Mark Werning is the Chief Operations Officer at BankORION with many years of operating and audit experience in the banking industry. Mark graduated with a

Bachelor of Science in Management & Economics from Luther College and attended the Graduate School of Banking at Madison, Wisconsin. Mark is a Certified Community Bank Compliance Officer from ICBA and is a Certified Financial Services Auditor through the Institute of Internal Auditors Inc. Mark is involved in the Quad Cities community through volunteering and is the treasurer of Living Lands and Waters. He has over 40 years of banking experience having served as Senior Vice President – Risk Management at THE National Bank for 12 years, Senior Vice President and COO of Triumph Community Bank for nearly 16 years, COO and Secretary of American Bank & Trust for 3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> years, and Vice President of Landjet, LLC for 14 months prior to accepting his present postion with BankOrion in February of 2020. Mark was joined today by Jill Lievens, the Card Services & Fraud Officer at BANKORION.

Mark's portion of the program was a recounting of actual fruad examples he has dealt with. He led off with a well known general rule, "If it looks too good to be true --- It is!" He gave examples of several bank customers who were convinced they had won something and were scammed into sending money or providing vital private information that allowed others to take money from their accounts. Some were very professional appearing cashiers checks that customers deposited only to later find were fake checks. They had to return the money that had been put into their accounts based on the bad checks even though they had given good money to get the fake checks. Again, if it looks too good to be true, it is! People from foreign countries don't just randomly decided to name you, who they have never met as an heir to their estate. You don't win lottery money from a lottery you never entered. People needing to bring money into the United States don't need your help to do it legally. Forget the stories they tell, if it is legal they don't need to call you out of the blue for help! Mark also talked about what he called "Sweetheart frauds". These "romance" frauds usually involve a lonely perons looking for a relationship. The perpetrators are skilled and take their time building an on-line relationship with their intended victim. Eventually there is talk of love and getting together. Then a sudden need for money, often times thousands of dollars comes up and unfortunately the victims, often fully emotionally tied to the scam pro, begin sending money. Unfortunately Mark has found that even when the bank attempts to protect its customers, they are often so convinced that they are in love, that they can't be stopped from handing their life's savings over to the con artist. They won't listen to reason even from close family members.

Jill spoke of electronic banking and finance frauds. She said that with Covid and people desperate for money, the amount of fraud dramatically increased. Here the scammers are looking for a way to either scare a person into sending them money or a way to weasel into the victims accounts. Jull provided some simple rules to keep in mind:

- 1) A legitimate bank or card company will never ask for your full card number. They have it in their files and may ask for just the final few digits to make sure you are who you say you are.
- 2) A legitimate bank or card company will never ask for your PIN number. They don't want to know it and if you forget your PIN they have no way of looking it up and will have you create a new one. If they ask for your PIN it is fraud!
- 3) A legitimate bank or card company will never ask for your full social security number. Again, they have it on file and may ask for a few of the final digits for identification purposes.
- If you suspect fraud call your financial institution immediately. You have protections, but only if you act promptly. 4)
- 5) Look at your bank statements and online banking statements carefully. If something doesn't look right, CALL.

Thanks to Mark and Jill for some very helpful hints. It is a shame we have to learn from the misfortunes of others, but the bottom line is, we all need to be vigilant. Don't let momentary greed cloud your good judgment.


## BELL RINGING - HAVE YOU SIGNED UP?

Good afternoon again, Rotary baseball fans. We've completed one inning of play and several of our clubs have achieved some major successes so far. The standings by division follow.


