engages diverse teenagers to work on a film set. Mentored by pros & college students, teens collaborate as they rotate through all film positions gaining significant confidence, tech skills and 21st century skills (leadership, teamwork, problem solving). The resulting EMMY quality films and shows are released in theatres, on DVD, online, on TV, at schools and internationally with funds from distribution reinvested to support more youth programming. Students call Fresh Films "AWESOME" "SO COOL" and "BEST WEEK EVER"! But at it's core, Fresh Films is an experiential learning experience that develops creative problem solvers, hard-workers, team players and digitally-adept leaders all through the fun and relevancy of film. And with hundreds of STEAM careers in the \$650 billion dollar media industry, Fresh Films is an opportunity to transform how youth think of science, technology and their future. In 2016 Fresh Films, a working film studio relocated from Chicago to Augustana. Fresh Films travels to cities around the country to film episodes of its popular kids' science show, Detectives Club. In each city, local teenagers work on-set and alongside professionals to learn the skills of filmmaking. Augustana students work with the teenagers and professional crew as paid interns. In it's first year at Augustana, Fresh Films hired 13 Augustana interns who worked in several positions, some based on campus and others on location and on the road with the crew. Ms. Feigley showed two videos demonstrating the work Fresh Films produces. One was a "teaser" for an upcoming PBS documentary made by Fresh Films titled "I AM ABLE". It chronicles several "diabled" youth and illustrates how with proper nurture and professional leadership those often considered "disabled" are very able to achieve and be successful. The second video was a brief look at a documentary about Gi Gi's Play House. Fresh Films is based at Augustana, but in addition to the Quad Cities also films in Chicago, Minneapolis and New Jersey. Their goal is to inspire teens, expose them to career opportunities, and teach technical skills. They view their producation studio as a training ground for junior high, high school and college students. Fresh Films uses the fun of film to connect with teens to build their technical skills as well as their ability to problem solve, work-hard, communicate and be a leader. Feigley stated that 53% of their participants are female and 55% are youth of color. Teens do not need previous experience, and the program is free. Program partners include the Creative Arts Academy and Boys & Girls Clubs of the Mississippi Valley. Kelli's enthusiasm was evident in this fast paced and very interesting presentation. What a great opportunity for area kids!

FRANK LAMBERT IN THE SPOTLIGHT

Frank Lambert was our featured Rotarian at today's meeting. Frank joined our club in 1985 and has served two terms as our club president. He has served on many club committees and is our current Community Grants Committee chairman. Frank was born in Eliza, Illinois and spent his youth living and working on the family farm, which was homesteaded by his Great, Great Grandfather in 1847. His mother was a teacher for over 40 years, and his father, with the exception of 4 years during World War II when he served as an aviation mechanic, farmed. FOUNDATION MINUTE

Rotary International is a global organization that operates in nearly every country in the world and deals in twenty-nine (29) currencies. Rotary takes stewardship of its funds very seriously. Money is spent on life-changing, sustainable grants, as well as programs and services that support its members' transformative work. Three billion dollars have been invested in thousands of projects over the past 100 years.

Rotary International is a member organization and is overseen by its Board of Directors. As a separate part of RI, the Rotary Foundation is organized as a public charity operating exclusively for charitable purposes and is governed by a Board of Trustees. RI and TRF are both tax-exempt organizations. (The former is new for RI)

The headquarters of Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation are in Evanston, Illinois, USA. There are associate foundations in Australia, Brazil, Canada, German, India, Japan and the United Kingdom.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO OUR CLUB BY-LAWS

Since adding corporate memberships wherein one representative is named "primary member" and others "alternate" members a few questions have arisen. Rotary International has us list only the primary member on their official roster of members. Alternate members have all benefits of participating in club activities and projects, but other aspects of their membership are limited by International rules. Our corporate membership program has been very successful and popular. We've gained a number of outstanding colleagues and many have become quite active in our club. Therefore, to provide an understandable path for alternate members to become Club officers, and to gain full International privileges, the following amendment to Article 13, Section 2 of our By-laws has been recommended by our Board.:

An alternate member may elect to pay, either personally or through the corporate sponsor, the cost of district and Rotary International dues, and by doing so will be recognized as an International Rotary member. This includes establishment of a My Rotary account and recognition of foundation contributions. In order to hold Club office, an alternate member may convert to an individual active membership by paying the International, District, and Club dues.

Changing the club bylaws requires sending written notice to each member 10 days before the meeting, having a quorum present for the vote, and having two-thirds of the votes support the change. This is our official notice to members.


