Bridge

On October 20th Rock Island Rotarians hosted the first ever live joint meeting of all Quad City area Rotary Clubs. The occasion was the 2021

celebration of World Polio Day. Joining our club at the Botanical Center for an evening Gala were Rotarians from Bettendorf, Davenport, East Moline-Silvis, Geneseo, Quad Cities - Illinois, Iowa Quad Cities, Moline, North Scott, River Cites, and Twin Rivers RAH Clubs. The evening began with a 6pm cocktail party with assorted and delicious hors d'oeuvres. That was followed by a buffet dinner and a special World Polio Day Program. Presidents from each club took part in presenting the program. Alka Khanolkar, District Governor of District 6000 (including the Iowa Quad Cities) and our own Gary Rowe, Assistant District Governor of District 6420 each gave a warm welcome to the large crowd. Governor Khanolkar, traveling from Keokuk to attend and starting her day at 6am with several meetings and club visits throught he day said, "this was an event I was not going to miss". She then congratulation the Quad City Clubs on coming together for the Gala and also told of her own experience participating in two National Immunization Days, one in India and one in Ghana. Highlighting the evening were testimonials by two Rotarian polio survivors. Dr. Bob Benson, a member of the Iowa Quad Cities Club told of his childhood battle with brainstem (bulbar) polio. His symptons were fever, sore throat, headache, vomiting, and fatigue. Fortunately he did not suffer paralysis, but did experience permanent damage to facial and throat muscles that also affected his voice. To this day he experiences feeling colder than others and fatigues quicker than others. Dr. Bud Phillis, a member of our club related his personal and tragic story including his own battle with polio and the loss of his 14 year old sister in a four-day battle with the disease. Bud experienced similar symptoms as did Dr. Benson, causing his parents to keep his home from school. The family doctor made a house call and diagnosed Bud as having polio.. His sister who went by the nickname, "Bootsie", came home from school that day and complained of similar symptom. The doctor visited the home again and confirmed Bootsie too, had contracted polio. The following day Bootsie was having difficulty breathing and by the next day was hospitalized locally. The third day she was transported to Peoria's St. Francis Hospital which was the treatment center for polio in central Illinois. She was placed in an "Iron Lung" to mechanicly assist her breathing. The fourth day, Bootsie died. She was not only a sister, but also Bud's closest friend. Bud recovered and just a few weeks later at the age of 13, advised his parents that he thought he would become a doctor. He said he never waivered from that decision and found the funds to get the education and had a 40 year, distinguished medical career. The personal testimonials were followed by an informative video tracing the poliovirus from its earliest references in history through the explosion of cases in the 1940s and 50s, the discovery of effective vaccines in the 50s and 60s, to Rotary beginning the campaign to end polio in the 1970s, gaining the support of the World Health Organization, the US Center for Disease Control and Prevention, and UNICEF in the 1980s and adding the support of the Gates Foundation in 2000. The video then recounted the progress of the campaign as the various regions of the world became "Polio Free" through the joint Polio Eradication effort and worldwide administration of vaccine. Polio Gala Continued -

It was noted that when Rotary began the campaign the world was experiencing 350,000 cases of polio each year. So far in 2021 there are just two diagnosed cases of wild poliovirus. The statistics are that 19.5 million children are walking that otherwise would have been paralyzed and 1.5 million are living that otherwise would be dead had the campaign not occurred. It was also noted that if we were to stop now, with just two current cases, because of the incredible speed the disease spreads, within ten years we would be back to 200,000 paralyzed children annually. In addition to an evening of great socialization, outstanding hors d'oeuvres, and a wonderful dinner including various cakes for dessert, fundraising for the Polio Plus effort also occurred. Each Rock Island Rotary ticket included a \$5 donation to the campaign and a 50/50 drawing added another \$350 to the effort (the winner, Sarah Balkovek of the RAH Club) donated back \$100 of her \$250 winnings. At the conclusion of the evening Rotarians from throughout the area expressed their appreciation and gratitude to our Club for hosting the event and gave numerous complimentary reviews of the program. Bettendorf and North Scott Clubs each express a desire to host the event for 2022. We will lend our assistance as needed and are thrilled to have been the "sparkplug," that got the annual event started! Having a "Packed House" was also added to the fun!




