Our program today featured our lovely youth exchange daughter from Chile, Ricio ("Chio") Robolledo. Chile is a long, narrow country stretching along South America's western edge, with more than 6,000km of Pacific Ocean coastline. Santiago, its capital, sits in a valley surrounded by the Andes and Chilean Coast Range mountains. The Easter Islands, a famed archaeological site, including nearly 900 monumental statues called moai, created by inhabitants during the 13th–16th centuries is a Chilean territory. The moai are carved human figures with oversize heads, often

resting on massive stone pedestals called ahus. Chio presented a colorful slide tour of her home country, her family, and her year in Rock Island. She noted that the population of Chile is approximately 19 million and that the country has an average width of just over 120 miles. Growing up in Chile, Chio attended the same school from 1st grade through high school graduation. In total there were over 2,500 students. She also noted that Chile does not give credit for her year of school in the United States so she will be returning to another years as a senior in her school. He future plans are to return to the US for college with hopes to become an architect and settle permanently in our country. She also mentioned that in Chile the news portrays America as a racist society and she said she is eager to return home and let everyone know that the image is untrue. She found Americans to be loving, helpful, and kind, leading to her desire to ultimately live here. Chio said her hobbies were primarily athletic with track and field at the top of her list (she ran hurdles and pole vaulted), followed by volleyball, and going to the beach. In Chile she lives with her mother, father, and an older brother and sister. Her slides showed all areas of Chile from the moai on Easter Island, to the Andes mountains, the dryest desert in the world, beautiful lakes, and fields of desert flowers. Speaking of her year in Rock Island she said she loved her year at Rocky and made many close friends in classes and on the track team. She gave great praise and thanks to her three host families; Tom and Sue Hammar, Bob & Kathy Lelonek, and Bob and Sue Cassatt. She also had many kind words for Rocky Assistant Principal, Karla Thies, who she said became her "best friend" at Rocky. Chio was an absolutely delightful exchange daughter and we will greatly miss her. Her year winds down with a west coast trip (our members donated \$228 to her trip spending money). She will also attend the Central States Rotary Summer Conference in Grand Rapids.

FOUNDATION MINUTE

Rotary makes high-quality health care available to vulnerable mothers and children, so they can live longer and grow stronger. Rotarians work to access quality care, so mothers and children everywhere can have the same opportunities for a healthy future. An estimated 5.9 million children under the age of five die each year because of malnutrition, inadequate health care and poor sanitation – all of which can be prevented.

Haiti has the highest maternal and infant mortality rate of any country in the western hemisphere. Rotary provided a fully equipped medical jeep to volunteers and midwives to reach mothers and children in remote areas.

In Chennai, India, where there is a high mortality rate of women with breast and cervical cancer due to a late diagnosis, Rotarians provided a mobile cancer screening unit and awareness training.

And in Nigeria, Rotary members launched a \$3 million, five -year pilot program to save the lives of mothers and children during home deliveries. Since 2005, they've also repaired 1,500 obstetric fistulas restoring dignity and hope to vulnerable mothers.

HAVE YOU MADE YOUR BIRDIES PLEDGE?



Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 30 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.

As a founding partner of the <u>Global Polio Eradication Initiative</u>, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

We've helped immunize more than 2.5 billion children in 122 countries. So far, Rotary has contributed more than \$1.8 billion toward eradicating the disease worldwide.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year (Reprinted from Rotary International)
