JOEL VANDERBUSH Niabi Zoo

Today our guest speaker was Joel Vanderbush from Niabi Zoo. Joel has

been a Zoologist since 1995. He earned his BS in Zoology from Michigan State University and MA in Teaching and Education from the University of Indianapolis. Beginning his career as a zookeeper at the Tracy Aviary in Salt Lake City, UT and the Potter Park Zoo in Lansing, MI, he then served as a Programs Manager for the Indianapolis Zoo in Indianapolis, IN. In 2007, he founded Animalia, Inc., a non-profit public charity at which he served as its Executive Director and Zoologist for 10 years. In 2017, Joel became the Curator of Conservation & Education at the Niabi Zoo. The zoo's name "Niabi" comes from the Osage Nation

language and means "young deer spared by the hunter." Niabi Zoo traces its history back to 1959, when local masonry contractor and animal lover, Gordon V. McLain, opened McLain's Wild Animal Farm to the public. It operated as a privately owned zoo for several years until Patti S. Wiman purchased the farm and some surrounding land in 1963 and deeded it to the Rock Island County Forest Preserve District, which owns and operates it as a nonprofit community attraction to this day. After the zoo reopened to the public as a property of the Rock Island County Forest Preserve District, slow but steady improvements began to take shape. The zoo held its first Zoofari Ball fundraiser in 1972 and opened what was then called the "petting zoo" (now Domestic Animals) in 1974. One of the most popular attractions - the train ride - accepted its first passengers in the spring of 1975. The 1970s also saw the establishment of the adopt-an-animal program. This program allows guests to directly support their favorite animals at the zoo. Niabi Zoo offers 40+ acres bustling with more than 600 animals representing 200 species from around the world and is open for general admission April-October annually. This year Vanderbush said the Zoo will open April 18th. He also said there will be a zoo scavenger hunt in which participants purchase a Saving Species Scavenger Hunt booklet for \$5. This series of fun booklets are themed by habitat and provide clues which will take you around the Zoo to find animals from that habitat. Once identified, the booklet can be taken to the Wild Things Gift Shop to collect Conservation Cards for the species found as well as a bonus Conservationist Card. All proceeds go to the Niabi Conservation Fund. Most of Mr. Vanderbush's comments centered on Niabi's conservation efforts. Niabi Zoo's dedicated animal care staff is responsible for the daily welfare of 7 Critically Endangered Species, 5 Endangered Species, 8 Vulnerable Species, and 7 Near Threatened Species. Primary among these is their Amur Leopards, the most endangered cat species in the world. Their male and female have bred, and the Zoo is hoping for a litter of cubs. Niabi also has Red Wolves, a species with only 9 remaining in the wild. They obtained a male White Rhinoceros last year and are enlarging the exhibit area to accommodate a female which they hope to get this year. Niabi is also converting their former lion exhibit area into an African Painted Dog exhibit which will be the largest in the United States Painted Dogs are endangered and Niabi plans to house a pack of at least five dogs. The renovation project cost will be \$500,000 of which \$441,000 has been raised to date. Niabi has also done extensive conservation work in pollinators, building habitat strips and gardens and prairie restoration. That effort led to the discovery of Rusty Patch Bumble Bees, also an endangered species that was previously thought to be virtually extinct but was found in the Niabi restoration area. Mr. Vanderbush gave an entertaining and educational presentation that was well received by his Rotarian audience. Thanks so much for a fun and enlightening program.





FOUNDATION MINUTE

It's Week 3 of Rotary International's Month of Peace and Conflict Resolution/Prevention.

Foundation Trustee Chair, John F. Germ laments that many people, including Rotarians, take water for granted in the 21st Century because, "we have been fortunate to live in places where clean water is plentiful." In his latest report to Rotarians, published in *Rotary*, Germ reminds Rotarians that two billion people world-wide (1 in 4 people) lack drinkable water. Germ wonders why, in an age of instant information and space tourism, we have yet to guarantee the necessities of Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) to so many. Germ assures that Rotary is "doing something about it" because "WASH projects are among the most funded within our areas of focus. Since 2014, Rotary clubs have carried out more than 2100 Global Grants related to WASH by using \$154,000,000 in Foundation funding, impacting countless people." (*Rotary*, March 2022:58)

Within the past week, the Rotary Club of Traverse City's World Community Services Committee was approved for an \$83,000 Rotary Foundation Global Grant. According to *Traverse City Record Eagle*, the funds will support solar power, education technology and sanitation projects for two schools in rural Uganda. The following four Rotary Clubs collaborated on this grant: Rotary Club of Kabale, Uganda, Rotary Club of Petaluma, CA, Rotary Club of Midland, MI and Traverse City, MI.

In an ongoing project the Rotary Club of Rock Island, IL has raised funds and purchased 244 LifeStraw Community filters that are providing clean, safe drinking water and serving more than 17,020 children in rural villages of Kenya.

Your support of the Rotary Foundation helps make these projects possible!


