MEETING TUESDAY NOON - QUAD CITY BOTANICAL CENTER

Dr. Louis Katz Infectious Disease Medical Director Scott County Health Department

Dr. Katz is a board-certified internist and infectious diseases specialist who trained and interned at the University of Iowa and has over 45 years of experience in the medical field. He is an Adjunct Clinical Professor of Internal Medicine at the Roy and Lucille Carver College of Medicine, former Chief



Medical Officer at America's Blood Centers in Washington, DC, an ABC past president, former board member and a past chair of its Scientific, Medical and Technical committee. He has authoried more than sixty peer reviewed publications and book chapters. As a clinician Dr. Katz founded and directed a Ryan White funded comprehensive HIV/AIDS clinic in the Iowa/Illinois Quad Cities, and was an infectious diseases consultant and hospital epidemiologist at Genesis Medical Center until assuming his ABC responsibilities in 2012. the medical director of the Scott County Health Department and The Project of the Quad Cities, an organization providing both HIV/AIDS and sexually transmitted infections services in a bistate area. Today Dr. Katz began his speech with words we didn't want to hear, "Everyone, whether vaccinated or not, should be wearing a mask and practicing social distancing at all indoor gatherings." He later qualified the statement a bit saying mask wearing is recommended when indoors in a group where it is possible that not all present are vaccinaed. A second statement was just as hard to hear when he declaired that fully 25% of the hundreds of thousands of Covid deaths did not have to die. That he blamed on the politicians and the politicization of the pandemic and vaccines. He then turned to an informative and detailed powerpoint presentation. He referenced a 6 fold spike in the number of Covid diagnosis and hospitalization over the past two weeks. He also said that 90-95% of the new cases were occurring in non-vaccinated people, and he stressed that it is going to get worse, noting that the Delta variant is two times easier to transmit than the original Covid virus. The remainder of his presentation centered on the reason for the spike, which he attributed to vaccine hesitancy. He stated that in the United States more that 81% of citizens over the age of 64 have been vaccinated, however in the age groups of 12 -15 and 16-17 less tham 30% are vaccinated. There also seems to be a political division with 80% of those identifying as Democrats having been vaccinated compared to just 60% of those identifying as Republicans. [Stange since President Trump was the driving force to get the vaccine and was one of the first to take the shots.] Dr. Katz argued that all of the scientific evidence verifies that the vaccines are safe and effective. He also stressed that none of the customary steps taken to develop, test, and certify the safety of the vaccines were skipped or short cutted, saying that the reason the vaccine became available soo quickly was that rather than going through the various steps one after another, the steps were done in parallel development. Pharmaceutical companies started the process of preparing their factories and obtaining the necessary materials to produce the vaccine at the same time the testing was going on. So as each phase of the process was completed, it was passed to an already underway next phase. The time saving was amazing! But the full and normal study of the drugs was done as thoroughally and independently as in the past. Dr. Katz then told us the steps required for a vaccine to receive Emergency Use Authorization (EUA). It first must be shown that the virus posed a serious threat to life. Second there must be proof that the benefit of the vaccine outways any risk it might pose. Finally it must be shown that there is no adequate alternative available. Having established proof of those steps, the current vaccines were given EUA approval. Dr. Katz believes that full approval, removing the emergency label, will be given by the CDC next month. He said again that the available Covid vaccines work and work incredibly well. He also said that demonstrating that a vaccine works is an 6 step process: 1) It must prevent the infection; 2) It must prevent illness; 3) It must prevent hospitalization; 4) It must prevent needing critical care (ICU); 5) It must prevent death; and 6) It must stop transmission of the disease. The currently approved vaccines passed each of those tests. Thank you Dr. Katz!

FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week 4 of Rotary International's Month of Transition.

Women older than 40 are used to hearing the advice from doctors to undergo an annual mammogram to screen for possible breast cancer. It's a potentially lifesaving test, but also one that involves a sometime painful compression of the breast – a fact that deters some women from getting the procedure. Now, new technology is trying to make the test less painful and more comfortable. Some Southwest Pennsylvania Rotary Clubs have helped to bring this technology to local patients. Rotary Clubs from Belle Vernon, Charleroi, Monessen/Rostraver, Monongahela, Pleasant Hills and West Newton pooled their resources and received a matching grant money from The Rotary Foundation for a donation to the Monongahela Valley Hospital HealthPlex. The \$10,000 TRF grant contributed to the overall cost of a new breast imaging technology. The HOLOGIC R SmartCurveTM Breast Stabilization System will provide women with a more comfortable mammogram without compromising the accuracy of their imaging.
