we do is helping people deal with trauma—and that means we have a very special responsibility of making sure that whoever it is, a man, woman, or child, feels safe and cared for in every interaction with us. I am incredibly proud of our ability to work within the parameters of federal and state laws and pivot our focus when better information and education is available on things like human trafficking and child welfare." Family Resources provides free, confidential services to survivors of domestic abuse, sexual abuse, human trafficking, homicide, and other violent crime. Services include Counseling and Therapy; Support Groups; Emergency Crisis Assistance; Sheltering and Rapid Rehousing; Medical and Legal Advocacy; Safety Planning; Employment Assistance; Education and Awareness; and Mentoring. They provide Walk-in Crisis Facilities open 8:30am to 5pm in Davenport, Moline, Muscatine, and also provide services to Jackson, Louisa and Clinton Counties. There are also outreach offices in Aledo and Clinton. Nicole stated that their goal is to support successful lives and to help create a healthy community. Employing 180 currently and expecting to add additional personnel, Family Resources is a multi-faceted organization. Their primary programing can be divided into three categories. Supervisor Services which deal with everything from counseling victims of crime, developing foster and adoptive parent opportunities, counseling court referred youth who are on the verge of significant involvement with the criminal justice system. and counseling domestic and sexual abuse victims. A second area if Mental Health Services provided by staff members who are trained and certified therapists. They also work with victims of abuse and survivors of criminal activities, including family members and friends of victims. Their third general "bucket" is Care Coordination. Personnel in this area strive to achieve early intervention working with other agencies, schools, and the courts. They investigate truancy in an effort to find out what is going on in the child's life that might be causing them to miss or avoid school. They speak at schools and other institutions alerting people as to warning signs they might observe and the proper steps to take if they suspect abuse, neglect, or other harmful situations. They also assist those who are victims of abuse in obtaining orders of protection from the courts. They even assist those needing help in obtaining a GED or job skills. Ms. Durban then with a proper audience warning played a powerful video of a young woman who was a victim of drugging, rape, sodomy, and forcible penetration with a foreign object. The victim, age 16 at the time of the assault by two males related what happened, what she remembered, and told of the incredible damage done to her body. She has suffered 10 surgeries and relies on a remote-controlled implant for use of her lower extremities. She also related how the emotional trauma was pent up inside for nearly 10 years prior to a friend recommending Family Resources. Through their counseling and group therapy she is now able to talk about her ordeal and is a strong advocate and role model for others suffering abuse and assault. Nicole ended her presentation with information on how people can volunteer to help family services and their eagerness to train volunteers in whatever aspect of assistance for which they are comfortable. Thank you Nicole for an excellent and informative program.
