Ed Tibbetts Reports: SUPER TUESDAY & THE IOWA CAUCUSES

On September 18, 2018 Ed Tibbetts, a veteran Quad-City Times journalist with three decades of reporting experience, was named as the Times' Opinion Page editor.



Times Publisher, Debbie Anselm, said the Times is "thrilled to have Ed in this leadership position. As a veteran reporter well known for his political coverage and a long-time citizen of the Quad-Cities, Ed brings a unique perspective to this role," Anselm said. Today Rock Island Rotary had the privilege of meeting Ed and hearing his perspective on last week's "Super Tuesday" and the 2020 Iowa Caucuses. Tibbetts, joined the Times in 1989. During his tenure, he primarily covered politics and local government,

including the city of Davenport and Scott County. For the past 25 years, he has covered everything from local races to the statehouse, the Iowa caucuses and presidential politics. He also has reported on topics including health care, demographics, the economy, Rock Island Arsenal, Mississippi River, Interstate 74 bridge and other governmental issues impacting the region. "Ed is one of the sharpest newsmen I've ever worked with, and he's one of the most respected journalists in Iowa," said Matt Christensen, Times executive editor. Tibbetts began his remarks noting that when he agreed to speak at today's meeting he was a bit worried that the Iowa Caucus would be "old news", since it occurred some 6-weeks ago. However, with the debacle that occurred on the democrat side, more recently he worried whether there would be any results by the time he was to speak with us. As it worked out, the results did get confirmed, albeit just recently, with Pete Buttigieg winning, Bernie Sanders coming in second and Joe Biden scoring a distant fourth. Then with Biden's fifth place finish in New Hampshire, most pundits counted him out of the race. However, Tibbetts noted "Americans are hard to predict" and polls and pundits are often wrong. Biden's campaign emerged from the ashes in South Carolina and carried over into "Super Tuesday", and he is now leading the pact going into today's primaries. He also noted that with the race being close, next week's Illinois primary may be of more importance than in past years. He also said that the relatively low amount of early voting is a sign that people are waiting to the last minute to make their choice. Because of the problems that occurred this year and the complaint that Iowa is a small, agricultural state with little diversity, Tibbetts is guessing that it will no longer be the "first in the nation" in the next presidential primary race, at least not for the democrats. It will probably remain a caucus state. Party leaders can't just decide to switch to a primary election, because Tibbetts noted the caucus system is written into Iowa law. Iowa's system is unique in that rather than a caucus where a straw poll determines the winner, Iowa uses a "delegate equivalent" system. Caucus goers divide into separate areas of the room designating which candidate they support. Any group that is not at least 15% of those in attendance must either go home or join another candidates group. Once all groups in the room each represent 15% or more of those present, whatever delegates have been allotted to the caucus by the state democrat leaders are divided among the groups, based on their percent of the total number present. When asked what his biggest surprise of this election year has been, Tibbetts said, "Joe Biden. He has never run well in Iowa and his emergence as the front runner at this stage is surprising". Time will tell, but for now we greatly appreciated and enjoyed the Tibbetts take on the election and Iowa caucuses.

ROTARY SUPPORTS FIRST TEE OF THE QUAD CITIES



Today our Community Grants Committee Chair, Frank Lambert, presented a \$500 Rotary donation to Sara Cross, Executive Director of First Tee of the Quad Cities. First Tee is an international youth development organization introducing the game of golf and its inherent values to young people through after school and in school programs. First Tee helps shape the lives of young people by incorporating core values through the game of golf. Kids in the program are taught Honesty, Integrity, Sportsmanship, Respect, Confidence, Responsibility, Perseverance, Courtesy, and Judgment which are incorporated throughout the program. Our donation will be used for their new "Boys & Girls Academy" that will bring 20 boys and 20 girls to TPC Deere Run for 4 hours of golf and life lesson instruction.

FOUNDATION MINUTE

This year, members from some of the 33,000 clubs scattered among 535 districts in 34 zones in more than 200 countries, will be involved in special programs for their clubs. 2020 is the year that many Rotary Clubs will celebrate their century of "Doing Good In The World." In his latest message published in the March 2020 edition of the Rotarian, Foundation Trustee Chair, Gary C.K Huang implores Rotarians to "continue to cultivate virtue, examine and analyze what we learn, move toward righteousness based on our new knowledge, and keep improving everything we do."

With regards to The Rotary Foundation's core goals, several clubs are already harkening to the advice. At the Rotary India Centennial Summit which just concluded in Newtown, West Bengal, India, 4,000 members from 35 countries, along with government officials explored ideas and solutions for disease prevention and treatment, water sanitation, hygiene and education. Addressing the participants at the summit, RI President Mark Maloney said, "As we celebrate our impact over the last 100 years in India, I'm inspired by these creative solutions to some of our toughest challenges, from economic inequality to conflict resolution to fighting disease."

During the service year of 2018-19, The Rotary Foundation supported projects in India worth \$22.81 million (USD). The emphasis is always on the Six Areas of Focus. Recognizing India's role in the eradication of Polio, this March Rotary will join India in celebrating its 6th Polio-free year. Since 1995, Rotary has worked with the Indian government to institute a National Immunization Day each year to immunize 172 million children under 5 years old.

Disease prevention was a top priority for Rotary District 7070 (Toronto) when it handed over a high-tech toilet complex to the Wandse Proper Primary School in Kundapura, India. The \$90,873 USD project was funded through a Global Grant. Rotary District 3182 Kundapura, India and the Rotary Club of Whitby-Sunrise, Whitby, Ontario, Canada, contributed to the project. Unveiling the plaque for the toilet complex, Past District 3182 Governor, Abhinandan Shetty Kundapura, expressed gratitude to TRF for the grant and disclosed that another Global Grant of \$39,145 USD has been approved for the Narayana Specia School, Kundapura, India. Finally, Global Grant Program Coordinator, G. Sridhar Shetty said that an additional Global Grant worth \$23,068 USD has provided funds for a "smart class" school vehicle for the school's technical training staff.

CLARENCE DARROW IN THE SPOTLIGHT



Today Rotarian Clarence Darrow was our featured member. Clarence joined Rock Island Rotary in 1997. He was born in Dubuque, Iowa and graduated from Loras College in Dubuque. He accepted a position with the Cook County Public Air Office working in the Children's Division. That experience led him to a job with the Iowa Dept. of Social Services, supervising the Aid to Dependent Children program. He returned to school and earned a master's degree in Social Work. He continued his work primarily helping children but began attending night school at Chicago Kent School of Law, graduating with a JD degree in 1971. He then joined the Rock Island County States Attorney's Office and worked primarily in Juvenile Court. In 1974 he successfully ran for the Illinois House of Representatives and served 4 terms prior to serving 1 term in

the Illinois Senate. Clarence then ran for and won election as a local Circuit Judge. Retiring from the bench, he formed a law office with his son and daughter-in-law and was in the private practice of law until retiring in 2015. His son is now a Circuit Judge and his daughter-in-law a U.S. Federal District Court Judge. Thanks Clarence for sharing your life story of service to youth and our community.
