



International Professional Relations, work as a Realtor with Ruhl & Ruhl, and a lengthy stint of almost 28 years working as a professional improvisational comedian. She was a regular on stage for the polular "Comedy Sports" in Rock Island. She served as Executive Director of the Epilepsy Foundation of North Central Illinois, Iowa & Nebraska for five years prior to becoming Executive Director of the Rock Island-Milan Education Association in the fall of 2015. Today she gave in informative resentation supported by numerous photos on the excellent work done by the Education Foundation. Monta stated that the Foundation began when a small group of local citizens while chatting informally decided to "help" local students. They began offering donations and quickly came up with \$1,500. A year later in 1985 the group became an official 501(c3) charitable organization and in their 5th year had raised contributions of \$5,000. Today, just over 35 years later, Monta reports that the Foundation assets are now just under \$4 million. She then reviewed the principal programs established by the Foundation, highlighting "Prime Grants", a program providing grants to teacher of up to \$1,500; to departments and schools with grants up to \$3,000; and grants to district wide project of up to \$5,000. Applications for grants must provide a descript of how the funds will be used and are limited to innovative projects above and beyond what the school district is expected to fund. Recipients are also required to report on the outcome/success of their project at the end of the year in which the award is received. This past year the Foundation awared \$90,000 in grants funding 43 individual projects. Another Foundation program is the Austin Academic Achievement Awards which are given to the Top Ten students of each class at Rock Island high school and the top 2 seniors (as determined by teachers) in eight academic areas including Business, Math, Career & Technical Development, Science, English, Social Studies, Fine Arts, snf World Languages. Monta stated that the only fundraiser of the Foundation, other than direct mailing requests, is a "Major Saver Card" fundraiser. Students assist with the sale of the cards which provide free and discounted deals at numerous local businesses. Through this effort \$241,000 has been raised in the past seven years. Another Foundation project is providing a welcome bag to every new teacher and administrator that joins the Rock Isalnd-Milan School District. Included in the bag are gift cards from local school supply companies, along with coupons and cards for special treats such as Whitey's Ice Cream. Information about the Foundation is also included in the bags. This has been extremely well received by faculty and staff members. A relatively new project is the "Bright Ideas Award". Teachers that come up with an idea that will enhance their room or class can apply for a grant of \$200. Ideas need to be innovative and of direct benefit to the students in the class. A very successful project of the Foundation is the Incubator Entrepreneurship program at Rock Island High School. Rock Island Rotary helped fund the establishment of the program and the Foundation has provided ongoing funding and support. Over the past few years Rock Island students have won the National Championship in Incubator competition and have also placeed in the national quarter-finals and individually a Rocky student was 1 of just 4 students receibing national recognition and an award. Our club provides several mentors and coaches for the program and has an ongoing relationship with the class. Another project of the Foundation is the "Returning Rock" program where a successful graduate of Rocky is brought back to speak and work with current students and tell about their profession and their successes. The biggest program of the Foundation is their scholarship program, which last year awarded \$285,000 in scholarships to Rock Island seniors. All in all it appeas the Foundation is living up to it's Mission Statement, Enhancing Academic Opportunities for Student Success. The foundation is a great asset to our schools and community and Rotarian Monta Ponsetto is a major factor in it's growth and success! Thank you for an excellent program!
