a descendent of a 16th Century Finnish Warlord (who was quickly captured

and executed), Kevin then took us on an American History adventure beginning in 1768 when Shawnee Indians witnessed a bright comet over what is now Xenia, Ohio. In Shawnee a comet was dubbed a "panther". Born that night, a male Shawnee baby was named "Child of Panther" which in the Shawnee language was "Tecumseh"/ This

baby would grow to be a warrior and chief, who became the primary leader of a large, multitribal confederacy in the early 19th century. Tecumseh's childhood was typical of the warlike and migratory Shawnee tribe. He participated in his first raid at age 9½ and by age 10 was an accomplished warrior with a collection of scalps. By age 11 he learned from his older brother, how to drink and soon became an alcoholic. He learned to speak, read, and write English from two white captive girls, agreeing in return to teach them Shawnee. By age 13 Tecumseh had participated in so many raids and battles that he took an oath to never again torture or kill prisoners. Using just his bow and arrows, Tecumseh participated in a deer hunting contest and brought in 30 hides in just 3 days. At age 18 in an alcoholic induced fete of bravery (or stupidity) he jumped on the back of a charging buffalo and tried to kill it using only his knife. When the buffalo suddenly stopped, Tecumseh went flying and ended up with a broken hip. From that day forward he swore off alcohol. Tecumseh spent much



of his life with his younger brother, Tenskwatawa ("The Prophet"). The first major battle he fought in was in 1791in the Battle of the Wabash. An alliance of Miamis, Shawnees, Delawares and Potawatomis numbering over 1,400 faced a force of about 1,000 Americans led by General Arthur St. Clair. Of the 1,000 officers and men that St. Clair led into battle, only 24 escaped unharmed. It is considered the largest victory ever won by native Americans. Tecumseh also participated in the 1794 Battle of the Fallen Timbers in which an American army of 4,400 routed the 2,000 warrior Indian force. In this battle William Henry Harrison became Tecumseh's nemesis. Tecumseh left his village placing his brother "The Profit', in charge with instruction not to engage the Americans under any circumstance. He was told to evacuate the village, known at Prophetstown, if attacked. Tecumseh undertook travel throughout the country in an attempt to unite all the tribe into one native American force with the goal of driving the whites east of the Mississippi for all time. Harrison learned that Tecumseh was away and attacked Prophetstown. The profit disobeyed orders and fought when Harrison's forces attacked, and his force of 300 Indians was easily defeated by the American force of 1,400 in what was to become known as the Battle of Tippecanoe. Upon his return Tecumseh banished his brother and formed an alliance with the British to fight the Americans in the War of 1812. He participated in the British victory at the Siege of Detroit and was credited with stopping the killing and torture of American prisoners after the Siege of Fort Meigs. Tecumseh was killed participating in the Battle of the Thames when American forces attacked and defeated the British and Indians on October 5, 1813. Throughout his life Tecumseh had an uncanny ability to predict comets, earthquakes and other natural events, including his own death. His brother the "Profit" took credit for many accurate predictions passed to him by Tecumseh. Thanks Kevin for another chapter of American history and our heritage!
