Today's guest speaker was Sarah Leonard, Principal of our adopted school, Earl Hanson Elementary in Rock Island. Mrs. Leonard was appointed principal in July of 2019. According to GreatSchools a national nonprofit organization that gathers information from schools all over the country, eighty percent of the students attending Earl Hanson are classified as "low income." Gathering information from numerous sources GreatSchools states, "Earl Hanson students are making above average academic progress. Students at this school are making far more academic progress given where they were last year, compared to similar students in the state. High progress with low test scores means... that students are starting at a low point, but the school is doing a great job at supporting their academic growth compared to most other schools." Earl Hanson students at 32% Black, 32% White, 18% Asian or Pacific Islander, 14% Two or more races, and 4% Hispanic. 48% are Female and 52% are Male. The students per teacher ratio is 15:1, slightly above the state average. The % of teachers with 3 or more years' experience is 100%, well above the state average of 89%. Every teacher is fully certified. The school has a Full-time nurse on staff and a part-time psychologist and a part-time social worker. Principal Leonard has over 28 years of experience in education spanning grade levels pre-kindergarten through 8th grade, with a specific concentration in literacy development. She stated that her priority is to ensure that all students receive the best education possible. Every decision I make will be in each student's best interest. Prior to joining the Rock Island-Milan school District, Ms. Leonard served as Dean/Pre-K Director at East Moline School District #37, and also was Principal of the Taylor Ridge Elementary School and the Edgington Elementary School. Ms. Leonard began her comments with a sincere and BIG "thank you" to our club for our partnership with her school. She then mentioned our monthly Birthday Books, helping with "Donuts with Grownups," funding the annual Pumpkin Palooza field trip, funding and providing coaches and chess boards for the school's chess club. Annually providing an Angel Tree program and donating gifts for students identified as likely to be in need at Christmas time. In the past we have provided supplies for kids when needed including both school and personal needs. We have also funded school projects such as new carpet for the kindergarten room. Principal Leonard reported that Earl Hanson serves approximately 375 students in a kindergarten through sixth grade format. Roughly 225 of the students are from the geographic neighborhood around the school. Another 150 students from all over the district attend as part of the district's Gifted, and Behavior Disorders programs. She stated that their priorities in returning to full-time in-person instruction were providing equitable learning for all students. Utilizing the "Leader In Me" programs and to bring families back into the building by reestablishing a Parent-Teacher Organization. She reported that when students returned there was a significant amount or relearning required. Things like relearning to share, to work with others, to talk properly to others, and to behave. School expectations also had to be retaught including classroom, cafeteria, hallway, and playground rules. She said their full-time student counselor was extremely busy the first few months of the year. Ms. Leonard stated that immigrant and refugee students bring seven languages into the building and the school provides staff able to speak in those languages. They also anticipate an influx of Ukrainian students in the future and have already had students from Afghanistan. The school is excited to have received a substantial donation for a new playground that should be ready this fall. Future hopes are for a walking track and development of outdoor learning areas.

Each child attending Earl Hanson Elementary School will receive a pack designed to provide fun and learning activities throughout the summer months. Kids will find their pack include crayons/markers/colored pencils, math/science-oriented activities, word games, mind stretching activities, construction paper/drawing paper, coloring books/puzzle books/word searches/crossword puzzles, craft supplies including stickers/beads/yarn/ pipe cleaners/felt, new or gently used books, sidewalk chalk/bubbles and other simple games for summer fun – indoors or outdoors. Below is just a portion of what was collected and went into the packs. Not shown are seven more huge shopping bags full of craft materials and three more boxes of bags!



Sue Rector (who never wants recognition) was our Club chair for the project. Sue stored all the collected items in her living room, shopped for items with money donated by members and donated much of the craft items from her own collection. Rock Island Rotary has partnered with Heart of Hope for many years starting with helping distribute food at their food pantry on Thursdays. That involved about 90 minutes of service. When the pandemic hit our attendance at the pantry ceased and our service switched to collecting plastic bags and donating warm winter coats to their clothing pantry. Their Giving Hope House is a new venture for Heart of Hope. The property was acquired and then the job of fundraising and total renovation began. To date they have removed the old boiler heating system, radiators, kitchen cabinets, tile flooring, bathroom fixtures, and installed a completely new HVAC system, a completely new bathroom and kitchen. They plan to plan to replace the front and back porches, create a nice deck area; and give a fresh coat of paint to both the inside and exterior. A renovated electrical system and landscaping will complete the renovation creating a beautiful home for the neighborhood and adding value to the community. The home will serve as a place for training and re-entry services. This is a great chance for service with no request for a check or pledge!
