team warrant recognition today. In December 2016, Main Street Baseball was awarded Ballpark Digest's coveted "Minor League Baseball Organization of the Year" honor – one of the industry's highest honors. Heller's teams are known primarily for three things: fun, innovative promotions; making significant ballpark improvements benefiting both fans and players; and giving back generously to each club's home community. In addition to the River Bandits, the Mr. Heller's organization owns baseball clubs in Lowell Massachusetts, Wilmington Delaware, and Billings Montana. In the Quad Cities, since Heller took over, the River Bandits have sparked a stunning resurgence of baseball, winning three championships in seven seasons (when no other team won even two), setting the per-game attendance record and earning numerous awards for innovative promotions and ballpark improvements. Over the years, the team has set records for attendance, concessions, group, and sponsorship sales Upon purchasing the Bandits, Heller sold ballpark naming rights to Modern Woodmen of America; MWA later extended its deal through 2027. Modern Woodmen Park has since earned as many accolades as any ballpark in the country. It was voted "best minor league ballpark" by the readers of USA Today and 10Best.com and the Midwest League's best ballpark by Baseball America. It earned a 5-star rating from Ballpark Digest, was named one of the two most beautiful ballparks in the minors by USA Today, one of the top 10 by Parade Magazine and "the #2 Coolest Minor League Ballpark in America" by Complex Magazine. The team even won an award for best TV commercial! Under Heller's leadership, the River Bandits have added many fun new features to the ballpark, including two outfield bars, five concourse-level "loge boxes," an 80-foot-long HD ribbon-board, a 36' x 42' HD video board, new sound system, a playground and a kids' party room ringed with ten X-Box and PS4 stations. The team also added new concessions stands and food carts, a triple suite, a Hall of Fame autographed jersey display, three new group areas, a special group area for our nation's veterans, a small solar farm, a permanent home for the Quad-Cities Sports Hall of Fame and a (sponsored) corn field from where the players are introduced at the game's outset (after all, it is lowa)! Heller also helped design and finance the spectacular Budweiser "Champions Club," a large, multi-purpose banquet hall with glass garage doors that open/close based on the weather. That room helped the club increase wedding business by more than 1,000%; the team now hosts 175 non-baseball events a year. In 2014, the Bandits unveiled their biggest improvement – a new 105-foot-tall Ferris wheel, the first in Minor League Baseball! That ride transformed the Quad Cities' skyline and has become an iconic part of downtown Davenport - it, too, was named by Ballpark Digest as "the nation's best ballpark improvement" (the fifth time in 10 years Main Street Baseball earned that award!). The team also added more than \$2 million worth of new rides to the ballpark, including a spinning kids' coaster, two new thrill rides, a swinging pirate ship, and a

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION



Foundation Chairman Bud Phillis reported that since March when our in-person meetings stopped the foundation account has not had the opportunity to raise funds through our weekly raffle drawing or our monthly Foundation Tuesday giving. As a result, the Foundation account has suffered. Fueled only by a \$3.50 assessment quarterly from our dues and those members who have established automatic account withdrawal contributions for the Foundation, the result is that money is not available for the Club to makes its normal \$400 match to help members achieve Paul Harris Fellow status. (Typically, that has been \$600 from the member and \$400 from the Club). However, until the fund builds back up, two very generous members, Dr. Tricia Barron, and Ruth Lee, have offered to share their excess recognition points to help members become Paul Harris Fellows. One recognition point equals \$1. Bud noted that we have had a few new Paul Harris Fellows this year but would very much liked to have more. Contributions can be given cumulative over time. You can become a "Sustaining Paul Harris Member" by simply committing to work toward a Paul Harris Fellow award with a minimum total contribution of \$100 annually. Each week our "Foundation Minute" provides stories as to how these vital funds are used for philanthropic work throughout the world.

30-foot-tall Drop-N-Twist to go with a myriad of bounce houses, a kiddie train and the only double-decker carousel between Chicago and Kansas City. Heller also improved the "back of the house," flood-protecting the entire ballpark, adding three large storage spaces, renovating both the home and visitors' clubhouses, adding a new weight and workout room, enclosing the batting cages, redoing the playing field and irrigation system, adding new protective netting beyond the ends of the dugouts, expanding the club's kitchen facilities and, in 2017, making Modern Woodmen Park the first Single-A ballpark in the country to install new, energy-efficient LED lights along with new light poles. No wonder Baseball America named the Quad Cities River Bandits one of the 12 "Most Accomplished Franchises of the 2010s." Heller and the River Bandits love giving back to the Quad Cities: the team has donated more than \$5 million to area charities, helped raise \$101,000 for flood relief, and won multiple U.S. Army Gold Awards for its community service. Its "Bandit Scholars" program, which pays an entire year's college tuition, funds three such scholarships. In 2015, 2017 and again in 2019, Ballpark Digest honored the River Bandits with its "Commitment to Charity" award in Minor League Baseball, the only team to win that distinction three times (no other club has won twice). We look forward to Mr. Heller's rescheduled presentation.

It's the last week in the month when Rotarians worldwide focus on promoting, fostering and supporting the ideal of service in the pursuit of all vocations. Using the highest ethical standards and fair treatment of employers, employees, associates, competitors, and the public Rotarians should take every opportunity to promote vocational excellence by example and service to others.


The past few months have featured Rotary Clubs responding to the needs of their fellow beings through dedicated service in various areas. However, no disaster has challenged the determination of Rotarians like the on-going virulent Covid-19. Rotarians, through the support of TRF, have funded numerous projects aimed at helping frontline workers combat the debilitating coronavirus and help families devastated by the scourge. Certain situations too risky to involve human helpers in dangerously infectious environments, have not dampened the enthusiasm of Rotarians to be of help.

A case in point is the recent event in India where TRF supported a Global Grant that funded robots used to deliver food, medicines, and essential services to highly infectious Covid-19 patients in Assam Medical Hospital. The Tribune of India reports that the robots would be very useful in servicing patients with extremely contagious diseases inside the isolation chambers of the quarantine facilities. In his welcoming address at the occasion, the Past District Governor (D3240), Rotarian Kalpana Khound, reiterated the contribution of Rotary in fighting the pandemic. The Rotary Club of Dibrugarh (NE India) and the Rotary Club of Dhaka Royal in Bangladesh contributed to the Foundation's Global Grant.

To reduce the danger of toxic water consumption, the Rotary Club of Guwahati South engaged in a joint project with The Rotary Club of Tacoma (D5020) to purify water by removing arsenic through specially designed large arsenic-removal plants. TRF made the Global Grant of \$69,000 possible.

Replenish, the organization we work with for our Water Filter Project in Kenya is a major international non-profit organization working with many entities and organization to provide clean, safe potable water and sanitation education to third world villagers. We have now had a five-year relationship with Replenish that has resulted in our purchase of more than 240 filters that are delivered and serving more than 17,000 children in rural villages near Nairobi, Kenya. Each year Replenish prepares a nice quality desk calendar and sends them to clients and contacts all over the world. As one of their faithful partners, we received the new 2021 calendar. Flipping through the months we see a photo of village children using water filters accompanying each month's calendar. We also notice that a majority of the filters look like the ones we have purchases. When we got to the April calendar all doubt was gone! As you can see very plainly, the filter has our project's familiar identifying sticker with the Rotary logo, the American Flag, and the words, "Western Illinois - Eastern lowa Rotary Clubs" proudly displayed. Kind of neat to know the fruits of our project are being seen world-wide! Thanks to our many members who contributed, and annually continue to support this great project!



Could You Lend Us Some Storage Space?

As you know, our club paid for the construction and installation of "Little Library" centers throughout our community. There is one located at or near every school in the Rock Island – Milan District, Jordan Catholic School, The King Center, and the Rock Island County Clerk of the Court's Office. We've asked for club members to volunteer to periodically check on a Little Library location near your home or route of travel and to report when maintenance is needed and when books need to be replenished. Children are given free access to take a book and can return books after reading. Many books don't get returned, which is fine if they are staying in the home and are available for brothers, sisters, and for rereading. Rotary replenishes the libraries when needed. The books have been provided through the generosity of members and from other sources. We need to keep a supply of books on hand, and now need a place to store that supply until they are placed into use.
