Our program today was a "wrap up" of our World Polio Day activities and was presented by Bob Swanson and Bud Phillis. Bob highlighted the past 30 days starting with an October 12th Rock Island City Council meeting at which the Council passed, and Mayor Mike Thoms signed a proclamation making October 24th "World Polio Day in Rock Island". Then on October 22nd Kai Swanson and Bud appearance on the CBS-TV 4 "Living Local" program. The men spoke about World Polio, Rotary's international commitment and efforts to end polio, and each told their own personal polio story. Kai spoke of his father, Richard Swanson who was paralyzed as a child by polio and ultimately had to relearn how to walk. Bud spoke of his sister "Bootsie" and he both being stricken by polio. Boostie lost her life to the disease after just 4 days of illness. On October 23^{rd,} our Club hosted an area-wide joint Rotary World Polio Day celebration meeting. We were joined by Rotarians from East Moline-Silvis, Geneseo, Illinois Quad Cities, Milan, Moline, River Cities, and Twin Rivers RAH Rotarians. Our District Governor, Tom Brooks along with several other District Rotary officials joined us. Governor Brooks expressed his greetings to all and praised Rock Island Rotary for organizing the Event. District Foundation Chair, Kathy Kwiat-Hess, spoke and presented Award Certificates to Moline and Rock Island Rotary Clubs for their financial support of the Polio Plus campaign. Videos made by Cindi Gramenz of Bob Swanson, Kai Swanson, and Bud Phillis relating their personal polio experiences were shown along with Rotary International's Polio Global Update video. The hour-long meeting received rave reviews from both local and district officials along with requests to make this an annual World Polio Day event. Concluding his comments, Bob then showed an informative and inspiring video tracing the history of Polio in the world and in the United States. The video concluded with an update from Rotary International's Polio Plus director, Carol Pandak. Our Foundation Chair, Dr. Phillis wrapped up the meeting, relating his very personal polio story along with photos of his sister, Bootsie. He then unveiled a one-time "Pass the Hat for Polio" campaign, urging 100%-member participation in donating as little at \$10 to end polio. He noted that a donation sheet would be attached with today's newsletter. We hope all will open their hearts and purses and join the effort. Funds will be matched 2 to 1 by the Gates Foundation. If our club can raise just \$335, the combined donation will exceed \$1,000! Thank you for your support!

- **SERVICE** Rotary members are needed to help with the Heart of Hope Food Pantry. We help every Thursday. The Pantry serves those using walkers and scooters starting at 4:30pmm. The distribution to the general public will begin at 5:30pm and will last until 6:30pm. They do not need our help to serve the early group, therefore the volunteer time needed is only one hour. During the current health crisis, the needs of the less fortunate still exist and may even become greater. People still are hungry and still need the food they receive from Heart of Hope Food Pantry. The plan at this time is for the operation of the Food Pantry to continue and our help and support is still needed. But the distribution system of food has changed. Instead of a shopping format where the guest walks through the building selecting the food they want, the food now is prepackaged into bags and just handed out to the guest. Food will be delivered to the elderly and disabled so that that population does not have to leave their homes. Used but sound plastic bags are needed now more than in the past. Drop off bags anytime the Heart of Hope Center is open. Call Steve Morenz to volunteer at 309-721-7632 or just show up any Thursday at 5:15 to help pack bags. Clients will not come into the food pantry until further notice.

We regret this development and sincerely hope that Circa 21 and other locally owned small businesses survive. Bars and restaurants across the river remain open and eager to serve Illinois customers.

FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week One in November, the Foundation Month of Rotary International

Yes, COVID-19 still rages unforgivably; but Rotarians and TRF are unrelenting in their effort to battle the virus and bring succor not only to victims, but also assist the tireless health workers and essential personnel who put up a valiant fight against the pandemic. At the same time other major challenges are getting the attention of TRF, which is helping to ease the tensions of the sick, the oppressed and the underserved of the world by doing good through the Six Areas of Focus. Equipping hospitals and providing access to clean water are some of the ways Rotarians and TRF continue to fulfill their mission.

The Rotary Club of Kallianpura, D 3182 (India) presented three hemodialysis machines to the Goretti Hospital in Kallianpura. The \$40,871 USD project was supported through TRF Global Grant and two sponsoring Rotary clubs: Chester County, D7450 PA and Smithfield, D 7410 PA, USA. In addition to the hemodialysis machines the hospital also received a reverse osmosis water purifier, air conditioners and hospital beds.

In another development, clean, safe water is becoming more available to remote villages in the Zambezia Province of Mozambique, Africa, through the efforts of the Rotary Club of Punta Gorda Rotary (FL, USA) and the local African nonprofit Water4Life Mozambique. The Rotary Club of Punta Gorda (FL) raised over \$30,000 which was matched by \$50,000 from TRF. This Global Grant will drill around 10 additional water wells in the villages of Mozambique. Water4Life has drilled almost 400 wells in remote villages across the Zambezia Province since Rotarian Annie Eastman founded the certified nongovernmental organization in 2014.


With the help of Punta Gorda Rotary, more wells are being drilled in the region. Punta Gorda Rotary worked with a host club partner in Beira, Mozambique, on the project. Rotarian James Williams of the Punta Gorda Club expressed his club's satisfaction with the water project. "We are very happy to be able to do this...We often partner with clubs in really needy parts of the world and help fund projects that they and we come up with together."

Annie Eastman, in a press release, said that things will change for the better in these villages. "Girls will no longer walk miles to fetch water. Instead they can get an education. They are less at risk for rape and human trafficking. School is better attended as there is less sickness. (And) with water nearby, gardens can be grown."

We in the United States are fortunate to have had 45 years of freedom from Polio, mostly due to immunizations becoming a regular part of birthing. However, medical experts tell us that if the effort to wipe out polio were to stop, within ten years we would be back to 200,000 annual cases; 20,000 children will be incurably paralyzed, and thousands will die. Rotary has been the leader in the polio eradication movement and Rock Island Rotary has been among the top Clubs in the Midwest in supporting that effort.
