BERT BLOOD Scholarships 2021

farm near Cambridge, Illinois, graduated from Iowa's Cornell college and then the University of Chicago. Professionally, Bert was Superintendent of Schools in Tiskilwa and Park Ridge, Illinois for 17 years, and served as President of the Cook County Teachers Association and as Secretary of the Educational Council of Cook County. In 1917, he opened the A.M. Blood Co., a school supply business in Rock Island. He became a Rock Island Rotary Club member in 1920 and served as our club's honorary president during 1969–70. Bert chaired the agricultural committee of the Rock Island Chamber of Commerce. Although an urban businessman, Bert never lost touch with his rural roots. He organized our club's annual Rural/Urban program up to his death, at age 101 in 1972. Bert not only challenging 4-H students to academic excellence, but also worked to ensure that Rock Island Rotary kept in touch with our dependence on rural production and supply. To honor his 101 years of life and preserve his rural legacy, our Club established a \$101 memorial scholarship in 1973 awarded annually to a college bound high school student who, in the eyes of our club's judges, presented the best 4-H project. As tuition costs increased and with the help of Rock Island County's 4-H Foundation, the program was expanded, and funding increased. We now present scholarships of \$1,500, \$1,250, \$1,000 to high school seniors and two \$500 scholarships to current college students. This year's high school scholarship winner receiving a \$1,500 Scholarship is Katelyn Oleson, Rural Cordova, Illinois. Katelyn is a senior at Riverdale Senior High School and has been accepted at the University of Kansas-Lawrence and will major in Biology with post-graduate plans for medical school. Katelyn's project was raising and training horses. She related how from getting her first pony as a child the experience has helped develop her character and personality. She learned to deal with adversity from getting bucked off and wiping away the tears and getting back on. She learned responsibility from learning to care for, feed, groom, and train her horses. She learned commitment and passion which also led to volunteering at Hope Creek Nursing Home and at the Quad City Animal Shelter where she also donated animal supplies. In addition to 4H, she is also active in high school basketball, volleyball, softball, and National Honor Society. The Runner-up receiving a \$1,250 Scholarship is Ryan Parchert, Rural Illinois City, Illinois. Ryan is a senior at Rockridge High School and plans to attend the University of Wisconsin-Platteville and will Major in Agricultural Business. His project was farrowing, raising, caring for, showing, and marketing pigs. From pre-birth care through farrowing, vaccinating, feeding, and grooming Ryan took us step by step through the process all the way to showing at fairs and marketing pigs to lockers and to other youngsters just starting into pork production. Our Second Runner-up receiving a \$1,000 Scholarship is Emma Hogren, Rural Port Byron, Illinois. Emma is a senior at Riverdale Senior High School. She plans to attend Drake University and will Dual Major in Art History and Biology. Emma' project was the entire 4H experience. 4H is so much more than agriculture, Emma said. 


FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week 2 of Rotary International's Month of Maternal & Child Health.

During this past week in Rotary, several clubs around the globe contributed one way or the other toward making the world a better place, especially for mothers and their children. In continuation with the theme of Maternal and Child Health, the Rotary Club of Gibsons in British Columbia, Canada, carried out a Rotary Foundation funded project to help South African mothers be more self-dependent. A report published by Coast Reporter states that when it comes to their international service projects, the Rotary Club of Gibsons has a clear mandate: to provide a "hand up" and not a hand-out.

This attitude was evident in the club's most recent project that delivered 100 Survival Garden Kits to vulnerable women in South Africa. The \$20,000 raised by the club was supplemented with a \$10,000 grant from the Rotary Foundation. As a result, 100 families now have the gardening tools, seedlings, fertilizer, and training to plant



homestead gardens. "The COVID pandemic has created another challenge in many developing countries," said Lynne Geikie, club treasurer. "It's a hunger pandemic; a shortage of food. These garden kits will help create food security for struggling families, not just immediately but for the long term as well."

The kits were distributed in celebration of World Water Day, March 22. Central to the garden kits is the hippo water roller, an innovative tool that gives women an easier and more efficient way to transport water to their gardens. The hippo roller moves five times more water and with considerably less effort than the traditional method of carrying buckets on the head.

Emma got involved in Art and Photography through 4H and took advantage of opportunities to perform community service, learn leadership, and become skilled in public speaking. She stated that her family has a long involvement with 4H, both as members and as club sponsors. She believes 4H offered her multiple experiences that made her what she is today. Our college winners were selected from applicants who were "graduates" of 4H and are continuing their studies in 4H related areas. Receiving college scholarship of \$500 each are Mia Freyermuth, Rural Illinois City, Illinois. Mia is a sophomore at Illinois Central College majoring in Agricultural Business with a minor in Ag Communications; and, Hunter Johnson, Rural Reynolds, Illinois attending Northeastern Oklahoma A&M College. His major is Agricultural Transfer. Rock Island Rotary congratulates all our 2021 Bert Blood Scholarship winners! Jenny Garner from the University of Illinois Extension service also provided an update on Extension activities during the past "pandemic" year. All services went virtual in March of last year however the Service adapted quickly, and an array of virtual programs were created, mixed with "hands on" options through curb-side programs and "Activities in a Bag" handouts that reached over 2,480 per month, plus another 1,200 in programs provided to area schools. Very popular programs were the Wellness Trail Challenge (over 4,400 participated) and on-line cooking and gardening classes. Live 4H shows will return this summer and they hope to be full-time face to face by September. Thanks to 4H and the Extension Service for again partnering with us in this great program!

ROTARIANS SPEAK VIA SURVEY



With immunizations rapidly increasing, passing 183,000,000 in the United States¹, and the Covid mortality rate dropping to 1.8% in the US², and restrictions loosening even in states such as Illinois, one of the strictest in pandemic regulation, Rock Island Rotary recently surveyed members regarding the possibility of returning to in-person meetings. Sixty members responded to the survey, many offering personal thoughts and comments. The response rate, approximately 70% of those eligible to reply, is in and of itself

incredible and greatly appreciated. Thanks to Molly Shattuck and Hammer Accounting for providing the mechanism and tallying the results of the survey. In summary, approximately 38% of responders would like to reconvene in-person meeting immediately.36% don't object to an immediate resumption but would personally continue attending via ZOOM. About 19% are opposed to an immediate resumption of inperson meetings. Moving forward a month, the numbers change dramatically. 60% would attend in person if such meetings begin in May. 20% have no objection to a May resumption, but personally would continue via ZOOM. Those opposed to May in-person meetings drop to less than 7%, however about 19% think inperson meetings should not begin until all Covid restrictions are lifted, and the pandemic is essentially over. Over 80% of responders agree that pandemic or not, a virtual option for meeting attendance should be continued on an ongoing basis. Regarding dues, 73% supported continuing our reduced dues rate of \$50 for the final quarter of 2020-21 (April-June). If in-person meetings do reconvene during the quarter, those attending in person would individually pay for their lunch. Our Club board of directors will review all the survey data carefully at their April 19th meeting and be tasked with deciding what course our Club will take. 
