Marcy O'Brien Children's Advocacy Center

Guest speaker today was Marcy O'Brien, Executive Director of the Rock Island County Children's Advocacy Center. Obrien is married and has two grown children. She was a police officer for twenty-nine years; working for the East Moline Police Department for five years before being employed by the Moline Police Department for

twenty-four years. She started her career as a patrol officer. She was then assigned to a low-income housing complex as a community policing officer. After that assignment, she was a liaison officer assigned to a JR High School for three years and then the High School for two years. She left that assignment when appointed as a Juvenile Detective. During her time as a liaison officer and detective she had the opportunity to work closely with the Rock Island Children's Advocacy Center. When Director Cindy Fisher announced her plans to retire, O'Brien was excited to be able to apply for her position. She says she believes in the mission of the Children's Advocacy Center. The mission of the Rock Island County Children's Advocacy Center is to provide each child who has suffered abuse with justice, hope and healing. They provide services to child victims of sexual abuse, severe physical abuse, and child witnesses to homicides and other violent crimes. Services may also be provided for children at risk and nonoffending family members. The Center provides forensic interviews, advocacy, medical evaluation and treatment, and therapeutic intervention for child abuse victims referred to the agency. Services are available to the child for as long as needed. They also provide crisis intervention, individual and group counseling, play therapy, court accompaniment, resource referrals, assistance with crime victim's compensation paperwork, and personal advocacy. Data collected indicate 25% of girls are sexually abused before their 18th birthday; 17% of boys are sexually abused before their 18th birthday. 98% of the abused children know their perpetrators; and 25% of the abused children were not old enough to attend Kindergarten. O'Brien identified the signs and symptoms of abuse noting that young children often don't realized they have been abused. Signs of Physical Abuse include: Unexplained changes in the child's body or behavior or regression to earlier developmental stages. Any injury (bruise, burn, fracture, abdominal or head injury) that cannot be explained, Watchful and "on alert" behavior, as if the child is waiting for something bad to happen, Shying away from touch, flinches at sudden movements, or seems afraid to go home. Appears to be afraid of adults, wears clothing inappropriate to the season or weather to cover injuries, i.e. long-sleeved shirts on hot days, school failure, frequent headaches or stomachaches with no medical cause. Signs of Emotional Abuse are: Behavioral changes, speech disorders, substance abuse, developmental delays, lack of attachment to the parent, excessively withdrawn, fearful or anxious about doing something wrong, acts either inappropriately adult (taking care of other children) or inappropriately infantile (rocking, thumb-sucking, tantrums). The child may also exhibit extremely passive or aggressive behavior. Signs of Sexual Abuse are extreme sexual behavior that seems inappropriate for the child's age, sexual acting out on other children, genital pain, itching, swelling or bleeding, as well as a sexually transmitted disease, refusal to change for physical activities (e.g. P.E. class) or refusal to participate in physical activities, depression, runaway, fear of being alone with adults, especially of a particular gender. Sexually abused children may also have suicide attempts, trouble walking or sitting, nightmares or bedwetting, sudden changes in appetite, and/or fear of a particular person or family member. **Signs of Neglect** are frequently absent from school, theft of food or money, consistently poor hygiene, lack of appropriate clothing for weather or season, frequently unsupervised, left alone or allowed to play in unsafe situations and environments, and/or lacks needed medical or dental care. When working with an abused child and their family, O'Brien said many people they work with are in "trauma-mode," and it's hard to remember to go to counseling or keep an appointment. "What we found is our parents are actually more traumatized than the kids. So, the parents also receive counseling so they can deal with what happened to their child," she said. It was an eye opening and sad commentary on our society.

RICK DEVINNEY IN THE SPOTLIGHT!

Rotarian Ric Devinney was this week's spotlighted member. Rick was born and raised in Moline. He was born in Moline's Lutheran Hospital (since torn down and now the site of the Overlook Senior Housing Complex) and attended Garfield School (now converted to a Senior Housing Facility). He graduated from Moline High School (thankfully, still standing), and received his bachelor's degree in Accounting and Finance from Northern Illinois University. He is a Certified Public Accountant (CPA) and was first employed by Peat Marwick Mitchell & Co, (now Klynveld Peat Marwick Goerdeler [KPMG]). He left Peat Marwick and became Chief Financial Officer for JMF Company in Bettendorf. After 17 years he moved on to become Chief Financial Officer for Friendship Manor, a position he currently holds. He said he joined Rotary in 2012 primarily because he was asked by Dr. Larry Tadlock who brought him to meetings for

several years. The roles have now changed with Rick typically bringing Larry to our meetings. He spoke with great love for his current position stating that Friendship Manor is the Illinois Quad Cities' only Continuing Care Retirement Community. They have 300 units with approximately one-third independent living, one-third assisted living, and one-third skilled care living. Roughly 1/3 of the assisted care unit are Memory Care with 24 apartment homes dedicated to residents with Alzheimer's and dementia. They receive specialized care in an environment designed specifically for their challenges. The Manor also offers inhouse and outpatient rehabilitation services. Skilled rehab and therapy professionals work with Friendship Manor residents, and outpatients from the community. Areas of specialty include orthopedic rehabilitation after joint replacement, degenerative joint disease, arthritis and neurological rehabilitation. Neurological rehab helps patients affected by a stroke or brain injury and those with Parkinson's or related diseases. Physical therapy programs use advanced equipment, such as the AlterG anti-gravity treadmill for the rehabilitation process. Rick and wife Nancy reside in Moline. Thanks Rick, for letting us get to know just a bit more about you!
