Two of our Club's finest were recognized today at Rock Island Rotary's 47th Annual Awards Luncheon. Molly Shattuck received our club's highest honor, the A.T. Peara Award. Named in honor of Absolom T. Peara, the Award is a lifetime award and may be won just once by each recipient. It is presented to the Rock Island Rotarian deemed to best represent the ideals of Rotary International, which are summed up in the Rotary motto, Service Above Self, and in Rotary's Four Way Test: Is it the Truth, Is it Fair to All Concerned, Will it Build Goodwill and Better Friendships, Will it be Beneficial to all concerned. Molly joined Rock Island Rotary in 2013. In her 8 years of Club membership Molly has served several terms on our Board of Directors, has taken over Chairing our Earl Hanson partnership, and has been a hard-working volunteer in multiple Club projects and activities. As chair of the Earl Hanson partnership. she has for several years organized and attended every monthly Birthday Book celebration and has been our principle contact with the school and its principal, including promoting participation of their staff in our Trivia Night, and periodically soliciting information regarding the needs of the school. Molly has chaired our annual Angel Tree Project for the past several years and this year also participated in our project to make and distribution winter scarfs for children in need. Molly has displayed a dedication to Rotary and has involved her entire family in numerous projects including hanging holiday lights at the Botanical Center, walking and bike riding along with our cars and floats in the Labor Day Parade, and participating in our Rotary Ramble, Rotary at the Ball Park, and numerous other projects, in fact It would be difficult to name a Rotary activity that Molly has not participated in. Recently she took on the job of running a survey of our members regarding the resumption of luncheon meetings. She solicited the information, tabulated the responses, and prepared a report for our Board. Since we began meeting again in person, Molly has been a key person in setting up the ZOOM coverage of our meetings and regularly assists our guest speakers on how to make their presentation to both our live and zoom attendees. Molly has proven herself as a great example of all that A.T. Peara She has done all of this and committed great amounts of time to Rotary and service to others while completing her education to become a CPA, working long hours at Hammar Accounting, and raising and caring for her growing young family.

The Luckenbill-Wray Award named in memory of Fred Luckenbill and Sam Wray is presented to a Club member for Outstanding Service to Rock Island Rotary. Today **Ruth Lee** became just the second person to win this special award. Ruth served as Club President in 2005-06 and in 2013-14 served as Governor for Rotary District 6420 encompassing all Northern Illinois except for the Chicago area. She won the Club's A.T. Peara Award in 2009. Ruth is a Level II (\$25,000-\$50,000) Rotary International Major Donor and a Rotary International Paul Harris Society Member. Over the past two years she has donated her Foundation Recognition Points

Tom Sigel - 2021 Excellence Award

John Phillips – 2021 Community Service Award

Two outstanding citizens were honored today by Rock Island Rotary. The Rotary Excellence Award was presented to **Thom Sigel**, head boys' basketball coach at rock Island High School for past 20 years. The Excellence Award recognizes a person who in their chosen career or profession rises to heights far and above those of others in their field. The 2021 Honoree surprised many when after completing his 20th season as Rock Island's head boys' basketball coach earlier this year he announced his retirement

from coaching with an overall record of 502 wins and just 241 losses. During twenty years at Rock Island, Coach Sigel guided teams to ten Western Big 6 titles, 12 Regional Championships, two Sectional Championships, and in 2011 won the IHSA State Championship. Sigel came to Rock Island after six years as head coach at his alma mater high school in Rock Falls, Illinois. Rock Falls High School was his first head coaching opportunity where he won 127 games and lost just 52. In 1999 his Rock Falls "Rockets" won the Class A State Championship. When he was enticed away to come to Rock Island he left as the all-time winningest coach in Rock Falls history. To this day he is the only coach in Illinois history to have won State Championships in two different classes. In the spring of 2017 Sigel was inducted into the IBCA Hall of Fame. Coach Sigel is a graduate of Knox College, with an English major. He earned a Masters' degree from Western Illinois University in counseling and is currently in his 20th year as a Guidance Counselor at RIHS. As a coach and counselor Thom has influenced and been the role model for hundreds of young adults. Thom's wife, Alicia, is a teacher at Earl Hanson Elementary School in Rock Island. Their three children Trey, Haley, and Colton all went through the Rock Island school system. All three were outstanding students and All Conference athletes.

Fellow Rotarian, John Phillips was named winner of the 2021 Community Service Award which is presented to a citizen who has exhibited an outstanding commitment in serving our community. Since retiring from his long-time position at Rock Island City Manager, John has immersed himself in voluntary community service. He is currently President of the Rock Island-Milan Education Foundation and is a former board member of the Rock Island Community Foundation and is a current board member of the Genesius Theater Foundation. He has served on the Illinois Quad City Chamber of Commerce board, the Western Illinois Area Agency on Aging board, the United Way of the Quad Cities board, the Quad City Civic Center Authority board, and was a board member of the Development Association of Rock Island. John was instrumental in bringing the Incubator Entrepreneur program to Rock Island High School and spearheaded the effort to fund the project. John is an active Rotarian serving as club president in 2015-16 and winning the A.T. Peara Award in 2019. He currently serves as our Club Foundation Development Committee chairman. He is a Paul Harris Fellow and has volunteered and led numerous Rotary community project including stringing lights for the Botanical Center's Holiday Lights presentation, leading the Rotary Urban Gardens project, helping spring gardening and planting at the Botanical Center, and annually volunteers to man the kettle and ring the bell for the Salvation Army. John also frequently volunteers his talents as a singer, song writer and guitarist entertaining for at various community organizations and events. He frequently includes his wife Karen in his volunteer activities. The couple has two grown children, Michael and Katie who are both graduates of Rock Island High School. MORE AWARDS ON PAGE 4

TOP STUDENTS IN ROCK ISLAND HIGH SCHOOLS

The Rock Island Rotary Club honored the top two students from Rock Island High School, Alleman Catholic High School and Augustana College at today's 2021 Rotary Awards Luncheon.

Recognized as the scholastic best from Rock Island High School were Say Say and Noah Rettig. **Say Say** is the daughter of Pono Annai and Sandar Annai. She is a member and Vice-President of the National Honor Society and a Charles O. Austin Jr. Scholar. Her activities at Rocky include the Math Team, German Club, and the Environmental Action Club. She was captain of the varsity Girls Soccer Team, a member of the Student Council, and a Rock Island High School Student Ambassador. Say served as a Junior Marshall for the Class of 2020 graduation and receive the DAR Good Citizen Award. She received an Illinois High School Association Scholastic Award and the Western Big 6 Academic All-Conference Scholastic Awards. Outside the school she is a member of the First Baptist Church, Moline Youth Group. She plans to attend Black Hawk College's transfer program with a Computer Science major. Her long-term goal is to start her own small business.

Noah Rettig is the son of Kevin and Heidi Rettig. He is a member of the National Honor Society and is a National Interscholastic Swim Coaches Association Academic All-American. Noah is an Illinois State Scholar and was named Academic All-Conference by the Western Big 6 Conference and received an IHSA Scholastic Achievement Award. He was recognized by the Rocky math department as their "Number 1" student. Noah also received a Top 10 Austin Academic Achievement Award. He is a four-year member of the varsity swim team, the Pride of Rock Island Marching Band, and the Symphonic Band. He is also a member of the award-winning Rock Island Chamber Singers. Outside of school Noah is a Lifeguard and Lifeguard Instructor for the Rock Island Parks and Recreation Department. After graduation he will be attending Augustana College majoring in computer science.

Alleman's top seniors are Caroline Adam and Gage Mowry. **Caroline Adam's** parents are Johnna and Tim Adam. She is a member of the National Honor Society and was an Illinois Council of Teachers of Mathematics State Qualifier. Caroline was also a WISE Academic Challenge State Qualifier and was IHSA Academic All State Honorable Mention. She received Western Big 6 Conference and IHSA Scholastic Awards and is a Rev. John O'Connor Scholar. She served as Student Council Vice President, chaired the student Blood Drive, and was a 4-year member of Sigma Alpha Delta (Students Against Destructive Decisions). Caroline is an Alleman Student Ambassador and also participated in the Student Hunger Drive. She was captain of the Dance Marathon, participated in basketball, cross country, and track and was named captain of all three teams for two years. She was a state qualifier in cross country and track. Out of school she was a volunteer for the John Deere Classic, the Alleman Summer Youth Sports Camp, the Jordan School Summer Camp, served as a Hy-Vee Aisles Online Employee and participated in Teens Encounter Christ. Caroline plans to attend the University of Michigan and will major in Biomedical Engineering.

Gage Mowry is the son of Craig and Barb Mowry. He too is a member of the National Honor Society and a Rev. John O'Conner Scholar. Gage was a National Merit Finalist and on the Principal's list. He is a member of the Alleman Student Council and was named Scholastic All Conference by the Western Big 6 Conference. TOP STUDENTS AT AUGUSTANA COLLEGE

Leading the Academic way at Augustana College are Jaclyn Hernandez and Kristian Mrazek. Jaclyn Hernandez is the daughter of Carol and Ray Hernandez of Palatine, Illinois. She was a member of the Prose Board for SAGA (Augustana's literary magazine) for two years and then became one of the Prose Editors her junior and senior years. She authored a short story "More Than the Grass and Stars" which won honorable mention in prose for SAGA's 2018-2019 edition. She has had either a short story, poem, or piece of art published in SAGA every year during her years at Augustana. Jaclyn was a member of Unabridged (Augustana's literary club) for four years and served as Vice President her senior year. The English department awarded her the Thomas F. and Wanda W. Hanson scholarship her junior year and the Roald Tweet Scholar in English Studies Award her senior year. Jaclyn won third place in the long analytical essay category for the Audre Lorde Prize awarded by the Women, Gender, and Sexuality Studies department. She interned under Dr. Karin Youngberg for East Hall Press for two years and has been on the Dean's list every trimester/semester during her time at Augustana. Outside of school she worked as a Reading/Writing Center tutor for three years. During the summer of 2020 she was accepted into New York University's Summer Publishing Institute and received a certificate in publishing. After graduation Jaclyn will pursue a career in publishing with a goal of being an editor for children's or young adult books. She says, "I understand the importance a good book can make in a child's life. I want to be a part of the process that helps make a child's favorite book come to life."

Kristian Mrazek is the son of Paula and Bruce Mrazek of Cary, Illinois. He is a member of Sigma Pi Sigma a nation physics honor society, and Pi Mu Epsilon a mathematics honor society. He served as president of the Augustana Astronomy Club and was a member of the Augustana Physics and Engineering Society (APES) and the Chess Club. Kristian was on the Dean's List every term of his Augustana career. He participated in the Radio Astronomy Research Project and authored a Human-Computer Interaction (HCI) Research Paper with Machine Learning. Outside of School he was selected to participate in the University of Colorado's REU (Research Experience for Undergraduates) in Solar and Space Physics, a paid summer research experience for highly motivated students interested in solar and space physics. Students spend 10 weeks in Boulder, Colorado working on a research project with a mentor. The topic areas span the field of solar and space physics, from instrument hardware to data analysis to modeling of the Sun, the Sun-Earth system, the near-Earth environment, or the heliosphere. After Graduation Kristian hopes to land a job in software development or data science (preferably with physics application) and plans to apply to Astrophysics Ph.D. programs for the fall of 2021.

Welcome to Week 4 of Rotary International's Youth Service Month.




