Director, Dan McNeil. Spring Forward has reached thousands of kids and adults through its many years of programming and service. Spring Forward has grown to serve more than 600 children in after-school programs and summer enrichment camps. Another fifty adult English Learners participate in Spring Forward's Family Literacy program. McNeil says, "We aim to support a community in which all people are embraced and have an equal opportunity for success". Director McNeil has a broad background in community service, starting as Director of Development for the Figge Art Museum in 2007. He was named Vice President of Marketing for Putnam Museum in 2010 and then made the move to become Project Manager for River Action and Partners of Scott Count Watersheds in 2012. In December of 2014 he was name Executive Director of Spring Forward Learning Center and has presided over substantial growth and program development during the past 6 years. Programs include Summer Enrichment Camps, Kids on Campus, After School Programs, a Family Literacy program and even Spring Forward Soccer and basketball clubs. McNeil says, "Literacy is the driver of everything we do at spring forward. We know that reading is a key to success for people in school and beyond, that is why we make it a priority in all our educational programming. Through our leveled literacy intervention curriculum, regular attenders of our programs reliably see measurable results." With virtually all their programs involving face to face learning, the COVID-19 pandemic caused a huge disruption and forced rethinking of how best to serve children. Mr. McNeil explained the strategies which began with establishing an on-line after school program. The thought at the time was that it would be a relatively short-term program and that kids would be returning to school. The program consisted largely of positive messages and encouragement. Kids were urged to keep up online. As COVID lingered on, Spring Forward created "Spring Forward Together at 4", a daily streamed program for kids with positive messages and family activities. With school shut down and group gatherings banned, it became obvious that Spring Forward's summer camps had to be cancelled and something new had to be created. On May 5th, a decision was made to do a Remote Summer Camp. Not to be confused with a virtual program, the remote camp reached out to kids far beyond watching on a computer. Summer Success Kits were created each week containing books, food, activities, and a mix of fun and educational items. 400 kids registered for the program and received the kits for 6 consecutive weeks. By the end of the camp participants each had received 10-12 new books. A YouTube page was created offering kids on-line field trips to the Putnam Museum, Figge Art Museum, Nahant Marsh, and other area attractions. Staff members took to the streets on bikes 4 days a week taking books to the neighborhoods for free distribution to kids. The van Rotary helped Spring Forward purchase was used to deliver books and Summer Success Kits all over the city. Mr. McNeil stressed that there is no substitute for live one on one learning and noted that the more affluent children tend to have books in their homes and positive reinforcement for reading and learning. Spring Forward strives to reach those who may lack resources and helps provide books, direction, and encouragement to ensure they keep learning and up to date with their schoolwork. As is usual, one of our own presented an excellent program! Thanks Dan!


THE TAB GROWS

FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week 2 of Rotary International's Disease Prevention and Treatment Month

It's been another week of Rotarians preparing for the end of the year in various ways, including Helping neighbors in need both near and far.

With this month's theme of disease prevention and treatment, Rotarians are mindful of the crushing impact of coronavirus on personal lives of families all over the world. This is why several clubs, with the help of The Rotary Foundation (TRF), are responding to the needs of individuals impacted by the virus.

Rotary District 7930, composed of 47 clubs in northeastern Massachusetts, applied for and was awarded a Rotary Foundation Covid-19 Global Grant to support the efforts of Care Dimensions, the largest hospice and palliative care provider in Massachusetts. The \$44,950 (US) was used to purchase PPE (Personal Protective Equipment) for the not-for-profit organization's "Frontline Workers."

Other contributors in this grant were: Rotary District 2650 (Japan), Rotary Club of Kyoto South and Rotary Clubs in Greater Boston, MA. The president and CEO of Care Dimensions, Patricia Ahren, expressed her organizations gratitude to TRF for "...funding critical PPE for our staff who are on the front lines of the Covid-19 pandemic....and we are honored TRF has chosen to assist our care teams on the North Shore and in Greater Boston."

District 7930 Governor, Betsy Manzelli, assured Care Dimensions of her district's enthusiasm at "...collaborating with and supporting Care Dimensions during this pandemic." The past district governor, Joan Arsenault, 2019-2020, explained that, as a professional healthcare provider, she realized that TRF "was an incredible resource and could help us address the shortage of PPE and food insecurity."

Past Trustee of TRF and RI Director, Julia Phelps, expressed satisfaction about this grant, which was a first for her district, "that's the beauty of Rotary: people helping people they've never met but knowing they are making a difference and saving lives."
