ROBERT "BOB" ERICKSON Unity Point - Trinity, CEO

Guest Speaker at Rock Island Rotary today was Robert Erickson. Erickson was named the organization's president and CEO last August. He assumed day-to-day leadership on September 23, 2019. Mr. Erickson brought more than 27 years of health care leadership experience to the

Quad Cities and Muscatine. Erickson comes to the Quad Cities from Joliet, Illinois where he most recently was President of Presence Saint Joseph Medical Center. Prior to his time there, Erickson was CEO at St. Joseph Medical Center in Kansas City, Missouri following his role as president and CEO at St. Francis Health in Topeka, Kansas. Erickson is a native of La Crosse, Wisconsin. He earned his bachelor's degree in speech pathology and audiology from Marquette University, Milwaukee, Wisconsin in 1988 and a master's degree in speech and hearing science from Arizona State University, Tempe, Arizona in 1990. He completed all pre-dissertation requirements for a doctorate in cognitive psychology in 1994 before making a career change to health care administration. In 2010, Marquette University College of Health Sciences honored him as their Distinguished Alumnus of the Year. Erickson is passionate about community involvement. He has served on the boards of many non-profit organizations including Rotary Club, American Red Cross Illinois River Valley, and the Will County Center for Economic Development. He has served as a Trustee for the University of St. Francis. His community service extends to Boys and Girls Clubs throughout the country, the Kansas Hospital Association as a District President and a Board Member for the Kansas Health and Education Research Foundation. He has also served on the Chancellor's Advisory Board for the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. Bob and his wife, Cindy, have three children: Jake, Samantha, and Conrad. Erickson said his passion has been Not for Profit Community Health Care, have worked in both for profit and not for profit systems. He also prefers the medium sized systems with regional governance. He said he found what he had been told, that the river is a "barrier", is true. People really do not like crossing the river for care. Although, he also noted that 1/3 of the care needs leave the Quad Cities for specialist at such locations as the University of Iowa and the Mayo Clinics. Erickson was working for more collaboration between Genesis and Trinity, expanding out-patient and express care, and recruiting more medical specialists to the Quad Cities, when the pandemic sidetracked those efforts. He said the Midwest was fortunate to have time to prepare for the pandemic which first struck the more populated east and west coast urban areas. Now the pandemic has hit locally and has hit hard! He said Trinity has now complete 40,000 COVID tests, found 5,000 positive results with 600 hospitalized and 52 deaths. He said because so many others are non-symptomatic the virus spreads quickly. Currently hospitalizations, patients in ICU, and those on ventilators, are all up. 125 Trinity staff members are out with COVID. Persons feeling ill and coming in for testing are currently 37% positive for COVID. Erickson said all hospitals are full and adding beds. Non-COVID elective procedures are being delayed. Fortunately, he said there is good news regarding a vaccine which may be available soon. He said that some good coming out of the pandemic is the acceptance of tele-health, better awareness of good health practices, and improved protocols for early identification and prevention. Finally, he noted that Trinity will be adding a 44-bed acute rehabilitation

During the current health crisis, the needs of the less fortunate still exist and may even become greater. People still are hungry and still need the food they receive from Heart of Hope Food Pantry. The plan at this time is for the operation of the Food Pantry to continue and our help and support is still needed. But the distribution system of food has changed. Instead of a shopping format where the guest walks through the building selecting the food they want, the food now is prepackaged into bags and just handed out to the guest. Food will be delivered to the elderly and disabled so that that population does not have to leave their homes. Used but sound plastic bags are needed now more than in the past. 


CONTINUING A TRADITION

FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week 2 of Rotary International's Foundation Month.

This past week has witnessed its own litany of woes not only from the pandemic but unwanted natural disasters around the globe. But, before you get discouraged, it is uplifting to know that while COVID-19 decimates families and storms ravage communities, Rotary clubs have intensified their efforts at improving the quality of life for people in need.

Rotarians have always cooperated with members in different corners of the world on projects that fall within the Seven Areas of Focus. An article in a recent Rotarian, the chair of TRF's Trustees reported that the success of TRF Global grants model is unmistakable. "At its introduction in 2013-14, the Foundation awarded 868 grants worth over \$47 million. By 2019-20, the number of approved grants had risen to 1,350, worth over \$100 million."

A recent Global Grant approved by TRF was jointly coordinated by Districts 2232 (Belarus and Ukraine) and 6990 (Florida, USA). The Rotary Club of Cherkasy, Ukraine, assisted by the Rotary Club of Miami Brickell, USA secured a Global Grant that was approved and matched by TRF with \$15,025 for a total of \$54, 289. The funds will be used to procure much needed medical equipment, training and supplies for the Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy, Ukraine. The new equipment will replace outdated and non-functional equipment and provide precise administration of aggressive chemotherapy drugs to children suffering from cancer and related diseases. The grant will provide for the proper treatment for approximately 1,250 children suffering from cancer for the next five years.


