Loredana Cooper is the English as a Second Language/International Transition Specialist at Black Hawk College. She received her bachelor's degree in System Engineering from the Catholic University of Santa Maria, a local private University in Arequipa, Peru. She began her presentation by telling her owl life's story. Born into poverty in Peru, Loredana saw education as her way out of poverty. Her mother told her, "Get and education and make a mark in the world". Loredana followed that advice and became active in her school participating in dance and band as well as studying hard. Through hard work and perseverance, she worked her way through college. With a degree in hand, Coca Cola in Peru took a chance and hired Loredana as a system engineer. She noted that Peru is still a male dominated society with women expected to stay in the home to cook and clean. She said male coworkers resented taking direction from a woman, but again through hard work she gained their respect. While at Coca Cola she met her future husband, married, and immigrated to the United States. She said learning a second language (English) was very hard. She said it was also necessary to learn the culture. Loredana and her husband settled in the Quad Cities and she spent 7 years working at Morning Star Academy. She then spent 2 years at Esperanza Legal Assistance Center, a legal assistance agency serving low-income, immigrant and Spanishspeaking residents of the Quad Cities who are seeking assistance with issues relating to immigration, Then five years ago she joined the staff at Black Hawk College as head of the ESL Ment0r/Mentee program. Since 1991 the Black Hawk ESL program has served more than 1,000 English Learner (EL) students from around the world in the Academic ESL Program. Students are refugees, student-visa holders, businessmen and businesswomen, and visiting scholars. Black Hawk is an accredited ESL program with a strong reputation for excellence and innovation. ESL faculty members and staff are committed to preparing students to be competitive with their American counterparts in vocational and academic programs and in the workforce. Loredana serves as advisor for the English as a Second Language Mentor and Mentee Program. The Mentors & Mentees Program is organized to help international/ESL students (mentees) adjust to cultural and academic differences with the help of a BHC student or BHC employee (mentor). This relationship allows international/ESL students and mentors to engage in educational opportunities outside of the campus as well as develop a foundation for effective, intercultural communication. Another goal of the Mentors & Mentees Program is to promote internationalization of the campus. The mentor volunteers meet with their assigned mentee for social and conversational purpose in an informal setting. One hour each week is the typical time devoted by mentors. The program is meant to help international/ESL students improve their English skills and learn more about the U.S. culture and introduce local students to the cultural diversity of the campus, the community, and the world. The Mentor & Mentee program hosts special events including an International Food Competition at the Quad-Cities Campus. BHC students and employees prepare dishes from their home countries that ranged from savory entrees to sweet desserts. Attendees were able to sample more than 20 dishes and vote for their favorites. Sixteen countries were represented in the competition - Albania, Brazil, Burma, Congo, Ecuador, Ghana, India, Iran, Ireland, Mexico, Paraguay, Senegal, Taiwan, Tanzania, Togo, and Turkey. The program is growing with students from 60 nations. Volunteer mentors are needed. One hour per week is all that is requested. Sounds like a great Service Above Self opportunity! FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week 4 of the Rotary International's Foundation Month!

It is a few more weeks to the end of a tumultuous year for Rotarians, but the spate of Coronavirus attacks and natural disasters has not dampened the enthusiasm for doing good all over. Rotary clubs in D3830 continue to give back to society as the pandemic took the world by storm. The Philippines General Hospital in Manila is the recipient of a recent Global Grant jointly written by District 3830 (Manila, Philippines) and D3620 (South Korea) and matched by TRF. The Let's Save the Brain Project was awarded a grant of 2,745,600 Philippine Peso (\$56,923, USD) by TRF which was used to donate 13 bedside monitors vital to saving the lives of patients in Ward 5 of PGH where patients recovering from stroke and other brain diseases are admitted. The Rotary Clubs of Makati Century City, Makati Premier District and Fort Bonifacio Global City coordinated the project. Rotary Club of Cheonan Chungnam contributed to the fund.

In the words of TRF's Trustee chair K.R. "Ravi" Ravindrin, "The year-end holidays are upon us. It is a time of giving and sharing, but it is not limited to our loved ones. It is also for the people we have never met and will never see, for those who are not so fortunate as we and could use a helping hand. The miracle of giving that Scrooge discovered on Christmas Eve is exactly what The Rotary Foundation does 365 days a year."

As if responding to Rotarian Ravindran's challenge, Rotary clubs in D3830 proved that, "...together, we see a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change – across the globe, in our communities, and in ourselves."



Rotary's World Headquarters remains in Illinois

Rotary's President and President Elect are required to live in Illinois during their term of office The room where Rotary founder Paul Harris met with Gustavus Loehr, Silvester Schiele, and Hiram E. Shorey for the first Rotary meeting was in Loehr's Chicago office. That room was carefully dismantled board by board when the building was scheduled for demolition. It was painstakingly, carefully, and authentically rebuilt inside Rotary's World Headquarters.

Rotarians can schedule tours of the World Headquarters and Clubs can schedule meetings there. Paul Harris' Chicago home has also been preserved and is open for tours. It is located on the South side of Chicago, approximately 30 miles from the World Headquarters.
