It seems incredible that anouther Rotary year has passed, but as they say, "Time Flies When You're Leading The NUMBER 1 CLUB!". Today brought the curtain down on Justin Peterson's presidential term. Justin wsa installed as our Club president for 2021-22, July 6, 2021. A "hometown" fellow, Justin graduated from Rock Island High School. In 2000. He received his bachelor's degree from Knox College in Economics with a minor in finance. Justin has spent his career in the banking industry, starting at Staff Management as Manager of Business Solutions. He then became Assistant Vice President - Business Relationship Manager for Wells Fargo Bank. Justin moved to Deere Harvester Credit Union in 2012 where he served as Business Services Manager. In 2015 he was hired by First Midwest Bank as Vice President of Commercial Banking and in 2018 he moved to his current position as Vice President, Commercial Banking at TBK Bank in Bettendorf. In 2007 Justin married his high school sweetheart, Rachel Boyle. The couple along with their son and two darling daughers reside in Andalusia. Taking the rostrum for the final time as Rotary President, Justin reviewed the many accomplishments, challenges, and goals set and accomplished during the past 12 months. Justin began his comments stating that the Rock Island Rotary Club is "People in Action" in the form of Service Above Self. He state how honored he was to have been entrusted with the presidency of the Club and expressed his thanks to all present. He congratulated noted that Eric Westpahll had brought in over \$1,700 in fines and happy/sad dollars over the year, well above his budgeted expectation. He reviewed the recent Wine Raffle that raised over \$7,500 and the subsequent Wine Auction that raised another \$5,000, the two sums allowing the Board with the addition of \$5,000 general funds to permanently endow our Service Above Self Scholarship. He thanked Kathy Trone for chairing our Trivia Night which raised \$6,000 and the first ever Rotary Rock & Roll Bingo that raised another \$4,200. Our Reindeer Ramble 5K race added an additional \$2,000 making it possible for our Club to continue and expand our communty service. During the year our Club obtained a District matching grand allow us to provided 40 scholarships for children to attend the First Tee summer golf program. Our Community Grants Committee solicited and screen donation requests and allotted \$6,000 in grants to various community organizations including Girl Scouts, Humility Homes, Rock Island-Milan Little League, and others. A Kevin Koski led Birdies for Chairity campaign raised over \$6,000 for our Club Foundation. We cibtubnued our strong support of literacy and Earl Hanson Elementary School hosting monthly Birthday Books celebrations, a Pumpkin Palooza field trip at Halloween, an Angel Tree providing more than 60 needy children with Christmas gifts, and our 7-onth long "Keep Them Engaged" campaign that colleged school supplies and activities that allowed us to provide over 300 children with summer activity packs. This year also saw the rebirth of the Rock Island Interact Club with a new active faculty sponsor and 5 students selected and sponsored by our Club who attended the Rotary Youth Leadeship camp in May. We also obtained new faculty sponsors and club liaisons to re-establish the Jordan Elementary School EarlyAct Club. Justin concluded his comments and his ter as president with a hearfelt thank you to the club and to his lovely wife, Rachel, and his three darling children, for their support, patience, and love. His speech was augments with a clever slide and video presentation. Upon concluding Justin received a very well deserved standing ovation from our members. He had asked member to wear Rotary blue. FOUNDATION MINUTE

When we talk about PolioPlus, we know we are eradicating polio, but how many of us realize what the "Plus" stands for? The "Plus" are the many benefits that have been added to the Rotary polio eradication effort to not only eradicate polio but to help alleviate some of the conditions that allows the polio virus to exist. The "Plus" that is provided as a part of the polio eradication campaign might be a hand-operated tricycle or access to water. It might be additional medical treatment, bed nets, or soap. A 2010 study estimates that the vitamin A drops given to children at the same time as the polio vaccine have prevented 1.25 million deaths by decreasing susceptibility to infectious diseases.'

Eighteen million people around the world who would have died or been paralyzed are alive and walking because of the polio eradication campaign. Health workers and volunteers supported by PolioPlus grants have built an infrastructure for delivering health care and collecting data that, in many parts of the world, didn't exist before. It's already being used to improve overall health care and to fight other diseases, proving that the legacy of PolioPlus is more than eradicating a deadly disease from the planet — it's also building a stronger health system that provides better access to lifesaving interventions for the world's most vulnerable children.

A quick step back in time will provide you with the backstory to how the polio eradication effort began and how quickly it developed into a global effort to improve the quality of life for every citizen of the world.

Clem Renouf, the 1978-79 Rotary International president who helped propel Rotary toward its top goal of eradicating polio worldwide, died in June 2020, at age 99. But in early 1979, on a flight home from the Philippines, Renouf read a magazine story about the eradication of smallpox. He wondered if Rotary's new 3-H Grants (Health, Hunger and Humanities) could be used to eliminate another disease. These grants would for the first time, allow Rotary projects to be taken on by more than just one club or district.

That magazine article led to a telephone call to Dr. John Sever, who was a district governor in Maryland, USA, and chief of infectious diseases at the United States National Institutes of Health. Sever, who knew both Jonas Salk and Albert Sabin, posed Renouf's question to the scientists, was world-wide eradication possible. They said yes. Armed with this information Renouf challenged the Rotary International Board of Directors in November of 1979, to make the eradication of polio a primary goal of the 3-H Grant program. The Rotary Board of directors accepted the challenge and working with the WHO, World Health Organization and the Philippine government began the eradication effort in the Philippines. Over the past 30 years the eradication effort moved from the 3-H Grant program into the Polio Plus program of today.

We have come such a long way since 1979 when we started the polio eradication effort. Today we are so very close. We need everyone's support and commitment to finish what we started. FREDERICK R. HOULTON SERVICE ABOVE SELF SCHOLARSHIP NOW PERMANENTLY ENDOWED

Today was a historical date for Rock Island Rotary. Less than three years ago our Club decided to establish a Service Above Self Scholarship to annually award a \$1,000 scholarship to a deserving Rock Island High School Senior. Arrangements were made with the Rock Island-Milan Education Foundation to administer the scholarship which was funded by the past two Rotary Wine Raffle proceeds and a special Wine Auction held in 2001. The first scholarship was awarded last year. When the proceeds of over \$5.000 from this year's Wine Raffle were readied for deposit into the scholarship account the Foundation advised our Board of Directors that after receipt of that deposit were would be within about \$5,000 of having enough in the account to permanently endow the scholarship. In effect there would be enough anticipated interest of the fund to make the annual \$1,000 scholarship payment without any additional deposits to the account. If additional deposits are made the amount given or the number of scholarships presented could be increased. In addition to funding the scholarship, our Board also deemed it appropriate to make the official name the Frederick R. Houlton Service Above Self Scholarship in honor of Rock Island Rotarian "Fred Houlton". Fred joined Rock Island Rotary in 1963 and will be celebrating his 60th year in our club in 2023. He served as our Club President in 1970-71 and served our District as District Governor in 1985-86. He was recipient of the A.T. Peara Award in 1985. Through his generous contributions Fred along with his wife and multiple family members are Paul Harris Fellows. In addition to his long and distinguished dedication to Rotary, Fred's career was in education. He served as a teacher and administrator in the Rock Island-Milan School District for many years, including a lengthy stint as principal of Eugene Field Elementary School. Together with his wife Virginia, Fred established a District 6420 Foundation Fund providing grants to assist Rotary Clubs throughout northwestern Illinois.
