blended classrooms. Hopefully, the school will be able to return to near-normal for 2021-22 and we will be able to resume our monthly Birthday Books and our Pumpkin Palooza. Even though hampered by the pandemic, much has been accomplished and much more is in the works for the future. Ms. Leonard began her comments with a big "Thank You" to Rock Island Rotary saying all we do for Earl Hanson is "overwhelming". She then mentioned the Chess Class lead by Tom Hammar, Birthday Books, the Pumpkin Palooza, and Angel Tree, as some of the things we do. In describing each, she became a tad emotional when talking about Angel Tree saying it was just amazing to see the children receive their Angel Tree gifts. Principal Leonard said that the 50th Anniversary of Earl Hanson School occurred during the pandemic and the celebration was put on "hold". However, in the near future they plan a birthday celebration with every student receiving a new book, a boxed cake mix to take home along with all the ingredients necessary to make a celebratory birthday cake. Ms. Leonard then reviewed what went on in Learning this year; What is planned for the Summer; The outlook for next Fall; and a look beyond into the future. During the past year she noted there were many challenges arising from the pandemic and schools closing. There was an immediate demand for increased technology. Every child was provided with a Chrome Book (laptop computer) to use at home. Internet access was provided to all students by agreements with Mediacom and installation of base stations throughout the community. Staff collaboration and training was stepped up to meet the challenge of teaching virtually. A major issue was the loss of school breakfast and lunch programs when the buildings closed. In response the school began a food take home program that distributed meals to kids several times each week. Staff members conducted numerous home visits to help set up computers, provide training on how to use Google Classroom, and to check on the wellbeing of students who were not attending virtual classes or failing to hand in homework. At times teachers were working with both in-class students and at-home students at the same time! The challenges were great; but were met by the Earl Hanson staff. Turning to plans for the summer, Principal Leonard, said that their typical summer program was being expanded with Spring Forward providing the bulk of the services. The goal will be to "catch kids up" who may have fallen behind during the pandemic. In the fall Ms. Leonard said the staff will "meet kids where they are" meaning if they have fallen behind, teachers will adjust their normal routine to bring kids back to grade level as quickly as possible. An additional challenge for Earl Hanson arises from a significant refugee student population with nine different languages spoken at the school. Hanson has 1 full and 1 part-time staff member with ESL certification. When asked what she would like to see in the future at Earl Hanson she said development of an outdoor education area would be high on her wish list. For now, 275 of Hanson's 375 students are back in the building. Thank you, Sarah Leonard, for a job well done and a very informative program!

FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week 4 of RI's Month of Water and Sanitation.

This week's sole report is culled from a published news on TRF's contribution to hopefully ending the scourge of Malaria in Africa.

Malaria, a preventable disease caused by a parasite spread through the bites of infected mosquitoes, disproportionately affects children under the age of five and pregnant women in rural populations. To help end malaria in Zambia, The Rotary Foundation, World Vision USA, and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation will each contribute \$2 million for the Rotary-led Partners for a Malaria-Free Zambia program. This \$6 million program will add 2,500 community health workers to the national health system in Zambia, allowing for effective malaria diagnosis and treatment for more than 1.3 million people in ten of the most highly affected districts in Central and Muchinga provinces.

"By empowering community health workers, more people in areas with little to no access to health care will now be reached by trusted members of their communities," said Bill Feldt, member of the Rotary Club of Federal Way in Washington, USA, who spearheaded the program. "This proven health care delivery model is effective and financially sustainable and will bring lasting protection by reducing and eliminating this disease at the local level." Martha Lungu, executive director for Malaria Partners Zambia, an affiliate of Malaria Partners International, and member of the Rotary Club of Ndola (Zambia) said, "Every day I witness firsthand the effects of malaria. This program demonstrates that Rotary members are true partners in our communities and are focused on supporting community health workers to help loosen the grip malaria has on the Zambian people."

Partners for a Malaria-Free Zambia is the first awardee for Rotary's Programs of Scale grant. In an annual competitive grant process, The Rotary Foundation, Rotary's philanthropic arm, will award \$2 million to an evidence-based program that aligns with one of Rotary's causes and has the capability for scaling-up to help more people. The programs are sponsored by Rotary members in collaboration with local communities and partner organizations.

K.R. "Ravi" Ravindran, Trustee Chair of The Rotary Foundation believes that "the power of Rotary is greatly magnified when we partner with like-minded organizations. As we've learned from our global effort to eradicate polio, our impact on communities is further augmented when compatible partners contribute their own specialized skills, talents and finances to support our efforts."




It is NOT too early to start collecting great ideas and items for our Silent Auction.
