all ages, races, and ethnicities. The problem is real and happening right here in the Quad Cities. Family Resources' Braking Traffik program is dedicated to ending human trafficking in Iowa and Illinois. Founded by former Iowa Senator Maggie Tinsman in 2008, the nonprofit continued to grow under the leadership of Braking Traffik's executive director, Cathy O'Keeffe. In April 2016, Braking Traffik merged with Family Resources, allowing the program to further expand services. Braking Traffik provides community outreach and education, legislative advocacy and comprehensive direct services to survivors of human trafficking in Scott, Jackson, Clinton, Muscatine and Louisa counties in Iowa, and Rock Island County in Illinois. In July of 2018 our Club obtained a \$1,500 district grant and matched those funds and made a \$3,000 donation to Breaking Traffik Quad Cities. In the fiscal year 2017 Braking Traffik survivor advocates provided on-going direct service to 39 identified survivors of human trafficking in the Quad Cities. Of those survivors, the average age of a minor was 15 years old and the average age of an adult was 34 years old. In 2018, McClain stated that 105 survivors of trafficking in the Quad Cities were served by the organization. 100 were survivors of sex trafficking and 5 were labor trafficking survivors. age of the survivors was 13. Ninety were females and fifteen were males. In addition to direct service, survivor advocates also conduct a weekly support group called S.T.O.R.M. (Survivors of Trafficking Overcoming Relationship Manipulation) for women in the Scott County Jail and for residents of the Family Resources shelter. Psycho-Educational groups are also conducted monthly to youth in the Residential Treatment Programs at Family Resources and at the Scott County Juvenile Detention Center. Braking Traffik has conducted training to thousands of professionals and community members including law enforcement, medical personnel, school administrators and other agencies across the region. More than 5,500 Iowa and Illinois students, parents and teachers have gone through Braking Traffik's curriculum, "Any Kid, Anywhere." The school program is presented to middle and high school students to teach them about the definitions and signs of trafficking, risk reduction, and how to end the demand. The program includes the viewing of Braking Traffik's award-winning documentary "Any Kid, Anywhere: Sex Trafficking Survivor Stories," featuring three Iowa survivors of human trafficking. The documentary is used across the nation in training and awareness initiatives. Furthermore, Braking Traffik also provides training to hotel and motel staff through the "Hotel/Motel Project" to raise awareness of the signs of trafficking and how staff can identify and respond to suspected incidences of human trafficking. Legislatively, Braking Traffik works endlessly to strengthen Illinois, Iowa, and federal laws on human trafficking to provide justice for survivors.

FOUNDATION MINUTE

Go Organics aims to improve productivity and sustainability for farmers who cultivate less than five acres of crops, based on the belief that creating economic stability for small farmers will help cultivate peace. It works to improve the marketplace for these farmers and to provide simple and cost-effective technologies that helps improve operations. It offers farmers through microfinancing an affordable cold storage unit that will keep crops fresh up to ten days longer thus opening market opportunities. Go Organics also guarantees the sale of a certain amount of their produce. It introduced technologies to dry produce properly, to package them safely and to prevent the growth of mold.

The mission of Go Organics is to channel the work to those who are in need and to bring these people into the workforce. Small farms produce around 80% of the world's food and make up 90% of the world's 570 million farms. Leung says, "If we can raise their standard of living – its sustainability – we're going to make a lot of changes the whole world – it's going to be amazing."

ROCK ISLAND ROTARY COMMITS CLUB FOUNDATION FUNDS TO SPRING FORWARD

The Rock Island Rotary Club Board of Directors approved donating \$9,100 in local club foundation funds to Spring Forward to assist in the purchase of a 15-passenger van which will be used to provide transportation for over 500 children and 30 adults annually. It will support transportation for children to summer camps; taking children home from afternoon after-school programs; taking immigrants and refugees to and from morning family literacy programs; and will transport children from all programs for field trips. Our Name and Rotary Logo will be displayed on the back door of the van. Additional funds needed for the van purchase will come from a loan provided by

the Day Foundation. Our Club Foundation directors also recommend that next years' Foundation disbursement (anticipated to be approximately \$9,700) also be donated to Spring Forward to be used to repay the Day Foundation loan. Final action on that step will be dependent on a vote of next years' Club Board of Directors. An anticipated \$2,400 District grant will also be applied to the van purchase.

[Trafficking cont. from page 1] Due to Braking Traffik's statewide anti-trafficking efforts in Iowa and Illinois, they were awarded the 2016 FBI Director's Community Leadership Award. This award recognizes Braking Traffik for their strong community partnerships and coordinated efforts made among social service providers, medical personnel, law enforcement, and faith-based groups to ensure survivors of sex and labor trafficking receive the care they need. Through awareness and education, communities locally and across the country, can better identify the problem and assist survivors. McClain stated that trafficking is typically done by a person known to the survivor and begins with recruiting, followed by gaining trust and love, and then moves into exploitation. Risk factors are poverty, history of abuse, run aways, and immigrants. Seventy percent of trafficking begins with online contact. 60% of the survivors had previous child welfare service contact. Our donation of funds for supplies was greatly appreciated! We appreciate the work done by Braking Traffik and for keeping us up to date on the issue.
