

Norm Moline Professor Emeritus of geography, Augustana College



Dr. Norm Moline, retired after 45 years of teaching at Augustana College. He founded the first U.S. college study-abroad program in China, and Augustana first went there in 1974, a connection that led to the Asian studies program at the college. He also co-founded the environmental studies program long before the interdisciplinary field became well known on college campuses. He is also a long time resident of Rock Island and a keen observer of people and cultures. His Ph.D. dissertation focused on the changes in personal mobility and the character of towns from 1900 to 1930 after the arrival of the automobile and good roads. He is a frequent tour guide and narrator for tours locally of the rivers, ravines, and historicle landmarks in and around Rock Island. Today he gave one

of his "lighter side" presentations on how cities use signage to welcome people. Sounds interesting and it was - and funny too! Professor Moline started by saying that small towns in particular have developed "Booster Spirit" which is a drive to survive as a desirable place on the map. He says striving to have an identity to set themselves apart from other communities is the motivation for slogans and claims appearing on signs greeting visitors to their communities. He then showed a small portion of the over 500 photos he has taken of welcoming sings during his travels around the United States and the world. He notes that the signs can fall in many categories, the first of which is those that simply offer a "Welcome". Another category is those that promote the community as a "Good place to live" and raise a family. A closely related category are the signs promoting the community as a "Good Place to Grow" with emphasis on community pride and progress. Yet another group of signs place emphasis on the community's "Friendliness and Nice People". An example Moline showed was the welcome sign for Hungry Horse, Mondana which is the location of the Hungry Horse Dam on the Flathead River. Their sign reads: Welcome to Hungry Horse – The Nicest Dam Town in the West". Another category of signs claim the community is the "Heart" or "Center" of something which might be a region, as state, or even a continent. Placeing an emphasis on the geographic location of the community is another category of signs that claim the town is at the "Crossroads" of something. Those that are not at the heart or crossroads may fall into another classification, those signs that claim the community to be the "Gateway" or "Entry" into an area or region. Communities have on occasion attempted to set themselve apart from others by claiming to be "One of a Kind". Amadon, North Dakota's welcome sign says, "The Smallest County Seat in the Nation". Another frequently used category relies on a community's natural features and make claims such as the "Geese, Duck, Walleye, or Hog Capital of the World". Recreational assets are also often highlighed on welcome signs such emphasizing things like sking, hiking, boating, etc. Another often used welcome promotes the ethnicity of the community with claims such as "Little Holland", boasting of their heritage. A tactic used by many communities is using the identity of a famous person such as LeClaire, Iowa whose sign says "Birthplace of Buffalo Bill". Some towns just claim to be the largest or best at something.; Others capitalize on being little such as "Our Town Is Small, But or Welcome is Huge" or "Cleanest Little Town in the South". Finally there are those that claim to have it all, "Best people, Best Climate, Best Jobs", etc. All in all, it was a fun tour of the small towns throughout the world and the signs were often clever and fun. Dr. Moline invites us all to snap a photo if we see a unique or interesting welcome sign and send it to him. He said he'd love to add it to his collection. Thanks Dr. Moline for another fun and entertaining program.

FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week 2 of RI's Month of Transition

Three and a half years ago, thousands of people across Swindon, United Kingdom, and surrounding villages came together for a special fundraising appeal. They jumped out of planes, cycled across the UK, drove to Cyprus and Mongolia, climbed Mount Kilimanjaro, took on the UK Great North and South Runs and the London Marathon. At the end of the three-year long effort, Rotarians in Swindon have raised a third of their 2.9-million-pound goal. The news this week from Great Britain is that the new radiotherapy center at the Great Western Hospital, Swindon, is operational. Rotarians contributed over \$166,000 USD which was matched by The Rotary Foundation with an additional \$243,295. This is the largest ever Rotary Foundation Grant to be awarded to a project based in the United Kingdom and Ireland. The center will improve access to radiotherapy and cancer treatment in the south of England.

District Rotary Foundation chair and member of the Global Grant team, Peter Wells said: "This is a local effort by local Rotarians from Swindon, Royal Woolton Bassett and Marlborough, backed by Rotary International. This is what Rotary is all about: delivering practical projects that provide potentially life-changing solutions to local problems."

As we transit to the new year, let us continue to further the goals of The Rotary Foundation: advancing world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health...among others.
