Augustana's Dr. Rebecca Heick is an epidemiologist and assistant professor of public health. She never imagined she would become a regularly scheduled media spokesperson during a major public health issue. Dr. Heick has been a prominent source of advice throughout a series of COVID-19 Q&A sessions on KWQC Channel 6 in the Quad Cities. She has given perspective on the importance of social distancing, how to break the chain of

transmission, and differences between COVID-19 and the flu. At times, she feels the weight of responsibility in sharing sound information. But even with so many looking to her for guidance, Dr. Heick is glad to provide a "measure of calm and comfort in the midst of what can feel chaotic and even a bit scary at times. 'My mission has become my motto – #spreadfactsnotfear!' Dr. Heick earned her B.A. in Biology from Augustana, her M.S. in Community Health Education from Western Illinois University, and her Ph.D. in Occupational and Environmental Health from the University of Iowa. Professor Heick contracted COVID-19 in mid-September and battled COVID-19 pneumonia. She documented her journey with a Facebook page called Your Friendly Neighborhood Epidemiologist. The professor uses her personal heath experiences as a teaching moment, sharing journal entries, updates, and facts about the virus. Today Rock Island Rotary was the beneficiary of her knowledge and experience. She began by reviewing some basic facts regarding COVID-19 and the vaccines that have been developed to battle it. Noting that she had a severe case of the virus last fall, she was pleased to advise that she had recently received her first vaccine shot. She also reported that next Friday the Johnson & Johnson vaccine will be reviewed by an FDA appointed team of outside advisers who after their investigation will make a recommendation to the FDA as to whether or not Emergency Use Authorization should be given. It is anticipated the FDA will approve the vaccine which will become the third available joining the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines. The advantages of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine are eliminating the need for deep freeze storage and delivering the vaccine in one shot as opposed to two. Dr. Heick stated that along with the original COVID-19 virus, we now also have seen the South Africa and United Kingdom variants surface locally. Fortunately, she stated that the current vaccines are quite effective against the variants. When asked about "herd immunity", she stated that for COVID we will need to get about 80% of our population immune to achieve that goal, which essentially is having so many people immune that the virus dies off being unable to find vulnerable people to infect. She also identified two types of immunity: "Sterilizing immunity" which means one cannot be infected; and "Functional immunity" which mean one may be infected but with mild consequences as opposed to possible death. Heick said we only achieve sterilizing immunity through vaccination. She reassured us all by saying that the vaccines are absolutely safe and that their speedy development was not done by sacrificing any of the traditional safety and testing procedures. The main factor in the quick development was massive available funding. She also noted a future vaccine via a "patch" is in the offing. Many questions were answered, and the program was one of the best we have had. Thank you Dr. Heick!

FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week 3, Rotary International's Month of Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution.

Past President of the Rotary Club of Everett (WA), Ed Petersen, along with two other members of his club traveled to the Dominican Republic with the sole intention of executing a long-planned Global Grant. In 2015, Petersen visited the Dajabon region of the island nation and met with needy farmers who were too poor to afford a garden. Before long, plans were put in place and funds were raised toward the creation of greenhouse gardens.

The Rotary Club of Everett raised \$5,000 that was matched by Rotary District 5050 comprising the state of Washington and British Columbia. A \$45,000 Matching Grant from TRF put the total grant at almost \$107,000. This grant provided local Dajabon residents with 10 greenhouse gardens, each measuring 3200 square feet.

Rotarian Petersen, who is also the strategic director of Housing Hope, was happy about the greenhouse gardens which would not only provide food for local consumption by the farmers and their families but would constitute a reliable source of income. "Our purpose is to train the garden owners in entrepreneurship. They will learn agricultural production, accounting, and sales skills to set them up for long-term success."

Petersen promised to do 60 more gardens in 2021. "When the first phase of 20 gardens is completed, we will release the funds for 20 more...We have access to future grant opportunities in education, in health and the environment, in reforestation. We have built the foundation that opens opportunities to do more." Another member of the Everett Rotary Club, George Bowden, acknowledged the "doing good spirit" universal to all Rotarians. According to Bowden, "There is a commonality among Rotarians and Rotary Clubs worldwide...whether it's vaccinations against polio or clean water or in this case, gardens...somebody said, 'why are you doing this?' our response 'because you're our neighbors.""

Mehta, a member of the Rotary Club of Calcutta-Mahanagar,


