Midwest Independent Conference Championships, In September 2017, Leslie joined the staff at TBK Bank Sports Complex in Bettendorf as the Director of Operations. In this role, she oversees multiple aspects of the facility's tournaments, leagues, corporate events, parties, and day-to-day operations. The TBK Bank Sports Complex is a 75-acre interactive complex comprised of an indoor & outdoor sports complex and a 2-story family entertainment center known as High 5 Lanes & Games. Overall there are 300,000 square feet under roof. This makes the TBK Bank Sports Complex one of the largest sports complexes in the Midwest. The Indoor Sports Complex includes an 11 vs 11 multipurpose turf field, 8 regulation size basketball/volleyball courts, 4 sand volleyball courts, Team training area, Fitness center, Physical therapy facility, Digs Bar & Grill at the beach (sand volleyball), Concessions, Retail Shop and the Main office. The Outdoor Sports Complex includes 2 lighted turf soccer fields, 10 lighted turf baseball/softball fields, 5 sand volleyball courts, Concessions, and 1571 parking spaces. The High 5 Lanes & Games adds 32 bowling lanes, 65 arcade games, 2-story laser tag, 2 Escape Rooms, a Sports bar/restaurant, and Banquet/meeting space. A unique feature is that the bowling alley is a two-story facility with 16 lanes up and 16 lanes below. In the past year a bowling league formed and is thriving in the new complex. Van Dyke said that the original mission of the facility was to provide state of the art soccer facilities for our area; however now up and running, baseball has far outdistanced soccer as the facilities most lucrative activity. She said that at a typical baseball tournament between 4,000 to 5,000 participants and spectators attend. She also said the Sports Complex primarily serves as a rental facility. Much of their revenue derives from facility rentals and hourly fees. The restaurant also provides supporting income and features original recipes by its Texas based owners. There are numerous sports clubs that have chosen to use the Complex as their home, but the clubs remain independent entities and simply rent the use of facilities and fields. As such the Clubs set their own fees and policies for their events. Some charge admission for spectators, others do not. Sports clubs exist in baseball, softball, volleyball, soccer, and various other sports. Another aspect of the Complex is its "Level II" fitness center occupying 40,000 square feet. It is essentially three facilities in one. About 1/3 of the area could be described as a Health Club with Matrix 7xi cardio equipment including treadmills, elliptical, stair climbers, rowers, stationary bikes, etc. Another 1/3 of the fitness center is Athletic Performance Sports Training with an emphasis on speed and agility. The final 1/3 can be described as a premiere athlete training facility with Custom designed Arsenal Strength, strength training equipment including pin select machines, plate loaded, cables, racks, jungles they have a full selection of accessories which include medicine balls, TRX bands, boxes, sleds, elastic bands, mats and more. Leslie noted that when construction began the area was a cornfield. Now with the Complex up and operating many other retails business including various food establishments have opened. So far over \$30 million in development surrounding the Complex has occurred. The Quad Cities is lucky to have one of the finest and largest sports facilities in the nation located just off Interstate 80 in Bettendorf...

ROTARY SUPPORTS GIRLS SCOUTS

Community Grants Committee Chairman, Frank Lambert presented a \$1,000 Rotary donation to Vice President of Development Shelly Wells Cain for the Girls Scouts of Eastern Iowa and Western Illinois. Ms. Cain noted that there is a great shortage of volunteers willing to be troop leaders and that many girls want to join but can't do to not being able to afford the \$25 fee or because no troop exists for them to join. As a result, the Girls Scouts established an Outreach Initiative that allows girls to participate without fees and brings scouting into their schools. In 2018, 5,321 girls were served through outreach initiatives with 69 schools and 32 community organizations. Our donation makes us a partner in the initiative.

Foundation Minute

For more than a century Rotarians have practiced Service Above Self and through the Avenue of Community Service, given back to the communities they live in. Through Community Service Rotary clubs have the opportunity to implement club projects that improve life in their local community. In this first week of Community Service Month, various Rotary clubs have been doing just that; improving lives in their communities.

Three Rotary clubs in Jackson, TN, have raised \$16,385 through their Rotary Heart & Sole Project to put shoes on the feet of as many as 13,000 students in the entire Jackson-Madison County School System. The clubs worked in tandem with Samaritan Feet, a nationwide initiative, which aims to inspire hope through the gift of shoes to those who need both hope and shoes the most. Students in these inner-city schools sometime share a pair of shoes between siblings. They put on shoes that are too big or too small and wear flip-flops to the gym. Ten Thousand dollars out of their funds are being used to purchase shoes for students in Andrew Jackson, Arlington Elementary and Alexander Elementary schools in the county.

The Rotary Club of Victoria, British Columbia, donated \$10,000 for the purchase of two commercial-grade washer/dryer laundry sets for **Our Place Society**, an inner-city center serving Victoria's vulnerable citizens. "No matter who we are or our personal resources, we can all relate to putting on a clean shirt or sleeping between clean sheets," said Gerald Pash, president of the club. **Our Place Society serves 1,200 meals daily**.

In much of rural Africa, communities experience loss of young mothers and their babies due to many factors. Long distance from clinics, unhygienic birthing practices, the scourge of malaria and lack of menstrual education among young girls have all contributed to dangerously high maternal mortality rates. In a remote area of Tanzania, girls drop out of school when they run out of personal hygiene supplies and/or become pregnant and thus repeat a sad but preventable cycle. Responding to this situation, two Rotary clubs decided to improve the lives of these rural women by applying for a Global Grant from TRF. The Rotary Club of Fulton, Missouri and Tanzania-based Babati Rotary, along with Humanity For Children, a non-profit based in Missouri, landed a \$94,000 Global Grant to increase the survival rate of mothers, newborns and infants among the Maasai people living in a remote area of northern Tanzania. "This is the first time we've received an international grant since I've been a Rotarian...It feels so good to be part of a small organization doing such big works," gushed Amanda Gowin, Fulton club member and project co-director. Initiatives within the project include: training traditional birth attendants in safe-birthing practices, providing a basic clinical lab in two remote governmental clinics and installing solar panels to provide them with electricity.
