Commons. WaterMark Corners & Stationers is an upscale gift store, full-service stationery store and a children's bookstore and toy store all in one. WaterMark is located in three historic buildings in downtown Moline Centre on the John Deere Commons. It is family-owned and run by a mother-daughter team, Barbara Trimble and Amy Their gift department offers a wide range of items, from gourmet foods and coffees, to seasonal decorations, and unique and affordable jewelry and accessories. The children's area specializes in quality children's books, games and toys for children of all ages. The stationery department features the area's largest selection of paper and invitations, and is the Quad Cities' source for many premium stationery brands including Crane & Co., William Arthur and Caspari. They offer custom printing on boxed invitations, note sets or blank card stock, and the WaterMark wedding department showcases wedding invitations and accessories which are custom designed and printed in house. Trimble said th, "The goal is to provide customers with a completely unique shopping experience. Our talented staff members are dedicated to helping each customer find the perfect item, whatever their needs may be. We strive to find merchandise that you won't find at other local shops, and are constantly searching for new lines to introduce to our store." The story of WaterMark began in 1998, when Amy graduated from the University of Illinois with a not-very-useful degree in Art History and a dream of owning her own bookstore. Her family had two other retail businesses at the time, Staack Florist and Wilson House Stationers, and were excited at the idea of expanding into a new area of retail. Their search for the perfect location brought them to the John Deere Commons, with the newly opened MARK of the Quad Cities (now the TaxSlayer Center), the John Deere Pavilion and the Radisson on John Deere Commons. The energy of the development in this area immediately captured Trimble's attention, and before long, they purchased the buildings on the corner of River Drive and 15th Street. The buildings were not ready to be occupied, however. They had been unoccupied and abandoned for years, and it took a full year of extensive renovation before WaterMark could open. WaterMark Corners officially opened on September 15, 1999, and according to Trimble it's been a whirlwind of fun ever since! They are constantly moving and changing various aspects of the store to make it new and exciting for customers. In 2001 they dramatically increased their jewelry and accessory department with great success. In 2004, they made the decision to merge our sister store, Wilson House Stationers (named after Moline's oldest house in which it was located for 9 years) into WaterMark. They reconfigured the store, and the newly renamed WaterMark Stationers took over the second floor loft area. The move proved so successful that only a year and a half later, they moved the stationery department to the more accessible first floor. In 2006, WaterMark expanded the custom invitation offerings and added what they call the "Wall of Paper," which showcases over 20 colors of papers and envelopes in over 15 sizes and shapes. In 2007, the bridal and gift registry department opened with several new lines such as Casafina Stoneware and Mariposa. In December of 2017 in recognition of its innovative social-media marketing, Moline's WaterMark Corners has been chosen one of five businesses nationwide to win the first Forbes Main Street Award. The Forbes awards were designed "to champion the positive impact of small businesses that are leading the way forward by taking big steps for both their businesses and their communities," according to a release from Forbes. Foundation Minute

We're so close to eradicating polio. But to fully eradicate this deplorable disease we still need \$1.5 billion to finish the job. Why? Even if the last case of polio is identified this year, a huge amount of work will remain to ensure that it stays "GONE", which means vaccinating children for at least three more years. To ensure that polio is truly eradicated forever it must be detected. This requires continuous surveillance that is complicated and costly: first doctors and community health workers must monitor children for acute flaccid paralysis and second is the process that involves local authorities collecting samples from sewage systems or in places that don't have adequate sanitation facilities, including rivers or bodies of water near a large group of residents.

In addition, large scale vaccinations are enormous undertakings that require money as well as thousands of volunteers on the ground. And in places where the vaccination programs have been successful, the challenge is to locate and vaccinate that small percentage of children who have been missed. The vaccine itself isn't the biggest expense, it's the distribution of the vaccine - i.e. transportation and staffing. A vaccination campaign is almost mind-bogglingly complex. Rotarians' contributions pay for planning by technical experts, large-scale communication efforts to make people aware of the benefits of vaccinations and the dates of the campaign, plus support for volunteers to go door-to-door in large cities as well as in remote areas that may not appear on any map.

Yes, we are 99.9% there. Now is the hardest part and with your help our goal to eradicate polio will be accomplished and celebrated. Thank you for your support.

IN THE "SPOTLIGHT"



Dr. Bud Phillis stepped into the spotlight today and told us of his decision at age 12 to become a physician, inspired by the untimely death of his 14-year-old sister at the hands of polio. He received his degree from the University of Illinois – Chicago and interned in St Louis. Fortunately for our community and our Rotary Club he and his bride, Diane, settled in Rock Island where he practiced internal medicine for 36 years. He and two colleagues were responsible for founding Medical Arts Associates and recruiting many of the first medical specialists to the Quad Cities. Bud noted that in his career he saw incredible innovations in medical imaging and medications. Since retiring in 2000 Bud has devoted his life to service and has led the Rotary campaign to stamp out Polio. He is a Paul Harris Society member and serves as our club's Foundation Committee Chairman.

WORTH ANOTHER LOOK

The following was taken from the most recent Rotary International's Annual Report:

The hands of a clock, as they mark the end of each day, continue to sweep without slowing. So too does the work of Rotary continue on as we mark the end of each Rotary year.

As we say farewell to the milestone year behind us, we know that we marked its end not by pausing in our work — but by redoubling it.

One hundred years have passed since our Rotary Foundation was established. In 1917, Rotary, barely a dozen years from its founding, was still small, but growing rapidly.

The idea of a foundation did not earn unanimous approval, yet in the end, it gained enough support to become a reality. The first donation was received, and more followed. With that, our organization turned off one path and onto another — onto the path that has led us to where we are today, with an organization that is large enough, and strong enough, to change the world forever.

As of this writing, we have seen only a handful of cases of polio caused by wild poliovirus in all of 2017. At our Foundation centennial celebration at the Rotary Convention in Atlanta, \$1.2 billion was pledged to end polio.

In partnership with the Global Polio Eradication Initiative partners, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, and the governments of the world, we will see the end of this disease. And when we do, we will know that it could not have happened without Rotary Serving Humanity, through our Rotary Foundation.
