Dr. Christopher Peters – Better Angels

Dr. Christopher Peters is a surgeon in Coralville, the owner of Corridor Vein Center, and a member of the lowa City Rotary. He's also a former political candidate and now serves as the state coordinator for Better Angels. Better Angels is a national group which formed after the 2016 election with a



mission to reduce political polarization by engaging Americans at the grassroots level. As one of Rotary's primary goals is to promote peace, Chris believes the missions of Better Angels are perfectly aligned to help heal our badly divided nation. "I believe that my fellow Rotarians are particularly well suited to promote that vision, given our commitment to "The Four-Way Test". Peter's talk was titled, "Restoring Civility in Civic Discourse: Embracing our Better Angels". Better Angels is a nationwide organization that brings members

of conflicting ideologies—let's call them conservatives and liberals to keep it simple—into genuine, civil conversation. People attending these meetings learn an organized, honoring way to truly listen to each other, and the goal is to make more civil the American discussion of politics and policy. Currently there have been Better Angels workshops and debates in 34 states, Better Angels is a growing organization; as of January of 2018, there were about 48,000 members. The organization increased membership by two-thirds in seven months. The organization was spawned by the growing incivility in politics, in particular the Presidential contest between Donald Trump and Hilary Clinton and the aftermath of that election. The phrase "Better Angels" is drawn from Abraham Lincoln's first inaugural address (March 4, 1861). Lincoln hoped, vainly as it turns out, to persuade the "slave states" from seceding from the union. He concluded that speech with this plea: "We are not enemies, but friends. We must not be enemies. Though passion may have strained it must not break our bonds of affection. The mystic chords of memory, stretching from every battlefield and patriot grave to every living heart and hearthstone all over this broad land, will yet swell the chorus of the Union, when again touched, as surely they will be, by the better angels of our nature." Mr. Peters stated that periodically our nation has gone through periods of great division but has always come through it, with the exception of the Civil War, peacefully. Interestingly he felt that a significant contributor to our polarization is the decline in civic organization involvement. Traditionally people in clubs, organizations, churches, etc., met and became friends with many people including those with differing views on various subjects and issues. Now people tend to got to work, then go home and tun into television networks that tell them what they want to hear. He noted that people used to watch the news to be "informed", now they watch to be "affirmed". There is little association with people with differing views. Peters said that the purpose of Better Angels is to bring people together and encourage respectful discourse. He said they are not trying to change anyone's views, rather they urge that we listen to others respectfullly and understand that good people can differ on issues. He said that Better Angels hosts seminars that propmote courteous and respectful and discourse. Among the activities they host are Skills Workshops with an emphasis on learning to communicate. They urge people to listen attentively rather than listening for a chance to rebut what is being said. They also urge speakers to avoid putting people on the defensive by chosing words and phrases that express views without setting up an heated response. Another type of activity Better Angels host is calls a "Red - Blue Workshop. In that format they have 5-7 Blues (Democrats) and 5-7 Reds (Republicans). They than conduct structured discussions where one group talks and the other listens. They first talk about what they feel their side brings to our country. Then tiy talk about what reservations they have about their plan. After listening, they switch roles and those who were taking become the listeners and the second group then has the same discussion. The third type of workshop they host is a "Fish Bowl" workshop. Here non-political, often silly topics are pulled from a fishbowl and the participants divide into sides and debate the "issue". Sounds like fun! In conclusion, Mr. Peters encouraged forming our own Better Angels group and offered any help needed. Thanks for a neat program!

FOUNDATION MINUTE

It's heartwarming to know that The Rotary Foundation has received for the 12th consecutive year from Charity Navigator, an independent evaluator, its highest rating. Explaining the rationale for the award, the president and CEO of Navigator, Mr. Michael Thatcher, points out that the Foundation demonstrates "...both strong financial health and commitment to accountability and transparency." Not only that, Thatcher reiterates that a 4-Star evaluation testifies that The Rotary Foundation "...exceeds industry expectations and outperforms most charities..."


Two Rotary clubs recently outperformed their peers when they responded to the news of the ravaging Ebola Virus Disease (EVD). The Rotary Clubs of Monrovia, Liberia and Marlow, UK, jointly dedicated a medical oxygen plant worth \$200,000 to Eternal Love Warming Africa (ELWA) Hospital, on the outskirts of Monrovia in Paynesville. Piped to connect the hospital building, the plant will supply oxygen for surgical wards, emergency room and other treatment centers. The funds were raised through individual and corporate donations, roadside fundraising campaigns in the UK and e-mailing funds through the global Rotary Foundation.

On the same note, the Scottsdale Sunrise Rotary Club has donated medical supplies and equipment worth \$1.5 million to the districts of Nyaruguru and Huye, two of the poorest districts of Rwanda. Teaming with Project C.U.R.E (Commission on Urgent Relief and Equipment), the clubs delivered three 40-foot containers, each carrying 1000 pieces of equipment including: electrocardiogram machines, incubators, anesthesia supplies, examination tables, wheelchairs and feeding tubes.

In consonance with The Rotary Foundation's goal of alleviating poverty, The Gold Coast Lake Success Rotary Club and the Rotary Club of New Delhi, in partnership with the NIT Foundation, have announced a \$150,000 grant towards the development of a skill and career program for the youth of India. Initiated by Immediate Past District-Governor, Ravishankar Bhooplapuri, the vocational project is aimed at training immigrants in skills needed to survive in the metropolitan cities of India.

ROTARY BIRTHDAY TRADITIONS

The most exciting and great thing about Rock Island Rotary is the growing number of new members that have joined our club in just the past five years. You might be surprised to know that 38 of our current members joined in 2015 or more recently. Many have become club leaders, board members, and officers. The only downside to so many new faces is that Club traditions tend to get lost, not because new members reject them, but because the Club fails to pass the traditions on to the new generation of Rotarians. One tradition that is pretty obvious is that once a month we honor all the Rotarians that have birthdays that month. We typically do that at the first meeting of each month. You see it in our newsletter reports and our president names each Rotarian celebrating that month – the we sing. Now the rest of the tradition – 1) All of those celebrating birthdays are asked to sit at the "Birthday table" (at least until it is full), located at the front of the dining room. 2) Each Rotarian celebrating their birthday pays a \$1 fine (\$2 if their birthday falls on a Tuesday meeting day); and 3) Celebrating Rotarians are asked to participate in their birthday month's "Birthday Books" at Earl Hanson School, which is typically held on the last Thursday of each month. Participating means giving about 45 minutes to autograph and hand out books, and share a treat with the kids. So, now the information is out.
