Born in Muscatine, IA, Jim DeLaCerda graduated from the University of Illinois, receiving bachelor's and master's degrees in nursing. patients at Cook County Hospital from 1984 to 1990 and was the first coordinator of the AIDS unit when it opened there in 1989. In 1990, he became nurse manager of the AIDS unit of Davies Medical Center in San Francisco. Jim moved to Rock Island in early 1993, to be close to his family and friends as he was dying from AIDS. He died in May of 1993 at the age of 46. His colleagues remembered him "as real fighter, especially for other people's rights. He wanted society to see AIDS and the people with it in a more logical and rational way. Jim DeLaCerda's legacy as an AIDS treatment advocate has been honorably fulfilled through the creation and ongoing work of the DeLaCerda House. DeLaCerda House opened the first property In 1996, to provide housing and a safe haven to those individuals diagnosed with HIV/AIDS. Currently the organization has three properties, each named for a deceased volunteer who dedicated time, labor, and money to grow the organization. Robb's House provides a community living environment for 5 individuals that are living with HIV or AIDS it is designed for persons in transition with residency limited to six months.. Steven's Place is a permanent supportive housing program for individuals that are experiencing homelessness and living with HIV or AIDS. It includes 8 one-bedroom apartments. In 2009, Longview Place was opened to address the needs of families with dependent children that are living with HIV or AIDS. This large historic home was completely remodeled to provide two separate duplexes to assist these families with receiving supportive services while living independently. Ms. Jordan noted that approximately 1.1 million people in the U.S. are living with HIV today. About 15 percent of them (1 in 7) are unaware they are infected. Of those infected with the virus, 63% received some HIV medical care, 49% were retained in continuous HIV care, and 51% had achieved viral suppression (having a very low level of the virus). A suppressed viral load protects the health of a person living with HIV, preventing disease progression. There is also a major prevention benefit. A person living with HIV who takes HIV medicine as daily prescribed and gets and stays virally suppressed can stay healthy and has effectively no risk of sexually transmitting HIV to HIV-negative partners. Those that don't seek medical help often progress to a stage 3 (AIDS) diagnosis. In 2017, 17,803 people in the U.S. were identified as suffering from AIDS. A Plan for America, announced by President Trump in his State of the Union address on February 5, 2019. is a bold approach to eliminate new HIV infections in our nation. It is built upon the following key strategies: Diagnosing all individuals with HIV as early as possible after infection; Treating HIV rapidly and effectively after diagnosis to achieve sustained viral suppression; Protecting individuals at risk for HIV using proven prevention approaches; Responding rapidly to detect and respond to growing HIV clusters and prevent new infections. The proposed initiative is designed to rapidly increase use of these strategies in the 48 counties with the highest HIV burden, as well as in Washington, D.C.; San Juan, Puerto Rico; and seven states with a disproportionate rural HIV burden. The goal is to reduce new HIV infections by 90 percent over 10 years. DeLaCerrda House is already receiving funds from the president's initiative.

ENTREPRENEURSHIP CLASS ALIVE AND WELL - BUT NEEDS HELP!

Nearly five years ago our Club voted to invest \$10,000 in a concept for a new and innovative class to be offered at Rock Island High School. Our donation along with support from other donors led to the renovation of a classroom, hiring a head teacher, obtaining special training and curricula materials, and equipping the room with necessary supplies and equipment. From all of that, the INCubator Entrepreneur Program was launched. The program has been highly successful and is a model for many other schools in Illinois and Iowa. Participants in the class have won numerous local, state, and national honors, including the national championship for best business concept. A big part of the program is having mentors and coaches to work with the students. Several Rotarians have participated but more are needed. The commitment is anywhere from one contact with a student team per week, to just three teaching sessions of with materials provided. You would teach two 50-minute classes for three days in an area of your own expertise. Anyone interested in helping should contact Monta Ponsetto or Trish Matson, the program teacher. Sarah Cross has agreed to be our liaison with Rock Island High School and the program.




