Welcome Jennifer Teres of World Relief QC

Jennifer Teres, Operations Manager for World Relief Quad Cities, did an exceptional job filling in for Laura Fontaine, their Executive Director. (It was one of those situations that couldn't be avoided thanks to a surprise Federal audit!) Not only did Jennifer enlighten the club on the recent Afghan refugee situation, she brought one of their amazing Afghan volunteers to tell us about the importance of this local organization.

But first, here's a little more info about World Relief Quad Cities— World Relief offers a number of different services including Citizenship Classes, Immigration Legal Services, English Language Programs, Youth Mentoring and a culturally appropriate food pantry (meaning that in addition to fresh fruits and vegetables found in most grocery stores, their food pantry also contains many of the staples that immigrant neighbors would have eaten in their home countries.) Their programs focus on addressing the root causes of poverty, vulnerability and injustice. Beyond physical change, they focus on driving mental, social and spiritual transformation. They understand that lasting change requires more than quick fixes and band-aid solutions. World Relief also relies on local leaders to implement their programs. Over 95% of their staff are local - people who know and love their communities and will remain long after World Relief departs.

Jennifer was hired in September 2021 to implement the Afghan Resettlement project. Since that time, she and her coworkers have helped settle 257 Afghan people in our community. Admittedly, this has been difficult. But when she was ready to throw in the towel, Mohammed Arif walked in the door and indicated that he wanted to volunteer. He told them "You helped me, and now I want to give back and help my people."

Mohammed, known by his American name Adam, came to America in 2005. He said of his experience, "People were very nice and helped me a lot with whatever I needed."

Adam went on to explain that in Afghanistan, he was a successful farmer, but everything was destroyed during the war. He had no other choice but to carve out a new life for him and his family.

He closed his talk by saying, "Please support the Afghan people. Kids have a bright future over here. There are many still left behind, and we need to bring them here. I thank World Relief - they help everybody."

Jennifer came back to the podium to finish up the program. She is amazed at how understanding our Quad City communities are towards the immigrant and refugee populations, which is not always the case in other areas. More specifically, she couldn't say enough to praise the Rock Island County Health Department for their help and organizational skills.

"In the long term, everyone is here to stay. How can we make it a great experience for all?"

Other interesting tidbits we learned during the presentation included:

- The Jewish Federation of Chicago is their fiscal agent, which allows them to apply for grants and other funding opportunities;
- With only 48 hours to find temporary housing for the first wave of immigrants, the East Moline Hyatt stepped up
 to the plate and gave World Relief the governmental rate so that could buy some time to find our newest
 residents more permanent places to live;
- The average age of the most recent Afghan immigrants is between 15-20 years old;
- Roughly 73% of the Afghan immigrant families are children;
- World Relief QC budget has gone up 670% since Laura Fontaine became its director;
- There are 34 people on staff at World Relief
- World Relief has 20 different offices around the United States, with 3 in the state of Illinois, which is why our local office is called "World Relief Quad Cities"

Jennifer summed it all up with a beautiful sentiment: "Sometimes it is impossible to understand all of the issues. At the very least, do no further harm."

Thank you to Jennifer, Adam, and the whole World Relief team for the amazing work you do in the QCA!



Nawroz is the Afghanistan new year. It falls on March 21st, which also marks the first day of spring. On Nawroz, families wake up early, put on new clothes, and begin the day with prayer.

A Traditional Afghani Recipe from the World Relief Website...

HAFT MEWA

1/2 cup walnuts (peeled if possible)

1/2 cup cashews

½ cup pistachios (without shell)

½ cup yellow raisins and 1 cup red raisins,

½ cup dried bing cherries

1 cup dried apricots

½ cup blanched, slivered almonds

½ tsp. rosewater or pure vanilla extract (optional)

5 cups cold filtered water

If you cannot find peeled nuts, blanch walnuts and pistachios. Boil 3 cups of water, remove from heat, and add nuts. Cover and let sit for 20 minutes. Remove from hot water, rinse in cold water, and then remove the peels with your hands. Make sure to remove all the skin.

Rinse dried fruits in cold water. Add fruit and nuts to a large lidded bowl or container.

(Optional) Add rosewater or vanilla extract. Pour in 5 cups cold filtered water and stir. There should be at least one inch of water above fruits and nuts.

Cover and put in fridge for 2-3 days. Haft Mewa will get sweeter the longer it sits. Serve in bowls without draining.

Ruth Lee earned a few more Paul Harris pins by honoring her son-in-law, Michael, and grandson, Owen Lee.


