Island from 2017 through May of 2019 and from March of 2016 through May 2017 was a planner with the MIDAS Council of Governments, an intergovernmental agency in Fort Dodge, Iowa. In Rock Island, Brainard has been working with Erica Ruggiero from MIA Architects who spent last year researching and drafting a proposal to add Downtown Rock Island to the National Register of Historic Places. Brainard says the whole city stands to benefit. "The benefits of a National Register Historic District are mainly two things. The first is prestige. A community can look at this and say, "We have a collection of historically important buildings, they're an integral part of our story". "The second thing is the historic tax credit access." said Brainard. "It would help the city restore older properties". Historic places are added to the National Register by the National Park Service based on recommendations from the State Historic Preservation Office, a division of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. The National Register of Historic Places is the official list of properties that merit special attention and preservation. The City obtained a \$11,813 grant to employ MIA as a consultant in 2018 and in 2019 the 300-page application was filed with the Illinois Review Board. After nearly a year of review and revision the application was sent to the Department of Interior in Washington, DC. On July 6, 2020 federal approval was received and the downtown officially became part of the National Register of Historic Places. Mr. Brainard said, "In addition to redevelopment loans, the designation provides an opportunity for Rock Island to showcase heritage tourism, as a means to advance and encourage historically appropriate development." The boundary for the downtown Historic District encompasses sections of properties between 1st and 6th Avenues along the blocks of 21st Street through 14th Street and includes the entire Centennial Bridge. The Fort Armstrong Hotel is among the buildings in downtown Rock Island being recognized. In general, properties must be more than 50 years old to be eligible for the National Register. A listing places no obligations on private property owners but does make properties eligible for some financial incentives. For a property to be listed, it must meet at least one of four criteria – It has to be associated with an important event or series or events. It must be associated with an important person or group. It must have distinctive architectural features or a unique method of construction. It must have the potential to yield significant information (like an archeological site might). Plaques are presented to properties which have been placed on the National Register of Historic Places. In addition to having general historic value, things that are listed must possess a high degree of integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association. Brainard said one goal of the City in seeking the designation is to develop Rock Island as a historic tourism destination. He pointed to Galena as a community that has successfully achieved that status. He said plan are in place for revitalization and redevelopment of our downtown and just need to be executed. Thank you, Mr. Brainard for an interesting and highly informative presentation!

FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week 2 of October, the Economic &Community Development Month of Rotary International.

Kidney disease affects millions of people all over the world. Many of these patients suffer devastating consequences caused by lack of adequate care. Poor and developing countries generally do not have the necessary infrastructure to combat the disease in all its manifestations. Dialysis remains a hugely expensive, yet very necessary method of intervention. In most nations individuals are expected to fund their own treatment. In communities and hospitals where a patient cannot afford this extravagant cost, such a person faces a grim future. As part of its mission to improve world understanding, goodwill and peace through the improvement of health, TRF recently came to the aid of patients with kidney disease in Kumbakonam, Tamil Nadu, India.

Through a Global Grant, a Rotary Dialysis Center with three dialysis machines was set up in Kumbakonam. Rotary District 2981 (India) hosted the (\$34,870 US) grant which was sponsored by Rotary District 9820 (Australia). S Piralyon, PDG (D2981) was influential in getting the Global Grant from TRF. "During the lockdown, the new facility was useful for local patients to avoid unnecessary travel and related expenditure."

WORLD POLIO DAY 2020 - THIS YEAR A VERY SPECIAL DAY

October 24th is World Polio Day, and we have plenty to celebrate! Just in the past month the continent of **Africa was declared "Polio Free".** Nigeria was the last African nation to experience a case of wild polio and that was now 3 years ago! Having passed the 3-year threshold made Nigeria officially polio free. Polio now exists in just two Asian countries, Afghanistan, and Pakistan. War and mistrust have made it difficult to get children in those countries immunized, but efforts are now concentrated to do just that! Extremists have spread the rumor that the vaccination is designed by "infidels" to neuter the children. Medical volunteers have been attacked, killed and immunization supplies destroyed. Progress is being made amidst the conflict and there is hope that the final two nations experiencing polio will take their place in the world as polio free in the next year or two. Incidents of poliovirus are up in 2020 in Afghanistan (37 as of July 20) and are down slightly (65 as of July 24) in Pakistan. The 102 total cases thus far in 2020 compare to 84 total at the same date last year.

Rock Island Rotary is planning a special emphasis this year on World Polio Day. Fellow Rotarian, Rock Island Mayor Mike Thoms, will be proclaiming Saturday, October 24th as World Polio Day in Rock Island. On Friday, October 23rd <u>our Club will host the first ever Joint Illinois Quad Cities Rotary Club Meeting</u>. The meeting held on ZOOM will begin at 12 noon and will end no later than 1pm. Rotary Clubs from East Moline-Silvis, Geneseo, Illinois Quad Cities, Milan Area, Moline, River Cities, and Twin Rivers RAH have been invited to join us. The program will feature local Rotarians with personal polio experiences and an outstanding World Polio Day video provided by Rotary International AND watch Bud Phillis and Kai Swanson on Channel 4, "Living Local" show, Thursday October 22nd at 2:00pm. They will be talking about Rotary, Polio, and our World Polio Day activities.

Mark your calendar: <u>FRIDAY, OCTOBER 23rd, 12 NOON</u> and plan to join in this unique and important meeting. We could easily have well over 100 Rotarians coming together on ZOOM to commemorate World Polio Day. Be sure you are part of this first ever endeavor! AND watch Bud & Kai on TV-4, October 22nd at 2:00pm.

DUE\$ ADJUSTED FOR THE COMING QUARTER

With Covid-19 temporarily shutting down in-person meetings, our Club Board of Directors voted to remove the lunch portion of our dues for the coming quarter. Rather than \$150, your dues invoice will be for \$50. That will cover our set costs for International and District dues, insurance, and the Rotarian magazine received by all members. If we can resume in-person meetings during the quarter a box lunch from Bridges Catering will be available for those who want it. The box lunches will be provided on a "pay as you go" basis at each meeting.

ROCK ISLAND ROTARY MEETING SURVEY

Surveys were sent to 90 Club Members on September 21st. Two of our members do not have email. As of October 9, fifty-five members completed and returned the 4-question survey. Forty-nine responses were received in the first three days of the survey. Five more were return by the end of the first week. In the past 11 days just 1 additional response was received. We sent individual email reminders twice in addition to reminders in the newsletter cover email, pleas in the newsletter content, and pleas by both Angela and Bob Swanson during the last two meeting. In the end we have responses from 61% of the club. The survey was closed on October 9th.

Here is a final summary of the 55 responses we received.

Q1 If Rock Island Rotary began "In-Person" Meetings in October with a ZOOM option, would you? Answered: 55 Skipped: 0

Meeting in person should be done in full compliance with CDC, State of Illinois, and Q.C. Botanical Center protocols. Under these circumstances our meeting in person would not be irresponsible.

I really miss my fellow Rotarians and our noon meetings. However, the COVID cases are still occurring within the county and the safety risk continues amidst all the CDC guidelines. Please continue to send me the link to the meetings and I will try and do better to attend by phone. I continue to work three days a week and have Tuesday noon meetings once a month. We are staying safe here. Thanks for asking for our input Bob. Take care.

If we wait to meet in person until it is "safe" again or when there is a vaccine - we may well be waiting for years. The state is allowing us to meet with precautions - the state and/or Botanical Center would not allow us to meet (with precautions) if it were unsafe. I fear our club will die off if we cannot engage members. Zoom meetings for months on end do not engage members. I respect those that feel like they cannot come to an inperson meeting yet. However, I feel it is critical for the health of our club to begin meeting in person for those that are ready. We are a service club made up of many community leaders. We should be the ones instilling facts-over-fear in our community.

SURVEY COMMENTS - CONTINUED

I can accommodate accordingly whatever works best for everyone else. :)

Hi, Thank-you for doing this survey.... I do not feel comfortable in a group.... even 50 or less. I will try my best to follow the meetings on zoom.

We need to have some social interaction to remain a viable organization. With social distancing and facial masks, the risk is minimal. Those that don't want to attend can join via Zoom.

If my employer does not feel comfortable enough in having us return to the office, then I don't feel it would be appropriate to attend Rotary meetings in person.

I look forward to being with my Rock Island Rotary friends!

We need the direct fellowship.

I have no way of doing Zoom with video at work. I've been "attending" with my phone & can't see the presentations, know who's talking, etc. Honestly, I've gotten very little out of meetings with just my phone & don't really feel any kind of connection to the group this way.

Because of where I work, I will likely attend by Zoom only at this time. If I were to attend in person, I'd prefer that no lunch be served so everyone could keep their mask on.

When infections continue to increase, I don't think the leading service organization in this City should encourage large, in person gatherings.

You are doing a great job

Having a Zoom option is wonderful for people that travel or are still working and getting out of the office for 2 hours in the middle of the day on a Tuesday is not always an option. I would attend occasionally in person but would definitely take advantage of the Zoom option as much as possible.

I am strongly opposed to meeting in-person. I also feel it is irresponsible to encourage our members to meet in-person by offering that as an option.

Won't return to an in-person meeting until there's a vaccine for the virus.

I feel more comfortable attending via zoom for now.

I probably won't be back to an in-person meeting until there is a vaccine and the threat of the coronavirus is over.

Bottom line – Of the 55 members who answered the survey, if we had in-person meetings 17 would attend, 36 would watch on Zoom and 2 would not do either. Four of the 14 would not attend if a lunch is not provided. 82% of those who would attend want a boxed lunch. One would bring their own lunch and four would prefer no lunch. The Board will review and discuss these findings at the October 19th Board meeting.

MAYOR RECOGNIZES ROCK ISLAND ROTARY AND PROCLAIMS OCTOBER 24TH AS WORLD POLIO DAY IN ROCK ISLAND

At the Rock Island City Council meeting on Monday, October 12th, Rock Island Mayor signed a proclamation naming October 24th as World Polio Day in Rock Island. It was noted that aldermen David Geenen and Jenni Swanson are members of Rotary and that Rock Island head librarian, is our current club president. We thank Mayor Thoms, himself a member of our club, for his support and kind words. Dr. Bud Phillis was on hand to accept the proclamation on behalf of our club. A complete text of the proclamation follows:

World Polio Day Proclamation

WHEREAS, Rotary is a global network of neighbors, friends, leaders, and problem-solvers who unite and take action to create lasting change in communities across the globe; and

WHEREAS, the Rotary motto, Service Above Self, inspires members to provide humanitarian service, follow high ethical standards, and promote goodwill and peace in the world; and

WHEREAS, Rotary in 1985 launched PolioPlus and in 1988 helped establish the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, which today includes the World Health Organization, U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, UNICEF, and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, and Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance, to immunize the children of the world against polio; and

WHEREAS, polio cases have dropped by 99.9 percent since 1988 and the world stands on the threshold of eradicating the disease; and

WHEREAS, to date, Rock Island Rotary has raised and contributed in excess of \$50,000 and Rotary International has contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protecting more than 2.5 billion children in 122 countries; and

WHEREAS, Rotary is working to raise an additional \$50 million per year, which would be leveraged for maximum impact by an additional \$100 million annually from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation; and

WHEREAS, these efforts are providing much-needed operational support, medical staff, laboratory equipment, and educational materials for health workers and parents; and

WHEREAS, in addition, Rotary has played a major role in decisions by donor governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort; and

WHEREAS, there are over 1.2 million Rotary members in more than 35,000 clubs throughout the world that sponsor service projects to address such critical issues as poverty, disease, hunger, illiteracy, and the environment in their local communities and abroad.

Therefore, I, Mike Thoms, Mayor of the City of Rock Island, State of Illinois, do hereby proclaim October 24, 2020 World Polio Day in Rock Island and encourage all citizens to join me and Rotary International in the fight for a polio-free world.
