

Inclusion took the podium. Ms. Fontaine, an applicant for membership in our club will be rescheduled for an upcoming date. Dr. Smith has worked

in higher education for nearly 20 years. Her most recent accomplishments including establishing employee and student diversity advisory councils, working with enrollment management to increase scholarships to eligible students, and delivering diversity awareness training and educational programs throughout the college while serving as the chief diversity officer in the Office for Diversity and Inclusion at Elizabethtown College in Elizabethtown, Pa.. She also has taught both undergraduate and graduate classes at Eastern University in St. Davids, Pennsylvania, and the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia. She has a doctorate and master's in social work from the University of Pennsylvania. She also received a Certificate of Achievement, National Association of Diversity Officers in Higher Education, Standards of Professional Practice Institute. Over the course of the past 10 years, the number of enrolled students of color at Augustana has increased from roughly 200 to nearly 600. And in the last year, the number of international students grew to 195. After significant progress in growing the number of students of color and developing many campus initiatives to support diversity, the hire of Dr. Smith reinforces Augustana's commitment to creating an inclusive environment for all students. Doctor Smith explained the aspects of her position by defining each term. She defined "diversity" simply as "Human Differences". She stated that our country has a set of norms and anything that differs from the norms is considered diverse. She defined "Equity" by pointing out how it differs from "Equality". Equality implies that everyone gets or is treat the same. Equity differs in that its central goal is fairness. She showed a cartoon showing three people trying to look over a fence. One was tall, one was medium, and one was short. Equality gave each a small box to stand on. The tall person could easily see over the fence. The medium height person had to strain to barely see over the fence. The short person still could not see at all. Equity gave each person a different sized box based on their needs. The tall person got a small box. The medium person got a larger box, and the short person received a much larger box. The result was that all three were raised to a height where each could see over the wall. Dr. Smith defined "Inclusion" by saying, Equity equals being invited to the



party. Inclusion equals being asked to dance. Put into more real-life terms she stated that in a group or committee setting, diversity would be recognizing that the group is made up of persons of various backgrounds, races, genders, etc. Equity is the fair treatment, access, opportunity, and advancement for all people, while at the same time striving to identify and eliminate barriers that have prevented the full participation of some groups.. Inclusion is the act of creating environments in which any individual or group can be and feel welcomed, respected, supported, and valued to fully participate. She stated that the best decisions are those coming from a diverse group in which equity and inclusion exists.

SAM WRAY – ROTARIAN

Rock Island Rotary lost one of our finest with the passing of Sam Wray on March 27th. Sam joined our Club in 1975, served as Assistant Sergeant at Arms, supported all of our activities and causes, and along with his lifelong sweetheart Hilde, co-founded our Kenya Water Filter Project, donating \$40,000 to the cause over the past three years. Their contributions alone have provided safe drinking water for nearly 8,000 children. He will be deeply missed.



FOUNDATION MINUTE

In Eastern Ukraine, thousands have died, and millions have been displaced by the fighting between pro-Russian rebels and the Ukrainian military. Children, many of whom have lost a parent or sibling, are among those affected by the violence, often suffering deep emotional scars. When the conflict in Ukraine began in early 2014, Rotary members throughout Poland stepped up to help. Working with Rotary's Poland-Ukraine Intercountry Committee, (Poland, Ukraine, Sweden and Slovakia.) Rotarians began an annual two-week camp that allows kids to enjoy games, field trips, and outdoor activities while receiving support from mental health professionals. It's a peaceful place where they can begin to heal from the trauma of war.

Children who experience violence can be prone to violent behavior themselves. This camp shows them a different path.

More than 100 children have attended over the past four years. At first, some endure sleepless nights or nightmares. A few withdraw and emotionally shut down. But over the two weeks, many relax, learn coping strategies, build connections to others with similar experiences and, perhaps most important, rediscover how to be kids again.

- 2. Click on **MY ROTARY**
- 3. Click on **SIGN IN TO MY ROTARY** (If you haven't established an "account" do that first by clicking on REGISTER FOR AN ACCOUNT and create your account (no cost or credit card is requested), then sign in to MY ROTARY
- 4. Click on MY PROFILE (this is where you can update personal information)
- 5. Click on **DONOR HISTORY REPORT**
- 6. Under "Individual Reports" click again on **DONOR HISTORY REPORT**
- 7. You will then see an "OVERVIEW" of all your donations to Rotary International Click on the **TRANSACTION DETAIL**" tab at the bottom of the page and you will see each of your donations listed by date and amount. You will also see how your donations have been applied for Paul Harris Fellow recognition.

JAMES BENSON STEPS INTO THE SPOTLIGHT!

This week's Rotarian in the Spotlight was James Benson who joined our Club in 2015. James is Pastor of Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church in



James was born and raised in Pittsburgh and as such is a Pirate fan. He was educated at Baldwin Wallace College (now University) in Berea, Ohio. He received his degree in English with a minor in music. James is married to Katie, who is director of the Rock Island High School Orchestra. They have two children attending Jordan Elementary School. James is currently work on his Doctorate which he hopes to finish in the next couple of years. James noted that Good Shephard has a strong emphasis on missions. The congregation of over 150 takes annual mission trips with anywhere from 6 to over 25 church members going. James told of traveling last year to Chavies, Kentucky with the Appalachia Service Project to help renovate homes for the poor. Work included digging out and pouring a foundation under an existing home to prevent it from sliding into the hollow.

Community Grants Chairman, Frank Lambert had the pleasure of presenting a \$400 donation from Rock Island Rotary to Sara Cross, Executive Director of First Tee of the Quad Cities. Sara noted that the goal of the project is to teach youngsters the lessons learned from the game of golf by using the sport as a way to involve and reach kids. According to Cross, golf teaches discipline, sportsmanship, honesty, ethics, commitment, and value of work. To ensure the program reaches children from all areas of the community our contribution will be used to help children from the Martin Luther King Center and from the Boys Club and Girls Club participate in the program free of charge. The total program consists of an 8-week session including classroom work and golf play at the new First Tee facility built at Rock Island's Highland Springs Golf Course.

Dr. Wendy Wintersteen became the 16th president of Iowa State University in 2017, following a nationwide search and unanimous vote of the Board of Regents, State of Iowa. She is the first woman president in Iowa State history. And she's only the second ISU graduate to hold the university's highest office.


Dr. Wintersteen has served Iowa State for 40 years in several capacities, including as one of the first female ISU Extension associates in integrat -ed pest management. She served 11 years as dean of the internation-

ally recognized College of Agriculture and Life Sciences and director of the Iowa Agriculture and Home Economics Experiment Station, and she held the university's first endowed deanship.

She earned a Bachelor of Science degree in crop production from Kansas State University and a Ph.D. in entomology from Iowa State.

As president, and with the support of her administrative team, Dr. Wintersteen is advancing lowa State University with priorities focused on enhancing student success; recruiting and retaining excellent faculty and staff; strengthening innovation and research excellence; developing a culture of entrepreneurship; making lowa State a leader in creating a welcoming and inclusive campus environment; and growing state and private support for the university, its faculty, staff, and students. Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) 701/2 or Older

If you are 70½ or older, you may be subject to the "Required Minimum Distribution (RMD)." This IRS rule requires those with assets in a 401(k), 403(b), IRA or other tax deferred fund to withdraw at least a minimum amount of these funds each year as taxable income.

Possibly, you have more assets than you need for living expenses. You could consider making a charitable gift to the Rock Island Rotary Foundation, the Rotary International Foundation, or our Rotary Club Water Project.. For those 70½ or older, you can make a tax-free qualified charitable distribution (QCD) directly by the trustee of your IRA. This QCD will count towards your required minimum distribution. With the higher standard deduction in place, it may be of more benefit to make charitable deductions directly from your IRA in the form of a QCD to help lower your taxable income. We strongly recommend you seek the advice of your financial planner or tax professional for full information.

The following three pages are designed to will help you with contributions to the Rotary Foundation. If you prefer to make your distribution to our Rock Island Club Foundation or to our Club's Water Project, we can provide similar forms for that purpose. All three are 501c3 charities and qualify for tax-free direct distribution..
