BERT BLOOD **SCHOLARSHIPS**

Today, in memory of Rock Island Rotarian, Bert Blood, our club presented scholarships and heard presentations from an area 4-H high school student and a former 4-H member now attending Augustana College. Albert M. "Bert" Blood, was

born in 1870 on a farm near Cambridge, Illinois, graduated from Iowa's Cornell college and then the University of Chicago. Professionally, Bert

was Superintendent of Schools in Tiskilwa and Park Ridge, Illinois for 17 years, and served as President of the Cook County Teachers Association and as Secretary of the Educational Council of Cook County. In 1917, he opened the A.M. Blood Co., a school supply business in Rock Island. He became a Rock Island Rotary Club member in 1920 and served as our club's honorary president during 1969-70. Bert chaired the agricultural committee of the Rock Island Chamber of Commerce. Although an urban businessman, Bert never lost touch with his rural roots. He organized our club's annual Rural/Urban program up to his death, at age 101 in 1972. Bert not only challenging 4-H students to academic excellence, but also worked to ensure that Rock Island Rotary kept in touch with our dependence on rural production and supply. To honor his 101 years of life and preserve his rural legacy, our Club established a \$101 memorial scholarship in 1973 awarded annually to a college bound high school student who, in the eyes of our club's judges, presented the best 4-H project. As tuition costs increased and with the help of Rock Island County's 4-H Foundation, the program was expanded, and funding increased. Today we presented a \$1,500 scholarship to Sarah Saddoris, a student at Riverdale High School and member of The Buccaneers 4-H Club. Sarah plans to attend Fontbonne University in St. Louis majoring in Elementary Education. We also presented a \$500 scholarship to Maya Chavez a former 4-H member now attending Augustana College majoring in International Business; and a \$500 scholarship to Brittany Olson, a sophomore at Kirkwood Community College, Cedar Rapids majoring in Animal Science. Brittany plans to transfer to Iowa State University next year. The program began with Jenny Garner, County Director, University of Illinois Extension, Milan Office providing a quick update on the Extension Service. Her comments are detailed on page 3. Two student presentations were made. The first by Sarah Saddoris who reviewed her active high school life at Riverdale High School. She worked on the Homecoming committee all four years, participated in the Dress Up Days designed to build school spirit. She was a 4 year member of the golf team and captain her senior year, a 3 year member of the softball team, 4 year member of the basketball team, and 1 year member of the track team. She noted that each activity helped develop her leadership shills. She is active in FFA, attending state and national conventions and was an AG Day presenter. She is President of her 4-H Club and previously held virtually every other office. She has frequently spoken on, "What 4-H Has Done for Me". She also has shown animals including calves, pigs, and horses. Sarah says the most important lesson all of this has taughe he is, "Don't procrastinate!" Our second student speaker was Maya Chavez, a first year student at Augustana College. She spoke on the impact 4-H has had on her life. She noted that credits earned in high school allowed her to finish the Freshman year at Augie in half a year and she is now a sophomore in her second semester of college. She said 4-H was a huge influence in her life. She joined 4-H in 5th grade and remained active through high school. She got invoved in "Teens As Teachers" and the "Teen Hunger Program", organizing and leading fundraisers. She also has served as a 4-H Ambassador to the Illinois Legislature and worked with Senator Neal Anderson's office. She said 4-H taugh her self discipline, organizational and communication skills. She speaks Chinese and is learing Japanese and Korean. She is looking forward to studying in Japan and China as part of her college career. Our third scholarship recipient, Brittany Olson, is currently away at college and was unable to attend today. Her scholarship documents will be sent to her. UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS EXTENSION, MILAN OFFICE



Jenny Garner, County Director, University of Illinois Extension, Milan Office provided an update on Extension programs. The Illinois Nutrition Education Programs (INEP) provides nutrition education to individuals and families in communities around the state of Illinois. Healthy choices are not always the easy choices, especially on a limited budget. This is why the program focus is on reaching participants where they are in their own communities. Through nutrition and cooking classes, interactive displays, and online resources, knowledge is provided, and they teach the skills necessary to help them make healthier meals, spend their food budgets effectively, and make healthy living a natural part of their day. Garner noted that 15,000 residents of our area are under nourished. She also reported that 4-H impact now reaches 19,000 youth in our area.

FOUNDATION MINUTE

In response to emergency relief, The Rotary Foundation recently established a new support fund to receive contributions for disasters that strike around the world. Entitled the Rotary Disaster Response Fund, staff in Programs and Grants will reach out to the affected areas and their districts to assess the need and desire for funding. Upon a qualified response - much like a district grant - the affected district will be awarded funding in increments of up to \$25,000, consulting the TRF chair as needed. Only districts in the affected country may request a grant. These districts can apply for more than one grant and should some of the allocation not be used – the funds will be returned to the Disaster Fund. Should requests exceed available funds, the General Secretary of RI will triage requests until additional funds are available.

(The fund will accept DDF contributions and those in cash will be credited towards a club's Annual Giving Goal and per capita giving calculations. However, the donations will NOT apply to SHARE or the DDF calculation.)

ROCK ISLAND ROTARY SUPPORTS TO ROYAL FAMILY KIDS



Community Grants Committee chairman, Frank Lambert presented a \$500 check to Wendy Bezotte of Royal Family Kids. The motto of Royal Family Kids is "Confronting Abuse. Changing Lives. Transforming Communities". Bezotte is Executive Director of the Quad Cities Chapter of RFK. Each summer Royal Family Kids provides a week long summer camp for abused children ages 6-12, who, for their own protection have been moved into the Foster Care system. Campers are royalty! During camp week, each camper can expect to be treated like a king or a queen. The children have many activity options, including frequent swimming, various sports, fishing, crafts, a royal tea party, and various evening activities, which include drama, singing, and getting to show their talents in the annual Spotlight Night. All are designed to be successful confidence building experiences.

Royal Family Kids provides a "family" environment with "Aunts & Uncles" and "Grandmas & Grandpas". Bezotte says their volunteers love serving at camp and span from age 16 all the way up to 70! All receive extensive training in working with children who have backgrounds of abuse and neglect and are background checked. The camp's goal is to treat these children like "Royalty", encourage self-esteem and self-worth, and to let them know that people do care and want to help. Our donation of \$500 will be used to provide two tee shirts for each camper who will also receive a photo album of their experiences at camp and a duffle bag for taking home their gifts and apparel.
