

Guest speakers for today's meeting were LaToya Trice and our own Rebecca Arnold representing the M.L. Kind Center in Rock Island. Both ladies exuded enthusiasm and knowledge! Rebecca started things off with a general rundown of the King Center's many facets. Opening in 1975 the Center survived on funding from government sources for many years. In 2018 Rebecca was hired as the Center's first Resource Development Manager. Since then funding has shifted from strictly government support to support from numerous grants and private partnerships. The King Center is a deparment of the City of Rock Island, but is also its own 501(c)(3) charitable entity. Annually the center operates on about a \$2 million budget of which the City provides about 10% and has ownership of the building and grounds. Rebecca pointed out the that the Kind Center is truly a "community center" with offices, banquet rooms, and meeting rooms avaialable for rent and use by community members and organizations. The Center is also a Social Services Agency providing services in area schools and throughout the community. Services include a Family Advisory Tearm providing services to families in crisith throughout rock Island County. They also have numerous

volunteer led clubs such at the Active Club for senior cittizens, the Metro Youth Organization for children and yyoung adults, and they even have a Boxing Club known as the Rock Isalnd Boxing Club. The center provides family counseling, crisis interventions, and helps link people with services. A large part of the Center's activities are services for youth. LoToya stepped in at this point in the program. She is a native of Davenport. Graduationg first in her class at Davenport North, and also 2st in her class at St. Ambrose and in Medicalc School. She was a practicing surgeon until a series of strokes caused her to leave the medical profession. She then got into Children's Serviceds and ultimateley landes at the Kind Center as Youth Services Manager. She began her comments telling us that she has alsoways loved to sing. Among her favorit songes was a song saying that our youth are the future. She said she disagrres with that sentiment and prefers saying that the youth are "Here". By that she means they are present, available, and accountable. She sees her task as showing showing them, and providing the tools for them to develop and grow into being the best they can be. She believes in teaching them never to be satisfied and to stribe to move on and upward. She stress to the youth to get their education, to set goals, and on occasion has to "push them out of the nest" to make them strive beyond their comfort zone. Much of the work is done through the King Center's Summer Camp programs which are going on now. Many of the current counselors and teachers in the camp gre up in the camp as kids and come back to help others. The loyalty even has resulted in volunteers working without pay because they are dedicated and believe in the program. In addition to their own services LaToya stated that the Center partners with Every Child (formerly the Child Abuse Council); 'Sping Forward; Rise Up a non-profit workforce/career development program that recognizes the specific needs of court-involved youth; YWCA Childcare; Girl Scouts, Youth Hope, and Steam on Wheels a volunteer-based non-profit where Science, Tech, Engineering, and Math meet with Art to form a unique experience that enriches children. LaToya was also excited to announce the the Kinc Center will soon have its own Stem Lab to provide inhouse expereinces for the King Center's kids. From teen pregnancy and substance abuse counseling to GED training and testing, the King Center is truly a wonderful Community asset. Thanks Ladies!

FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week 2 of Rotary International's Month of Transition.

When the new Rotary Year began on July 1 of this year, new presidents encouraged members to actively participate in committees and projects. Several clubs are continuing with ongoing projects, while others are picking up new ones. One such club, the Rotary Club of St Vincent South (D7030), plans to ensure the successful delivery of the **Breast Cancer Awareness Global Grant**. According to an online report, the project will improve access to breast cancer screening services and breast health awareness to women and girls in rural communities of St. Vincent and the Grenadines through the procurement of mobile ultrasound machines. The new president, Engineer Daniel Campbell also intends to prioritize the implementation of projects to tackle the critical issue of Prostate Cancer which accounts for 18%-47% of cancer deaths in St. Vincent Grenadiers (SVG). **Submitted by the Rotary Club of St. Vincent and the Rotary Club of Taipei** Prosperity, the grant has been approved by The Rotary Foundation in the amount of US\$180,180. "It's great to Imagine, and it is even better to do! Rotarians are people of action and will be committed to both imagining new possibilities and working together to improve our communities," Campbell said.
