that utilizes contributions for programs three years after they are received. The three-year cycle gives districts time for program planning and participant selections, and allows The Rotary Foundation to invest the contributions. The earnings from those investments help pay for the Foundation's administration, program operations and fund development costs.

At the end of the three-year period – say in 2021-22, ½ of district's contribution made in Rotary year 2018 – 19 is returned to the district for district projects while the other half is placed in the World Fund which is used to match project expenses and support the fight to eradicate polio.

This approach of using donations wisely has won a four-star rating from Charity Navigator for many years.


LABOR DAY PARADE

ROCK ISLAND ROTARY CLUB WHY DO WE HAVE FUNDRAISERS? RUTH'S PERSPECTIVE - August 2018

It has become apparent to me that the answer to that question might be very different depending upon whom I ask. Some say fundraisers allow us to have funds to support the many service projects our club undertakes every year. Some might respond that fundraisers are meant to foster friendships and interactions among club members. Some might even say that the purpose is to provide us a way to involve our families and friends in Rotary activities. Further, we might have fundraisers to raise awareness in our community about Rotary and the importance of Rotary clubs. From experience, I can certainly say that some Rotarians believe we have fundraisers simply to annoy them or "guilt" them into contributing (I can also say that there are some who don't even succumb to the guilt prod, and I'm pretty good at that!).

Ever since the pork sandwich fundraiser went away years ago, we have been searching for a way to raise a significant amount of funds without unduly burdening the people who plan and carry out the fundraiser. I can say that the pork sandwich fundraiser did indeed promote lasting friendships, give members a great sense of accomplishment, take a lot of planning and work, and raise funds.

When I first heard from a dear Rotary friend in another area about the very successful annual wine raffle in which she is involved, I immediately thought, "What a great idea!" It doesn't have a lot of overhead - printing the tickets, and covering the cost of the prizes. It doesn't take hundreds of hours of volunteer labor to plan and carry out. It can be a fun way to talk to others about Rotary and what we do. For some, the best part is that if, for example, a person takes five (5) packs of five (5) tickets each and sells them for a total of \$100.00, the seller (Rotarian) can contribute mightily to our success and not even spend a dime out of his/her own pocket. It's like Tom Sawyer recruiting others to paint the fence! Now, I do hope all our members will participate personally; I'm just saying that you don't have to.

How can we make our Wine Raffle successful?

- 1. Establish a personal goal to sell at least \$100 in tickets (5 packs of 5).
- 2. Talk to non-Rotarians that you know work, colleagues, friends, family, neighbors, fellow poker players, book club members, etc.
- 3. Recruit a family member(s), to assist you. Spouses and significant others know people, too!
