In a joint meeting of Rock Island Rotary and Rock Island Kiwanis, Dr. Reginald Lawrence, Superintendent of Rock Island-Milan Schools presented his third

annual "State of the Schools" address. Dr, Lawrence received his Bachelor of Science and Master of Science in Curriculum & Instruction from the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater. He received his Administrative Leadership Certification in Educational Administration and Supervision from University of WisconsinMilwaukee. In 2016 he earned his Doctor of Education (Ed.D.) in Educational Leadership and Administration from National Louis University-Milwaukee, Dr. Lawrence served our country in the United States Army National Guard from 1985 to 2007 retiring after over 21 years with the rank of Sergeant. Prior to coming to Rock Island, Dr. Lawrence served as Regional Superintendent with the Milwaukee (WI) Public Schools. He also served as a teacher, an assistant principal and principal in Milwaukee Public Schools. He also served as an instructor for the Professional Urban Teaching Linking Seminar at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. Dr. Lawrence was named Rock Island-Milan Superintendent in 2019. He and wife Pandora reside in Rock Island. Dr. Lawrence began his comments with some general School District data noting that the district serves 6,137 students and maintains a 91% attendance average. The student to teacher ratio is 23-1 and the average class size is 23. During the pandemic year school went on with virtual attendance and meals were provided and picked up at school locations throughout the district. In total over 100,000 meals were prepared and distributed to families duri9ng the pandemic. A positive coming out of the pandemic was that now 100% of the district's students are provided a laptop computer and 100% now have access to high speed internet as well as access to Google Classroom which provides remote leaning assistance to the children. Dr. Lawrence then moved into what he dubbed "Points of Pride". He highlighted that during the past year Earl Hanson celebreate its 50th anniversay since opeing in 1970. Even though school was remote learning, athletics with shortened seasons and strict covid restrictions were able to continue and Rock Island garnered a State Championship in the Long Jump won by Samson Shakuru in the state track meet. Rocky's wrestling team under head coach Joel Stockwell won the Regional Championship. Rocky's young artists earned an exhibition at the Figge Art Museum and student Riley Jones of Rock Island High School won the 2021 Congressional Art Competition with her submission "Black Pride" which was displayed in the United States Capitol! Ravon Johnson Taylor was awarded the McKenzie Foundation & Uncharted Learning 2021 Grit Grant award. Chosen as one of four recipients from across the country for his work on "The Cobblers" a project of the Entrepreneurship program at Rocky funded in part by our Rotary Club. Dr. Lawrence was also happy to report that 381 graduates were able to have a "relatively normal" ceremony for their graduation. Members of the graduating class were destined to attend more than 50 different colleges and universities and garnered over \$1,000,000 in scholarships. The class had 75 National Honor Society scholars and 30 members going on to participate in college athletics. The senior class also had 65 Charles O. Austin, Jr. Scholars signifying that during their 4 years at Rocky they maintained a 3.5 or above grade average on a 4.0 scale. The Superintendent also said that the first day of school is a big deal for him and this year he and members of our School Board were at Thomas Jefferson and literally rolled out a red carpet for the students entering their first day of school last month. In innovative programs Dr. Lawrence said the district has developed an apprentiship program with John Deere where student attend classes in the morning and work for John Deere in the afternoon and receive pay for their work. The district has a similar program for those wanting to enter the medical field calld the CNA Program, It is a 2-semester long course that prepares students to becomes Certified Nursing Assistants (CNA). Students who successfully complete the program and pass the Illinois state exam, are able to be employed in hospitals, nursing homes, home care, and clinics.

ONLINE WINE AUCTION A HUGE SUCCESS!

Thanks to the "connections" of Ruth Lee, the great generosity of the Nimble Vineyards, the help of the Rock Island-Milan Booster Club, the support of many club members and their local businesses, and the hard work of a dedicated Rotary committee, our first ever online auction that concluded last Thursday was a tremendous success. The wine was donated (we paid shipping of about \$650), the Rock Island =Milan Booster Club let us use their on-line auction service subscription (they pay \$4,000 annually for it), and our club members donated top shelf liquor and business swag to add to the wine. In the two-week auction held entirely online, a total 214 bids were received for the 20 groupings of wine and swag offered. The auction ended at 8pm on September 2nd and the winning bidders were determined. In total \$5,845 was raised through the wine in the auction, plus an additional \$170 in extra donations brought our total proceeds to \$6,015.00! Thanks to all who participated on the committee, as a bidder, or in supporting the project with donated liquor and swag. One last secret …. We held back a few bottles of the imported Nimble Vineyard wine which will be available in our Trivia Night Silent Auction. So, you have one more chance!

The District has also created a new Intern program for students hoping to become teachers. Successful complete of that program guarantees the student an interview with District 41 when they are ready to begin their teaching career. Dr. Lawrence then turned his attention to the many exciting capital projects recently completed or underway in the district. Among those mentioned were the Stadium where new and badly needed restrooms were added to both sides of the field. New turf was laid on the playing surface and the track wea repaved. The Fieldhouse also received a major renovation with all new bleachers and a section of stadium seats were added and the entire fieldhouse was repainted. Washington Jr. High School received a new secure front entrance, new offices for the nurse and staff, and a redesigned and enlarged lunchroom. Rock Island High School has a new "student friendly" entrance construction project underway which will allow the principal's office along with other administrators to move to the front of the building. The project also included redesigning the cafeteria and added classroom space. In total the new construction will add 38,000 square feet to the high school building. Another major construction project is underway at the corner of 7th Avenue and 20th Street. That will be the location of a new Administration Center, Central Kitchen for the district, and warehouse and storeroom space for school supplies and property. Dr. Lawrence stated that the capital projects are possible because of the 1 cent sales tax. He also noted that through the federal CARES program instituted during the pandemic the district has or will be receiving 32 million dollars. The school district annual budget is just over \$71 million. Finally, Dr. Lawrence spoke of the new 5-year strategic plan for the district which is called RIM 2025. The plan is available for all to read on the school district website, www.rimsd41.org/. They called the plan a "PIPELINE TO A PRODUCTIVE FUTURE". He said the plan places emphasis on respectful relationships, equity, and improving operating procedures. We greatly appreciate Dr. Lawrence and the annual State of the Schools address. It was upbeat, highly informative, and exciting for all interested in the youth and education of Rock Island and Milan children. Thank you!


