Today's program featured two of our own Rock Island Rotarians, Angela Campbell is Director of the Rock Island Public Library. Angela earned her Bachelor of Arts Degree in Corporate Communications from Lindenwood University and her master's degree in Library and Information Science from Dominican University. She served as Reference and Book Discussion Group Coordinator and as PR/Programming Coordinator for the Davenport Library prior to being named Library Director of the Glenwood Public Library (Nebraska). She was named Directory of the Rock Island Public Library in 2013. Kathy Lelonek is Executive Director of the Rock Island Public Library Foundation. The Foundation is the principal fundraising support organization for the Library. Today their joint presentation was a detailed update of Library activities. Angela led off calling the Library the "Greatest Place on Earth" and stating there is "Magic within the Walls". Then with a screen shared presentation she took us through Library funding, services, response to COVID, and new library projects. Turning first to funding, she pointed out that 78% of funding for our library comes from city property taxes and another 9% comes from library district property taxes. The remaining 13% comes from donations, sale of assets, and fines & fees. Library expenses go 65% for personnel including benefits, and 18% for services (maintenance, snow removal, etc.) Angela stated that there are currently 34 people employed by the library, several being part time. Over the past 8 years the staff has been reduced due to budget restraint and improved efficiency. Remaining expenses were taken by multiple small line items. Turning to Library Services, Angela highlighted the Mobile Library Service, a pending YMCA Partnership, a new Home Bound Delivery program, Curb Service Delivery, multiple online programs, and the School Outreach program. The Library also provides a trained staff of librarians and a collection of over 175,000 print materials, plus an unlimited number of online assets. She noted that last year over 98,000 library materials were used by library patrons. Angela then described programs developed in response to the COVID pandemic. She said that the library was forced to close on March 17th last year under order of the Governor. They re-opened and began offering virtual services in April. Among the services developed were Electronic Library Cards, the Home Bound Delivery Service, Curb Side Delivery, the PrairieCat app allowing virtual access to library resources from all over the country, the Dial-a-Story program, online library card application and renewal, virtual and drive-through services, instituting RockFi, which allows school children online access to their homework and library resources, the development of the extremely popular "Take It – Make It Kits" allowing projects formerly done at the library to be done at home, and the "Library to Go" Mobile Library. Then moving to new projects Director Campbell stated that the HVAC system at the downtown facility was recently upgraded, new fan coils, lighting and reorganizing office spaces are in progress. For another major new project, Angela turned the program over to Kathy. Kathy stated that the Library and the Two Rivers YMCA in Moline are fundraising to acquire the former Tri-City Jewish Center in Rock Island, making it a first-of-its-kind community center in the Quad-Cities. Under the plan both the library and the Y would get what they want: The library would acquire a new space significantly larger and with much better parking than its 30/31 Branch which was closed, and the Moline Y would be able to expand its services and programming into Rock Island.

The building at 2715 30th St. is bigger than either entity needs alone. Under the proposal the Y will purchase the Jewish center site and will lease the library the space it needs, about 30% of the roughly 34,000 square-foot center. Both the Y and the library foundation are working to raise money — the library foundation hopes to raise 35 percent and the Y hopes to secure the remaining 65 percent — and each group would retain the equity it raised. That is, if for some reason in the future the building were sold, each entity would get its value back out. Because the center is to be funded by a capital campaign, the city of Rock Island is not being asked for money to finance the new space. "This is a win for Rock Island," said Lelonek. "We need it." She also hopes the center could be "a good area for teens. They don't have a place where they can work on projects, use their computers, and relax". The new facility will also offer an outdoor, fenced, reading garden. Campbell added that the new facility offers potential for many new and wonderful options. Lelonek added that the new facility is centrally located in Rock Island and is on a major bus line. By operating there, the library figures that every resident will be within three miles of a library, and will be within walking distance of six schools, including Rock Island High School. Under the proposal, the library would occupy 9,000 to 11,000 square feet on the building's east side, the Y would occupy 20,000 square feet on the west side and together they would share about 3,000 square feet. For the library, the Jewish center would become a centrally located branch, with more space and parking, a large meeting room and several smaller meeting rooms, which are in high demand, and a dedicated space for teens. Director Lelonek said the campaign goal is \$7.26 million and that a very active committee headed by Mark Schweibert, Tom Thoms, and Heidi Huiskamp have quietly been hard at work. About half the goal has been raised and the main public campaign has not yet been launched. The goal is to have all the funds raised by September. In concluding Campbell noted that the Rock Island Public Library will soon be celebrating its 150th Anniversary. A Task forces is being formed to help plan a year long celebration. FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to March, the Water and Sanitation Month of Rotary International.

March is the month when RI focuses on water and sanitation projects worldwide. TRF is changing the world by providing grants for projects aimed at improving water, sanitation and hygiene. Since 2013, TRF has invested in more than 1,000 WASH (Water, Sanitation and Hygiene) projects in more than 100 countries. To kick off the Water and Sanitation Month, this Foundation Minute’s report highlights a project reflecting this theme.

A Rotary Foundation Global Grant recently made it possible for \$85,000 worth of PPE (personal protective equipment) to be donated to 415 facilities across Minnesota. The initial grant for the project came from The Rotary Club of Maple Grove along with the India Association of Minnesota and several clubs from Thane, India. TRF provided the Global Grant of \$60,000 to supplement the financial contributions of Rotary Clubs of City of Lakes, Uptown, Golden Valley, St. Louis Park, Plymouth and Minneapolis. The 415 facilities beneficiaries of this grant received 400 gallons of hand sanitizer, 150,000 disposable wipes, 625 goggles, 70,000 gloves, 56,000 disposable masks, 9,000 KN95 masks, 1,575 face shields, 400 thermometers, 500 oximeters, 1,000 fabric gowns and 8,000 fabric masks.

The Rotary Club of Rock Island, Illinois is supplying fresh, clean, potable water to over 17,000 children in village schools in rural Kenya through their Western Illinois – Eastern Iowa Water Project. Together with 15 other Rotary Clubs, money has been raised to purchase 244 LifeStraw Community water filters each capable of providing safe drinking water for seventy children for 3 years before an inexpensive replacement filter module is needed for another 3 years of service. The costs of an individual filter is \$350, delivered to Kenya with use instructions and sanitation training.
